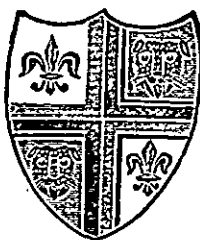

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Editorial.

WE have entered upon another School year, and the Grammar School, we trust, has commenced a new era of usefulness. With our increased accommodation has come an increase of boys to fill the new classrooms, and our number has now reached 120. The new classrooms and dormitories are fine, airy rooms, and the improved conditions under which the work of the School is carried on is bound to result in better work; in fact, a certain improvement may be noticed in the quality of the work even at this early stage.

On October 8th the buildings were thrown open to visitors, and large numbers of parents and others who take an interest in the School were conducted over the buildings, and were afterwards entertained at tea by Dr. and Mrs. Tovey. The greatest interest was taken, and the universal opinion seemed to be that the alterations had been carried through in a most satisfactory manner.

For the benefit of Old Shastonians, and those who were unable to see what changes have been made, we give a brief account of them. In place of the old laboratories we have now two classrooms; a third classroom, lavatory and cloak-room have been built in the space between the old laboratories and the assembly room,

while a new laboratory has been built to replace a coal-house and other buildings. The former lavatory has been converted into a boot room for boarders, with cloak room above. Over the new classrooms have been erected three fine lofty dormitories, bath rooms, other smaller dormitories, and matron's rooms. The increased number of boarders—we now have 54—necessitates a further enlargement of the dining-hall, and more kitchen accommodation. The system of heating the buildings with hot water pipes has proved quite a success. We congratulate the architect, Mr. A. Parsons, and the contractors, Messrs. Harding & Short, on the satisfactory result they have achieved, and offer them our hearty thanks for doing their work so speedily and efficiently.

Cricket.

ONCE more we have to record a successful season, and if the School XI. was not as good as some of its predecessors, it was at least good enough to win most of its matches. The team had four good bats, and two or three promising ones; but a distinct tail was too often apparent, and on the true hard wickets we had all the season, more runs ought frequently to have been made. H. T. Hall was the most consistent bat, but nearly all his runs were made on the "on" side; L. G. Prideaux, though not so reliable, had more scoring strokes. G. O. Genge and F. C. Blucke played several good innings, and C. H. M. Platt and G. Hemingway gave promise of better things in the future.

The bowling was only moderate; W. Jeffery took nearly half the wickets that fell, and proved himself a regular "terror" to opposing Schools. We shudder to think what would have happened without him! No-one else but Hall, ever looked likely to bowl a side out, although J. B. Walker could be relied on to keep a good length.

The fielding was patchy and unreliable; at times the ground work and catching were good, and at others they were deplorable. The Captain was a brilliant exception, but notwithstanding his fine example, nobody else in the team could really be called safe. We hope for a great improvement in this department of the game next year; nothing is so conducive to winning matches as good fielding, and no School team ought ever to field badly. H. T. Hall was the only possible recipient of the "fielding" prize, and he also won the batting prize; W. Jeffery easily took the bowling prize.

The Masters' XI. did not win as many matches as usual, owing chiefly to lack of bowling. Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin both made centuries, and also had to do most of the bowling. H. T. Hall and L. G. Prideaux batted well on occasions, and W. Jeffery did a few good performances with the ball.

The "Under 14" XI. had a successful season, and contained several promising cricketers. They were strong in batting and fielding, but most of the bowling was weak. G. Hemingway, J. K. Digby, H. C. Watts, G. Bowley and R. G. Innocent were the pick of a good lot of batsmen, and the first named showed such promising form in trial games that he was played for the first eleven, and had the honour of winning his School colours. The fielding was always good; C. P. Wookey made some exceptionally good country catches, while D. C. Tayler, G. Hemingway and G. E. Bowley were all very smart. J. W. Kilpatrick and J. K. Digby were the best of the bowlers, but the former was unfortunately prevented by illness from playing in more than one match. R. S. Payne, D. C. Tayler and C. P. Wookey all bowled a good ball at times, but they must learn to keep a more accurate length if they ever hope to take many wickets.

The fixture card differed slightly from that of last year; two fresh matches were played against Motcombe C.C., and only one game was possible with Sexey's School, Bruton, owing to illness. The Masters' matches against Stour C.C. were dropped, and a whole day match against Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., and a return fixture with Iwerne C.C. were substituted.

