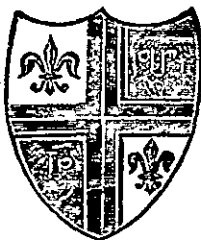

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Editorial.

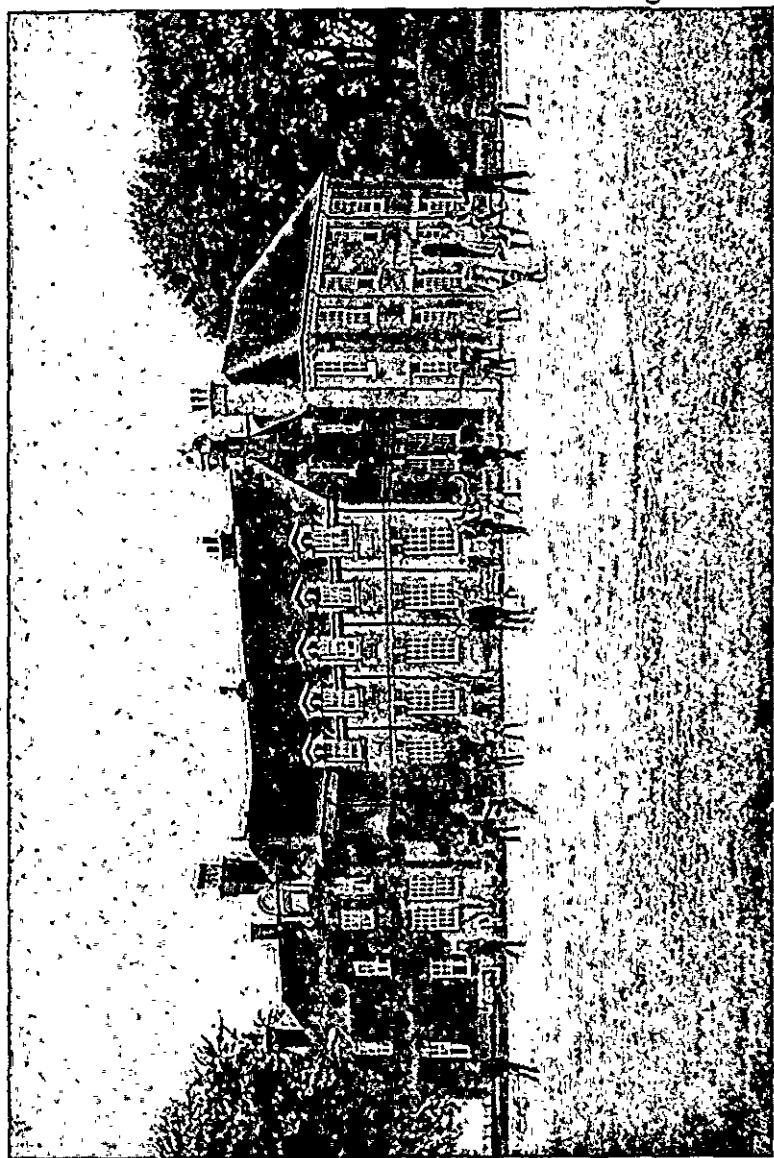
THE War with Germany, which many far-sighted people predicted, has come upon us with startling suddenness, and our Empire is now engaged in a struggle for its very existence. The war was none of our own seeking, and we go into it only because our treaty promises and our national honour would have made it cowardly to stand aside. The time for talking has gone by, the hour for action has come. Let us then

“Imitate the action of the tiger—
Stiffen the sinews, summon up the blood,
Disguise fair nature with hard-favoured rage,”

determined that, whatever the sacrifice, whatever the cost of life and treasure, we will willingly face it rather than be guilty of breaking our pledged word. Remember, this is a fight to a finish, no compromise is possible; German militarism and all its attendant evils must either dominate and terrorise Europe or be stamped out of existence.

To present boys, we would say—“study the war and thoroughly understand why we are fighting; above all keep yourselves fit, for you may yet be wanted to play a part in the defence of your country.”

