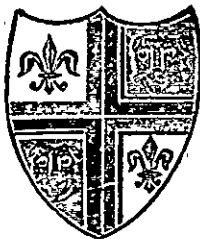

FOOTBALL.

The following old colours remain: V. C. Prince (captain), E. D. Drew, H. B. Spry, R. G. Innocent, G. E. Bowley. The usual Inter-School matches have been arranged, and we look forward to a successful season.

Cricket.

OWING to the War, fewer matches were played than is generally the case, and our card consisted of the usual Inter-School matches and a few club games, chiefly with military teams as opponents.

The School team was stronger in every department than last year; the batting and bowling were distinctly better, and the fielding was excellent. Never have we had so good a fielding side, and it was a pleasure to watch them both in matches and in practice games. D. T. Sutton and V. C. Prince were the most successful batsmen; the latter has the sounder defence, and the former the more strokes. D. C. Tayler made some useful scores, but is an indifferent starter, and J. B. Senior should be a good bat another year. G. Hemingway is a much better performer than his figures indicate, and in the last matches both R. G. Innocent and E. D. Drew shewed that they knew how to bat. In V. C. Prince and E. D. Drew the School had a good pair of bowlers, and it is a pity that they did not have more opportunity of testing their ability against stronger sides. J. B. Senior started well, but fell off latterly; and R. S. Payne, J. W. Kilpatrick and E. G. H. Maidman could generally be relied on to take a wicket when required. We could find no good wicket-keeper, but G. Hemingway stepped into the breach and did his best in a position for which he is not naturally suited. The batting prize was won by D. T. Sutton, and the bowling prize by V. C. Prince.

The "Under 14" team was an average one, it contained two outstanding cricketers in W. J. Hitch and J. W. Miles, two very useful ones in R. N. Tayler and A. G. Ensor, and three who should do better another year in H. T. Tayler, D. C. D. Ellerton and A. W. Sharp. The

batting was fair but uncertain, with the exception of Hitch, who made the first century recorded for the "Under 14" XI. The bowling was moderate with the exception of J. W. Miles, who is a very promising performer; he fell off during the last fortnight owing to "staleness," but in the early part of the season he bowled splendidly, not only in matches but also in club trial-games. The fielding was very fair; A. G. Ensor, R. N. Tayler and W. J. Hitch were the pick of the bunch, and we hope that in the last-named we shall soon have what we have long wanted, viz., a good School wicket-keeper. Owing to Mr. Minchin and Mr. Watts being in France, the coaching of this XI. devolved chiefly on Hemingway, Prince and Sutton, and they are to be heartily congratulated on the improvement their team showed as the season progressed.

Of Hemingway as Captain, we cannot speak too highly; he is probably the youngest and certainly one of the best we have ever had. He managed his bowling with excellent judgment, was always on the look-out for altering his field to suit the vagaries of various batsmen, and his help in preparing wickets in a season when we were short-handed was invaluable.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School; Bruton, away, May 29th, won.—

School batted first on a bumpy pitch, and wickets fell rapidly, 3 being down for 12 runs, and 6 for 17. We shaped very badly, the only batsman who played at all freely being D. C. Tayler (13). All the wickets were "clean bowled." Sexey's chances of winning looked very bright, but they put up a very much worse display than we did, the first four batsmen being unable to score; 8 wickets were down for 7 runs, and the whole side out for 12. E. D. Drew did the execution with the ball, obtaining 5 wickets for 3 runs, and he was ably supported by R. S. Payne—3 wickets for 5 runs. In School's second innings, D. T. Sutton batted very well, obtaining 29 runs out of a total of 65. Sexey's were again unable to do much with the bat, and when stumps were drawn had obtained 25 runs for 7 wickets, 5 being down for 9. J. B. Senior and D. T. Sutton each obtained 2 wickets for 3 runs, and E. G. Maidman 3 for 10.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Grammar School, home, June 5th, *won.*—School won the toss and opened with G. Hemingway and D. T. Sutton; the former was "missed" once, but both wickets fell at 8. Four wickets fell for 29, and the fifth raised the total to 42. Again came a bad patch, the seventh falling at 45, and the eighth wicket saw the total raised to 78. V. C. Prince obtained 26 by good back play, and D. Tayler quickly hit up 19, though twice missed. E. G. Maidman (19) also batted well. R. S. Payne bowled well for School, bagging 5 wickets for 13 runs, and J. B. Senior obtained 4 wickets for 9 runs. Eight of the Gillingham team fell to catches—a testimony to our fielding. In our second innings we obtained 49 runs for 6 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Lieut. Curtis's XI. (R.F.A.), home, June 12th, *won.*—For this match 12 men played on each side. Our opponents batted first, and 65 runs were on the board when the second wicket fell. However, the whole side fell for 108, Lieut. Giles (33) and Lieut. Alban (21) being the chief contributors. The School fielding was very good; E. D. Drew made an excellent c & b, and V. C. Prince's fine attempt at a c & b brought forth warm applause. V. C. Prince (5 for 35) and Mr. W. G. Tovey (3 for 14) were the chief executioners, the latter securing his three wickets in one over. School began well, and had already obtained 90 runs when 4 wickets were down. Dr. Tovey (76) was in excellent form, and D. C. Tayler (43 not out) hit out very freely, securing 7 boundaries. When stumps were drawn School had 186 runs for 8 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Tovey's XI., home, June 16th, *won.*—School quickly lost 2 wickets for 6 runs, then V. Prince (39), D. Tayler (33), R. G. Innocent (16), E. Drew (17), J. Senior (61), and G. Bowley (18) altered the score sheet considerably, the final total being 208. Dr. Tovey obtained 3 wickets, R. H. Baker and H. B. Spry 2 each, and Messrs. Williams, Dennis and Hall, 1 each. Dr. Tovey's XI. started badly, and 4 wickets quickly fell for 25 runs. However, Dr. Tovey soon altered matters, and showed us some excellent all-round cricket, obtaining 54, including 8 boundaries. School fielding was again very good, 6 catches being held. J. Senior (3 for 7 runs) and E. Drew (3 for 22) were the most effective bowlers.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, June 19th, won.—