We conclude this short summary of the season's doings with a word of hearty thanks to our captain. He

set his team a splendid example in batting and fielding, and although difficult bowling problems frequently presented themselves, he showed great judgment and was always equal to the occasion.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Town—May 17th, home, *lost*.—

School batted first, but with the exception of Dr. Tovey (53) the scoring was poor, chiefly through some excellent bowling on the part of A. Maidment. Gillingham replied with 140, of which J. R. Campbell was responsible for 46, and D. H. Brown (27) and E. B. Down (21) ably seconded his efforts. School tried in all eight bowlers, which would probably have been unnecessary if our fielding had been better.

S.G.S. v. Motcombe—May 21st, home, *won*.—School

opened with L. Prideaux and F. Blucke, but both batsmen were quickly dismissed by putting their legs in front of straight balls. H. Hall soon began to get runs, and G. Genge showed the rest a lesson in scoring, being undefeated at the close with 42 to his credit. The rest of the side put up a very poor fight. The Motcombe score came chiefly through R. Goodman and C. Arnold, the latter being dismissed through a very fine catch in the country by H. Hall. J. B. Walker was one of the most successful bowlers, obtaining 4 wickets for 18 runs; while W. Jeffery secured 2 wickets for 6 runs. As in the previous match, the School fielding did not show to the best advantage. In the School's second innings, H. Hall and W. Jeffery were the most successful.

S.G.S. v. Iwerne Minster—May 24th, home, *lost*.—Iwerne

batted first, and Dando, by good hard hitting, carried his bat right through the innings, being not out 50 at the close. Dr. Tovey was very effective with the ball, securing 7 wickets for 33 runs. School, for whom F. G. Minchin and J. A. Tayler (Old Boys) played, opened badly, and with the exception of Dr. Tovey (35) and F. C. Blucke (not out 21) a very poor defence was offered. Trowbridge was the most formidable with the ball for Iwerne, securing six of our wickets.

S.G.S. v. Old Shastonians—May 28th, home, *won.*—School won the toss and opened with Prideaux and Blucke. The latter soon retired and Hall then joined Prideaux. Both batted in good style, and the former obtained 41 runs (including 7 fours), and the latter 27. C. Platt (not out 17) and W. Jeffery (15) were the next most successful. Mr. R. B. Minchin secured 5 wickets for the Old Boys. G. Atkinson batted very steadily for the Old Boys, and carried his bat through the innings for 50. The game got very exciting towards the end, for R. B. Minchin hit out in very vigorous style and quickly put on 38 runs (8 fours). W. Jeffery with his insidious lobs proved very destructive, obtaining five wickets for 22 runs. The School fielding showed great improvement all round, and especially must be noted the catch by which H. Hall dismissed C. Keast. On School going to the wickets a second time, Hall and Prideaux batted very freely.

S.G.S. v Tisbury—June 4th, home, *won.*—Tisbury batted first, and with the exception of Green (28) they were unable to stand against Dr. Tovey and W. Jeffery, who bowled unchanged. The former got 4 wickets for 18 runs, and the latter 6 for 32. The School fielding was good, and Hall, Blucke, Mr. Minchin and J. B. Walker all made excellent catches. School soon showed themselves masters of the Tisbury bowling, and Mr. Minchin gave an excellent batting display for 120 runs. H. Hall (86), L. Prideaux (56) and W. Jeffery (42) all contributed fine scores towards School's large total of 393 for 8 wickets. Score at fall of each wicket—1 for 108, 2 for 203, 4 for 285, 5 for 357.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton—June 7th, away, *won.*—School won the toss and opened very badly, 4 wickets quickly falling for under 10 runs. G. Genge, however, showed the rest of the side that the bowling could be played, for he scored very freely, obtaining 50 before being caught. G. Hemingway, who was making his first appearance with the 1st XI., was the only player to give Genge some support; in fact, he practically helped Genge to save the game; six wickets were down for 37 when he went in, and before he left the score was doubled. Sexey's fared worse than we did, for they seemed quite at a loss when facing Jeffery's lobs. The bowler mentioned obtained 7 wickets for the small

total of 22 runs. H. Hall, who bowled well, was very conspicuous in the field, and secured two excellent catches. A second innings by School did not improve matters, for again most of the batsmen failed badly, and when stumps were drawn six wickets had fallen for 47 runs.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Town—June 14th, home, *drawn*.—School won the toss, and an excellent exhibition of batting by Dr. Tovey (113) was seen. Scoring freely all round the wicket, he was finally stumped in jumping out to Campbell. His score included a 6, a 5, and 15 fours. The School declared at 223 for 4 wickets. Gillingham also found run-getting easy, and A. Maidment, by a most exhilarating display of hard hitting, was undefeated at the close of play, having 106 to his credit (in $\frac{3}{4}$ -hour—including a 6 and 17 fours). J. R. Campbell ably seconded the former player's efforts, though in a quieter way, obtaining 75. A most exciting game finished with Gillingham's score standing at 208 for 4 wickets. So far as School records show, Maidment's century is the first to have been scored against the School. For School, Genge and Hall fielded well, and Mr. Minchin's catch which dismissed W. Hussey was very fine.