Read history and see how, in the great emergencies of by-gone days, they rated self-sacrifice above a selfish ease, and honour above life itself."

Two of our staff, Mr. Watts and Mr. Minchin, have temporarily left us to take their part in the defence of our country. Mr. Watts has obtained a commission in the Army Service Corps, and is already in France. Mr. Minchin has joined the 4th Batt. of the Oxfordshire Light Infantry, and is rapidly becoming efficient. We wish them every success and a safe and speedy return.

Cricket.

THE season of 1914 must be written down as a disappointing one. Owing to "mumps" no Inter-School matches could be played, and in the few Club matches arranged the eleven gave a very moderate display. The most pleasing feature was the splendid bowling of V. C. Prince, who had to keep an end going all the time, as nobody else seemed able to keep a length. The batting was poor; D. T. Sutton made one big score, but nobody else did anything of note. Why the batting failed so repeatedly is a mystery; seven of the team were worth runs, and yet the batting nearly always broke down in an inexplicable fashion. L. G. Prideaux, G. O. Genge and C. H. M. Platt all failed to reproduce the previous season's form, and G. Hemingway frequently threw his wicket away just when he looked like staying. The fielding was sound without being brilliant; G. O. Genge, C. H. M. Platt, V. C. Prince, D. T. Sutton and D. C. Tayler were probably the pick, and L. G. Prideaux

was quite a useful wicket keeper. It was impossible on the season's form to award an average bat, and nobody was sufficiently prominent to justify a fielding prize; the bowling prize was thoroughly well earned by V. C. Prince. A word of sympathy is due to R. G. Innocent, who would almost certainly have obtained his colours but for illness.

No "Under 14" matches were possible, but the team looked like being a very useful one; G. Hemingway and D. C. Tayler both proved good enough for the first team, and G. E. Bowley played in one or two matches.

The Masters XI. did little better than the School team, and here again the batting proved very unreliable. Mr. Minchin and Mr. Spencer made a few good scores, and Mr. Watts scored his first century; but the side was very often dismissed much too cheaply. V. C. Prince, Mr. Minchin and Mr. Watts all bowled well. Dr. Tovey was, unfortunately, only able to play in three matches owing to illness.

If the season was a poor one, no blame can be placed on the shoulders of the captain, L. G. Prideaux. He displayed a good knowledge of the game, kept his team well together, and managed a difficult bowling side very well. Unfortunately the many batting failures affected him, and there was a "worried look" about his batting that was quite absent in 1913.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

In the 12 matches played with Masters, School scored 1,598 runs for the loss of 119 wickets, against our opponents 1474 runs for 155 wickets.

In the 5 matches played by the Boys alone, School obtained 790 runs for 57 wickets, against 849 runs for 52 wickets.

Thus the whole of the matches produced totals very close together—2,388 runs *for*, 2,323 runs *against*.

S.G.S. v. Shaftesbury Town, away, May 13th, won.—

The outstanding feature of this match was Mr. Spencer's contribution of 79 (not out)—an excellent début. V. C. Prince (21 not out) was our only other batsman who gave him any support. Mr. Minchin was very successful with the ball, securing 4 wickets in 3 overs at a cost of 5 runs. Mr. Spencer, 3 for 11 runs, also bowled well.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Town, home, May, 23rd, *won.*—Gillingham batted first, but found Prince's bowling too good for them, and 7 wickets fell to him for 20 runs. School obtained 101 for 1 wicket, Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin being the effective batsmen.

S.G.S. v. Iwerne Minster, home, May 30th, *won.*—School's total of 210 came chiefly from Mr. Minchin 74 (including 10 fours), Mr. Spencer 54 (8 boundaries), and L. Prideaux 46. A very poor display was given by the rest of the team, for out of the 210 runs obtained by the whole side 195 of them were secured by the first 4 wickets. Mr. Watts (5 for 28) did best with the ball for School.