Sexey's started, but were unable to do much with Prince's bowling, and 5 wickets fell for 36. Then J. W. Kilpatrick took up the bowling and secured 4 wickets for 5 runs—the whole side being out for 57. Senior and Drew also bowled well. School began very well with D. Sutton (30) and V. Prince (70—including eight 4's). Hemingway, Senior, Kilpatrick and R. Innocent all obtained useful scores. In a second innings Sexey's obtained 15 for 4 wickets—Payne (2 for 7) and Maidman (2 for 6).

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School, home, June 23rd,

drawn.—School started batting, and almost immediately lost Senior and D. Tayler. D. Sutton altered things somewhat, obtaining 70 not out—an excellent contribution—including 12 boundaries; he gave a sharp chance at 15. School "declared" at 120 for 5 wickets, as time was short. Wimborne had replied with 89 for 8 wickets when stumps were drawn. E. D. Drew bowled well (4 for 18).

S.G.S. v. Oxford & Bucks L.I. (7th Batt.), home, June

26th, won.—The Army XI. batted first, and chiefly through Lieut. Andrews (21) and Pte. Gilmartin (17), obtained 112 runs. Our chief bowlers were Dr. Tovey 4 for 38, and V. Prince 5 for 32. School started batting very well, and the century was passed before the first wicket fell, and our opponents' total was passed before the fall of the second. Dr. Tovey (40) and D. T. Sutton (71—with 10 boundaries) did practically all the scoring.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. A. Hutchinson's XI., home, June 30th,

lost.—Our opponents batted first, and chiefly through Rev. A. G. Robertson (21), G. T. Miller (26) and A. Jordan (21 not out), secured a total of 143. V. Prince bowled well, and obtained 5 wickets at a cost of 18 runs. With the exception of D. Sutton (24), School did not make much of a stand against the bowling of A. Norris and J. H. Staple; the former obtained 4 of our wickets clean bowled, and the latter 6. The Rev. C. A. Hutchinson's XI. went to the wickets again for a short while, and obtained 36 runs for 4 wickets. E. Drew was very effective with the ball (4 for 13).

S.G.S. v. Lieut. Curtis's XI., R.F.A., home, July 3rd, won.

—Out of a total of 99 obtained by the Gunners, Lieut. E. C. H. Alban obtained 32, and Driver Morgan 19. Dr. Tovey (3 for 18) and V. Prince (7 for 48) did all the work with the ball. Fielding generally was good, and D. C. Tayler took a very fine "country" catch. School did not start batting very well, 3 wickets being down for 30 runs. However, V. Prince and J. Senior altered the score considerably, the former obtaining 48 and the latter 44, by excellent cricket.

S.G.S. v. L. G. Prideaux' XI., home, July 7th, won.—

Naturally, on account of the War, we were unable to get together a full XI. of Old Shastonians, so the team consisted of some Old Boys, local players and Masters. School batted first, and 5 wickets were down for 48. Then R. Innocent and J. Senior came together, and the rate of scoring became extremely slow. E. Drew going in tenth made things more lively, and obtained 47 before being caught. L. F. Spinney obtained 6 wickets, J. Hall 2, and Mr. Williams 2. Prideaux's XI. did not make much of a stand against the bowling of V. Prince (5 for 13) and E. Drew (3 for 8). The match took place under very wretched weather conditions, several adjournments being necessary.

S.G.S. v. Parkstone School, home, July 10th, won.—

D. Sutton and V. Prince opened for School, and the total reached 5 short of 200 before the first wicket fell. Sutton gave an excellent batting display and obtained 113, including 13 boundaries; the only blemish was a "chance" at 50. Prince obtained 79, among which were nine 4's, before being caught. Our total was 256 for 5 wickets. Parkstone were very weak, and could only obtain 16 in reply (9 at the fall of the sixth wicket). Unfortunately for them they found Prince bowling his very best—keeping an excellent length and a slight off-break. He performed the "hat-trick" in his first over, and in all took 7 wickets for 9 runs, E. Drew taking 2 for 5. In a second venture Parkstone obtained 34 for the loss of 7 wickets. Payne (3 for 5 runs) was the best bowler.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Grammar School, away, July 24th, won.—

School's score, showing 2 wickets for 3 runs, did not look very promising, but D. C. Tayler and G. Hemingway "stopped the rot," the former obtaining a

vigorously-hit 40. before being run out, and the latter a well-played 29. Gillingham fell rapidly before Prince and Drew, 3 for 3 showing on the board, and then 6 for 16 and 7 for 20. Out of a total of 37 runs, 10 were through Prince being "no-balled." The last mentioned player secured 5 wickets for 6 runs, Drew 2 for 5, and Senior 2 for 3. Bowley fielded very well at point, and took 3 catches.