S.G.S. v. Parkstone School—June 18th, home, *won*.—Parkstone elected to field, and School opened with Pridéaux and Blucke, the former getting 17 before returning an easy one to the bowler. Blucke fell when he had reached 15. Then Hall came to the rescue, and being well helped by Genge (42) secured 47 by good strokes, chiefly on the leg side. The third wicket fell at 51, and the fourth at 134. The rest of the team only managed to walk to the wickets and back again. Parkstone found the bowling by Hall and Jeffery too much for them. The former got 5 wickets for 28, and the latter 4 for 38. The School fielding generally was not good, though R. Baker took two good catches, and G. Pratt and G. Hemingway did some smart work.

S.G.S. v. Motcombe—June 21st, home, *won*.—L. Prideaux and F. Blucke opened very well, and by good cricket put on 93 runs before being caught out. The rest did nothing with the bat except G. Hemingway, who, going in seventh, was not out 18 at the close. Jeffery's lobs proved too difficult for Motcombe, and he obtained five

victims for 35 runs. L. Prideaux worked smartly behind the wicket, helping Jeffery to secure 3 wickets in one over.

S.G.S. v. Foster's School, Sherborne—June 28th, away, *won*.—School soon proved themselves masters of the Sherborne bowling, and with Prideaux 65 (8 fours), Blucke 55 (8 fours), and Hall 101 not out (16 fours), they were able to "declare" at 256 for 5 wickets. H. Hall, by securing the century on this ground, exactly repeated the performance of F. G. Minchin last year. The first wicket fell for 99, and the fifth for 233. Foster's reply was very feeble (4 wickets for 0, 5 for 1, 6 for 8), and Jeffery's slow leg breaks found the stumps time after time in one over he secured 3 wickets). He had the excellent average of 7 wickets for 9 runs, and Hall did an equally good performance—3 wickets for 5 runs. Foster's were sent in again, and did somewhat better, securing 64 runs for 5 wickets. Jeffery again was the chief thorn.

S.G.S. v. Tisbury—July 2nd, away, *won*.—Played on an extremely rough pitch. Tisbury started, but did not face Dr. Tovey (4 for 23) and Mr. Minchin (5 for 11) with any success, no batsman being able to reach double figures. School found scoring difficult, Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey (16 each) being the most successful. Tisbury obtained 56 for 5 in a second innings. Hall took a magnificent "country" catch. J. B. Walker did well with the ball, taking 3 wickets for 10 runs.

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School—July 5th, away, *lost*.—School won the toss, and 31 was the total when Prideaux got in front of a straight ball. Blucke having been smartly run out, Hall, Jeffery and Genge all contributed useful scores. The rest, with the exception of Hemingway, did nothing. The Wimborne players took three very good catches. Wimborne opened badly, 4 wickets falling for 36, and 5 for 50 runs. Harris put a different complexion on the game, for by hard hitting, and helped by weak fielding, he obtained 50 before dismissal. Dropped catches practically threw away the game, and the seventh wicket being down for 95, the eighth fell at 122, and the ninth at 142. Thus the "tail wagged" to good purpose. Hall obtained 8 wkts. for 49 runs.

S.G.S. v. Shaftesbury Town—July 9th, away, *drawn*.—The Town won the toss, but opened badly, 3 wickets being down for 20 runs, all caught by L. Prideaux behind the wickets off Mr. R. B. Minchin's bowling. G. Atkinson, however, fared better, putting on 23 before being well caught by Mr. Minchin. C. Platt also took a good catch. Otherwise the School fielding was weak. Mr. Minchin obtained 4 wickets for 27 runs, and Dr. Tovey 3 for 25. School did not find run-getting easy, and had only scored 36 for 3 wickets when stumps were drawn.