S.G.S. v. Mr. G. Atkinson's XI., home, June 3rd, *lost.*—School batted first and gave a very poor display, 6 wickets falling for the small total of 17 runs. R. Innocent (17) was the only batsman to get "double figures." J. T. Hall (O.S.) obtained 82 (14 fours) for our opponents. D. Sutton (4 for 26) bowled well.

S.G.S. v. Motcombe, home, June 13th, *won.*—G. Genge, 56 not out, was the best for School. Good catches were made by V. C. Prince off H. G. Pratt's bowling.

S.G.S. v. Tisbury, home, June 17th, *lost.*—Tisbury began badly, but A. Jordan, ably assisted by A. Norris and Dr. Ensor, collared the bowling, and the first named was undefeated at the close for 106. At the fall of the seventh wicket the innings was "declared," the total being 214. School could only obtain 95 in reply, of which more than half came from our opening pair of batsmen—Mr. Minchin and Mr. Spencer. Dr. Ensor made three good catches.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Town, home, June 27th, *won.*—School, principally through vigorous hitting by Mr. Watts, who obtained 105 not out (including a 5 and 15 fours), declared their innings closed at 204 (for 8 wickets). G. O. Genge, 50, was the only other batsman to find the bowling easy. Gillingham Town fared very badly against the bowling of V. C. Prince, who "clean bowled" 7 for 7 runs, three of the wickets falling in one over.

S.G.S. v. Rev. G. A. Hutchinson's XI., home, June 29th, *lost*.—Our opponents proved a very strong combination, and a good score of 202 fell to them. In spite of this total V. C. Prince obtained 4 wickets for a cost of 29 runs only. A. Norris (65), Dr. Ensor (39) and Dr. Hollick (36) all batted well. School found Dr. Hollick's bowling the chief obstacle to scoring, and he obtained 5 victims. D. C. Tayler (41) was the best with the bat.

S.G.S. v. Old Shastonians, home, July 1st, *won*.—School won the toss and were not dismissed until 243 appeared on the board. In spite of this big total only D. T. Sutton was successful; he obtained 112, including 17 boundary hits. E. J. Shepard claimed 5 wickets. The Old Boys made a very successful reply, chiefly through a very fine display of batting by Dr. Ensor, who scored freely all round the wicket. His score of 71 included 12 fours. E. Scammell (34), G. Cheater (21) and E. Shepard (27) all gave the chief scorer good support.

S.G.S. v. Tisbury, away, July 8th, *lost*.—Tisbury faced the bowling of Mr. Minchin (6 for 33) very badly, the soft wicket proving very helpful to him. Eight wickets fell for 39, and the side was dismissed for 55. Our reply was much worse, for we lost 5 wickets when only 14 runs were on the board, and were all out for 45. Mr. Lewis was very effective with the ball, obtaining 6 wkts. for 14 runs. Small scoring was the order of the day, for the second innings of Tisbury did not in any case produce double figures, Mr. Watts (4 wkts. for 9 runs) being our best bowler.

S.G.S. v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., home, July 9th, *lost*.—School had to field, and although we started well, securing 3 wickets for 28 runs, our bowling was soon mastered. S. Boulton 90 (13 boundaries) and C. Allen 50 (2 sixes and 6 fours) showed us how runs should really be obtained, both Mr. Minchin and V. Prince having 18 runs scored off single overs. W. G. Tovey, 45 not out, including 2 sixes, also emphasized the bright aspect of cricket. School's reply of 150 came chiefly from the three first batsmen, though D. T. Sutton, going in seventh, did well. In our opponents' second innings, H. G. Pratt obtained 3 wickets for 10 runs, and R. J. Walker 3 for 14.

S.G.S. v. Mr. J. T. Hall's XI., home, July 11th, *lost*.—L. G. Prideaux (44) was the only batsman to face the bowling successfully, and thanks to a very valuable and careful display by E. C. Young, 58 (10 fours), School was beaten by 16 runs. V. Prince bowled well—5 for 38.