S.G.S. v. Rev. A. D. H. Allan's XI., Wimborne, away, July 27th, won.—It was a real bowler's wicket, as School soon found, the first two wickets falling for 9 runs. The whole side was only able to obtain 60 runs, of which 18 fell to G. Hemingway, and 15 to E. Drew. Wimborne fielded well, and catches accounted for six. Wimborne's reply proved very exciting, as their wickets fell at about the same rate as ours—8 being down for 51, two wickets to fall and only 10 runs wanted to win. However, the last two wickets fell without adding to the score. Dr. Tovey took the bulk of the wickets—7 for 19, and E. Drew took 3 for 6. In School's second innings runs came much more freely, Dr. Tovey obtaining 55 (nine 4's) and V. C. Prince 42 (including a 6) by some very good and interesting cricket.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, June 2nd, won.—The Choristers were unable to do anything with the bowling of J. Miles, who secured 7 wkts. (5 being in 2 overs) at a cost of only 9 runs. A. Sharp took the 3 remaining wickets (in one over) for 7 runs. J. Miles also proved to be the principal run-getter (21). No-one else gave him any support but R. Tayler (14). Choristers did very much better in the second innings, and chiefly through P. Swanton (36) and D. Parham (17) they totalled 99. School knocked off the runs required to win at a cost of two wickets.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Gillingham G.S. (Under 14), away, June 24th, won.—School easily mastered the bowling, and at the close had totalled 250 runs. J. Hitch hit out very freely and obtained 107 (not out), including nine 4's. He was well backed up by R. Tayler 40, and J. Miles 25. Gillingham replied with 46, J. Miles being the effective bowler—5 for 19, and G. Ensor 3 for 2 runs. Gillingham again visited the wickets and obtained 47, Miles this time bagging 5 wickets for 10 runs, and W. Radway 4 for 20.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Gillingham G.S. (Under 14), home, July 17th, *won.*—In this return fixture School batted first, and chiefly through A. Sharp (25), D. Ellerton (23), G. Kelson (24) and J. Hitch, obtained 157, of which the last mentioned player accounted for 54 by vigorous attack. Gillingham's reply was feeble, only one player reaching double figures. J. Miles (4 for 11), A. Sharp (3 for 17), and G. Ensor (2 for 6) shared the bowling honours.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

G. HEMINGWAY (Capt.)—Struck a bad patch to start with. Is a good bat with plenty of strokes, including a stylish late cut. With added height will do well. Has a splendid knowledge of the game, and proved himself to be an excellent captain.

V. C. PRINCE.—A good bowler, but hardly as fast as last year owing to a slight strain. Has much improved as a bat, and was the best defensive player on the side; his back play is admirable. Excellent field.

D. T. SUTTON.—Made more runs than anyone else on the side. Has several good strokes, and a much improved defence. Good field, but rather too fond of using only one hand. Did not improve as a bowler.

D. C. TAYLER.—Can hit very hard, especially on the off side, but is not careful enough in picking the right ball to hit. Excellent field, especially in the country.

E. D. DREW.—The most improved cricketer on the side. Bowled consistently well, and nearly always took wickets. Free-hitting bat, and has a safe pair of hands.

J. B. SENIOR.—Batted very well at times, but is inclined to hit across a straight ball. Bowled slow leg-breaks well in the early part of the season, but fell off latterly. Excellent field.

R. G. INNOCENT.—Improved very much in batting as the season advanced. Has a peculiar style of his own, but is a difficult batsman to get out. Fair field.

J. W. KILPATRICK.—Has a good forward stroke, but his back play is only moderate at present. A very fair bowler, who can be relied upon to keep a length. Good field.

G. E. BOWLEY.—Very keen cricketer, but hardly made as many runs as we anticipated. Is handicapped by lack of inches. Good point, where he made some very pretty catches.

E. G. H. MAIDMAN.—Has plenty of scoring strokes, but his back play is only moderate at present. A very fair bowler, especially when the wicket is slow. Good field, with an excellent return.

R. S. PAYNE.—Bowls a very good ball, but at present is erratic and bowls too many bad ones. Has a big reach, but his back play is weak. Fair field.

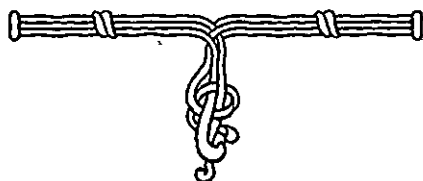
O.S. News.