S.G.S. v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI.—July 10th, home, *lost*.—Mr. Tovey brought a strong side of Gloucestershire cricketers for this fixture, and, losing the toss the School had to undergo a long, though delightful, course of leather-hunting. Mr. S. Boulton, Mr. C. Allen and Mr. W. Tovey gave us an exhibition of how bright cricket should be played—their scores being respectively 78, 87 and 62. The first mentioned score contained 1 six and 13 fours, the second 3 sixes and 13 fours, and the last 9 fours. By the time half the side was out 226 runs appeared on the board. In two separate overs 20 runs were scored, in each case including two "sixes." Although almost all the side were caught out, yet speaking generally the School catching, fielding, and returns were weak. School did not reply well to the visitors' total, Dr. Tovey being the exception. He obtained 79 by good, steady cricket, making some beautiful strokes on the off side. G. Hemingway (33 not out) was the next highest scorer. School "followed on" and got 70 for 5 wickets, C. Platt being responsible for 31 of them.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Grammar School—July 12th, away, *won*.—School batted first, Prideaux and Blucke being quickly bowled by Cleary. W. Jeffery was next run out, and prospects looked very bad with the score sheet reading 3 wickets for 10 runs. H. Hall soon showed that the bowling was not really so formidable, and helped chiefly by Genge (22) he obtained 65 runs. The School "tail" was very much in evidence, the last five wickets falling easily to Cleary. Gillingham found Jeffery's lobs practically unplayable, and wickets fell rapidly. The above-mentioned bowler secured 7 wks. for 25 runs; in one over he had a six knocked off his

bowling, and then in revenge took 4 wickets in 5 balls. Hall took 3 wickets for 12 runs. In the second innings School obtained 87, chiefly through Jeffery 23, Prideaux 14, and Hemingway 14. Gillingham again found slow-bowling beyond them. This time H. G. Pratt accounted for 5 wickets at a cost of only 14 runs. When stumps were drawn the home team had scored only 18 runs for 7 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Shaftesbury Town—July 16th, home, *won.*—Town batted first, and a good start by J. Hall (22) and Stanford (24) was made. The latter player was well caught by G. Genge. The rest of the side did very little with the exception of E. Yates, who played a patient and restrained innings of 21—a most valuable contribution at a time when things were going adversely. Dr. Tovey was very successful with the ball, obtaining 6 wickets for 31 runs. School completely mastered the Town bowling, and Dr. Tovey (83) and Mr. Minchin (95) put up a *first wicket record* for the School of 163 runs. The last mentioned player obtained 15 fours, five of them being in succession. H. Hall (17) and Prideaux (26 not out) helped forward the score, and when the game ended we had 260 runs for 5 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Grammar School—July 19th, home, *drawn.*—School won the toss, and opened with Blucke and Prideaux. The latter was missed twice in the first three overs, and then he settled down to some beautiful forward play, being stumped when he had reached 56. Two wickets down for 119 looked a useful score. Hall ran Prideaux very close, getting 55 before being lbw to Cleary. W. Rowe made his best score of 20 not out in this match. The innings was somewhat remarkable in that 5 of the School batsmen were out through getting their legs in front of straight balls. Gillingham's reply was not very spirited, for 2 wickets fell at 20, and although Burt with 27 hit out well, yet when stumps were drawn they had 5 wickets down for 83. Hall bowled well, and although he only got 2 wickets for 20 runs, yet out of his 16 overs 10 were "maidens," seven being in succession.

S.G.S. v. Iwerne Minster—July 26th, away, *won.*—This was our first visit to Iwerne Park. The home team batted first, and by careful back play Mr. H. Taylor obtained 16 before being lbw to Dr. Tovey. The same

bowler also captured five other wickets, the total cost of the six being 31 runs. Mr. R. B. Minchin took four for 15 runs: School had no difficulty in passing the Iwerne total of 65, for the first wicket did not fall until 90 had been scored. Dr. Tovey (43) and Mr. Minchin (63). These scores would have been much larger had they been made on a ground with boundaries, for many of the strokes were very fine drives: The great heat of the day was all against running between the wickets. The School score closed at 182.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Ensor's XI.—July 29th, home, *lost*.—In the absence of Dr. Ensor, the Rev. C. A. Hutchinson acted as captain, and as the visitors only mustered nine men, two of the boys played for them. School lost the toss, and Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin quickly claimed a wicket each. V. Prince and A. S. Maidment "stopped the rot," however, the former making some very good strokes in a score of 29. The latter was just settling down to another of his big hitting displays when he was snapped up by Prideaux behind the wicket, at 41. The Rev. K. S. Blucke also obtained 41 by some excellent off-driving. He eventually fell to a good "country" catch by H. Hall. The visitors' captain had 24 runs to his credit, and was still undefeated at the close of the innings. School fielded well. Maidment and Norriss proved too good for the School batsmen, and took five wickets each. C. Platt (12) was the only batsman to reach double figures, and half the wickets fell for 27 runs. Dr. Ensor's XI., on going to the wickets a second time, did not fare so well as before being all out for 76, 31 of which were contributed by Norriss. Dr. Tovey got 4 wickets for 12 runs, and W. Jeffery 5 for 35. School had now to get 212 to win. Just as we had done badly in the first attempt, so now we found the runs come easily, 2 wickets falling for the first 100, and 7 being down for 209 runs when stumps were drawn. Prideaux batted splendidly for School, being not out 53. A most remarkable and exciting match, both sides having a very good, and a poor innings. School only required 3 runs to win when time was called.