S.G.S. v. Shaftesbury Town, home, July 15th, *won*.—Mr. Spencer (55) was the only run-getter of any note on our side, the slow bowling of W. Joliffe being very effective. Total 146. A very close finish resulted, for the Town, after extended time, were dismissed for 138. They began with no great success, 6 wickets falling for 41. E. Young (40) and G. Atkinson (51) made a very strong effort to top our score. Mr. Minchin, 6 for 45, bowled most successfully.

S.G.S. v. Quidhampton Wanderers, home, July 18th, *won*. For School, Mr. Minchin soon mastered the bowling, and eventually obtained 133 by excellent hitting; this display included a 6, a 5, and 23 fours. He secured 24 runs (6 boundaries) in one over! Quidhampton's reply was very feeble, and they were all out for 27. V. C. Prince, 5 wickets for 10 runs, and Mr. Minchin 4 for 15, did the execution. The former obtained 3 wickets in 5 balls.

S.G.S. v. Iwerne Minster, away, July 25th, *lost*.—On a soft wicket we put up an extremely feeble defence against the bowling of G. Trowbridge and H. Taylor, who each claimed 5 victims. Iwerne passed our total before the second wicket fell, thanks to G. Trowbridge (19) and A. R. Rawlence (22 not out). Six of our opponents obtained "ducks." Prince, 4 wickets for 4 runs, and Mr. Watts 4 for 12, were our most successful bowlers. A heavy rainstorm made the ball very difficult to hold when our turn came to field.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. E. Donne's XI., home, July 27th, *lost*.—The chief scorer for our opponents was the Rev. J. H. Arundell (24). He, unfortunately, snapped a tendon in his leg and had to retire, much to our regret, for in spite of "*anno domini*" he was giving an excellent display. Mr. Minchin bowled well, and 4 wickets were down for 8 runs at one part of the game. Our reply was very feeble, 5 wickets falling with only 15 runs scored.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Ensor's XI., home, July 30th, *lost*.—School did not successfully face Dr. Ensor's bowling—7 for 15. Three wickets fell at a total of 70, and we were all out for 94. Our opponents started badly, 5 wickets falling for 49. Mr. Watts (5 for 26), and V. Prince (4 for 26). However, the bowling fell off towards the end, and we were beaten by 18 runs.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

L. G. PRIDEAUX.—A good, stylish bat, with a preference for a hard wicket. Has a splendid off drive, and has much improved his defence on the leg stump. Kept wicket satisfactorily, and captained his side very well.

G. O. GENGÉ.—A good forcing bat with plenty of nerve. Was worth more runs than he made. Still has a weak stroke outside his off stump. Good, safe field.

C. H. M. PLATT.—Has the making of a good bat, but is too fond of trying to hit the wrong ball. With more restraint would make lots of runs. One of the best fields on the side.

H. G. PRATT.—Improved slightly in batting, but his bowling was a great disappointment as he lost his length entirely. Keen, but uncertain field.

J. B. WALKER.—Made very few runs, and did not bowl as well as the previous season. Very uncertain in the field.

G. HEMINGWAY.—Was worth more runs than he made. Has lots of strokes, and will some day make a good bat. Moderate judge of a run. Improved latterly in the field. Is very keen.

R. J. WALKER.—Did not fulfil expectations in batting, but bowled fairly well, on one or two occasions. Fair field, but very slow.

W. ROWE.—Did not make the improvement we hoped for. Keen field, but rather unreliable. Kept wicket creditably on one or two occasions.

V. C. PRINCE.—A good fast bowler with plenty of life off the pitch. Was the mainstay of the side. Takes rather too long a run. Free bat, with a weak stroke on the leg stump. Safe field.

D. T. SUTTON.—A much improved bat, but at present too inconsistent. Is very much better on his leg stump and should get many runs next season. Moderate bowler, very fair field.

D. C. TAYLER.—A free scoring bat; quite good on the off side, but weak on the leg stump. Good, keen field.