"UNDER 14" MATCHES.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers School, Salisbury—June 25th, home, *won.*—School batted first and though 2 wickets were down for 38, the score board soon showed a great alteration. Bowley batted well for 28, and J. Digby, who went in "second wicket," by hard hitting obtained 66 runs and was not out at the close of the innings. The century was passed when only 4 wickets had fallen. The Choristers reply was not very good with the exception of V. Prince, who obtained 37 out of a total of 83 by good cricket. J. Kilpatrick bowled well for School, securing 4 wickets for 19 runs. G. Bowley got 2 for 8 runs. Wookey took a good catch.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers School, Salisbury—July 16th, away, *lost.*—Salisbury batted first, and as before, with the exception of V. Prince (29) they were unable to get runs. D. Tayler was the most destructive with the ball, securing 5 wickets for the cost of 23 runs, three of the wickets being obtained in one over. School did not make any better start, 3 wickets being down for 32, as against the Choristers 3 for 34. J. Digby (19) and R. G. Innocent (14) then made a stand. Four wickets fell at 53. His brother, "Shav" Genge, has experienced some very severe weather in Saskatchewan, where he is running a farm, but expresses his intention of not being beaten.

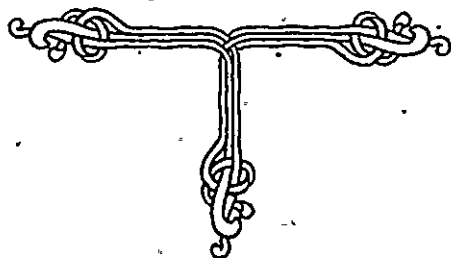

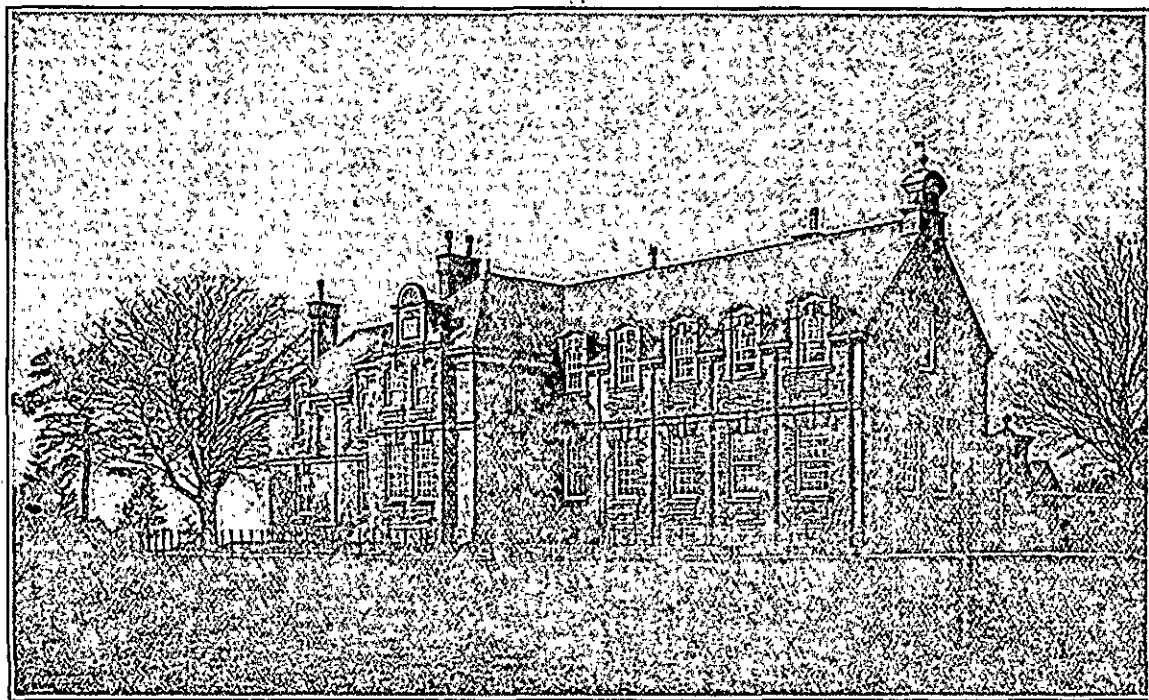
