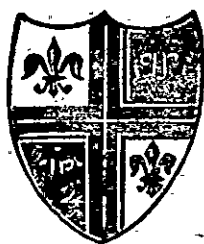

Cricket.

MISFORTUNE dogged the footsteps of our 1916 team. During the early part of the season the weather was very wet, and in June measles broke out and put an end to all Inter-School matches. In addition to this, J. B. Senior, one of our best bats, met with an accident which kept him out of the field for half the term. Taking all things into consideration we did as well as could be expected; the team was a very young one, and those members of it who are here in 1917 should do well. The batting shewed more promise than the bowling; Hemingway, Senior, Maidman and Bowley all did well at times, and Innocent and Ensor are full of promise. The bowling was very moderate; Maidman was the most successful, and Payne a good second; with the exception of these two, Sharp was the only one who ever looked like taking a wicket. The fielding was not at all bad, though it never reached the high standard set by last year's team. Senior and Ensor were both very good, and Bowley and Hemingway very reliable; while Maidman at times was good, and at times poor. A word of praise is due to Hitch for his wicket-keeping. The bat presented by Captain L. L. Welman to the best all-round cricketer has been awarded to E. G. H. Maidman.

The "Under 14" XI. was, like the School team, weak in bowling, but, on the whole, we are inclined to think it contained more budding cricketers than last year's team did. H. F. B. Brown was the most consistent bat, and H. T. Tayler, D. C. D. Ellerton and R. Drew all did well either in matches or trial games. H. J. Hughes is quite a promising left-hand bowler, and he, R. G. Scott and Hugh Brown should all be able to bowl well some day. The fielding improved very much as the season advanced; H. T. Tayler was the pick, but several of the team fielded very creditably.

Hemingway once more made a splendid captain; his judgment was rarely at fault, no work was too much trouble, and his keenness and enthusiasm for the game were invaluable. We offer him our very grateful thanks. Hemingway and Senior assisted Dr. Tovey in coaching the first club, and a special word of thanks is due to Mr. Williams, who spent many hours every week in coaching the most promising boys among the lower clubs.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, June 3rd, Won.—Sexey's batted first, and found the School fielding very good—five wickets falling to catches. The first three wickets fell very rapidly for 14 runs. J. B. Senior was the most effective bowler, taking 3 wickets for 6 runs. G. Maidman batted very well for School, his total of 71 being got by good, forceful batting. He was well supported by F. Innocent (22) and W. Hitch (19). The first three wickets fell quickly for 17 only. R. Payne and A. Sharp shared the bowling honours of Sexey's second innings.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Tovey's XII., home, June 7th, Lost.—It was agreed to play 12-a-side. Dr. Tovey got together a team of Old Boys and Masters. School batted first, and almost immediately lost 2 wickets for 3 runs. G. Maidman and G. Hemingway then got together, and runs came much more freely. No-one else on the side was able to contribute much, and the innings closed for 88. S. Burrow took 4 wickets for 17, and D. T. Sutton 2 for 6. The Old Boys found the School bowling not too difficult, G. Atkinson (17), D. T. Sutton (23) and D. C. Tayler (43) being the best scorers. Tayler batted very vigorously, and his score included one "six."

S.G.S. v. London Rifle Brigade, home, June 10th, Lost.—A 12 a-side match. School opened with Dr. Tovey and G. Hemingway, but the latter was bowled when only 9 runs had been scored. J. B. Senior (18), however, was ably backed up by Dr. Tovey who, by a fine all-round display, scored 47 runs before being bowled. Mr. Ramshaw (30) and A. G. Ensor (26 not out) were the only other batsmen on the School side to score double figures. The Rifles found the School fielding good, their first five batsmen falling to catches. Three wickets fell for 35, but 74 appeared before the fall of the fourth. Capt. Algar was the chief scorer, his 62 containing 12 boundaries. The eighth and ninth wickets made a very useful stand. Dr. Tovey took the most wickets (5 for 62); R. Payne (2 for 38) and J. B. Senior (2 for 20) were the other successful bowlers.

S.G.S. v. Parkstone Secondary School, home, June 14th, Won.—A fine second wicket stand was made by G. Bowley and G. Maidman; the former was unbeaten

when the innings was declared closed, the score reading 185 for 5 wickets. Parkstone found Maidman's bowling much too good; he captured 4 wickets for 19 runs. A. W. Sharp took 2 wickets for 1 run. School fielding was good, and the catches were held.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. A. Hutchinson's XI., home, June 28th, *Won*.—School opened well with Dr. Tovey (40) and G. Hemingway (30), and 60 was registered for the fall of the first wicket. R. Payne also secured a very useful 29 by forcing strokes, during which he was ably backed up by F. Innocent (20 not out). A. J. Prince bowled very well (4 for 34), capturing the three most dangerous batsmen. Our opponents found the bowling of R. Payne (5 for 25) and G. Maidman (4 for 10) too good for them, the Rev. R. Rees being the only batsman to make an effective score. A second innings by Rev. Hutchinson's XI. produced much better results, Revs. Rees and Robertson and Captain Henshaw all giving a good batting display. Mr. Williams took 5 wickets for 38. School fielding, on the whole, was only moderate, in spite of the excellent example set by Dr. Tovey, who took 3 catches—one a magnificent snap at square leg.

S.G.S. v. Engineers, Royal Naval Division, home, July 1st, *Lost*.—With the exception of Dr. Tovey, with a very well-obtained 43, School gave a very bad batting display, the bowling of Sapper Elms being much too good. Our opponents appeared to find run-getting much easier, and passed our total for the loss of 5 wickets. Mr. Williams (2 for 8 runs) had the best bowling analysis.

S.G.S. v. Queen Victoria's Rifles, home, July 11th, *Lost*.—School bowled very well at the start, the fall of the first seven wickets being as follows: 1 for 7, 2 for 15, 3 for 18, 4 for 25, 5 for 28, 6 for 31, 7 for 38. Maidman (6 for 34) and Payne (3 for 31) bowled the most successfully. An "eleventh-hour" stand saved the game for the Rifles, combined with a feeble display by School, G. Hemingway (27) being the only successful batsman.

S.G.S. v. London Rifle Brigade, home, July 15th, *Lost*.—Twelve-a-side were played. The Rifles batted first, and the first three wickets fell rapidly to Payne and Maidman. The score was quickly changed when Lieut. Sedgwick and Rifleman Jenner got together, and 200

was registered at the fall of the fifth wicket. Rifleman Jennier was not dismissed until he had obtained his century, which included seventeen boundaries, one being a magnificent drive for six. Maidman bowled well—4 for 40; he also took two very good catches. Senior fielded very well. The latter was also the most effective batsman with 45.

"UNDER 14" MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, June 14th, Lost.—School batted well in the first innings, especially H. Tayler (28) and D. Ellerton (20). H. Brown bowled well, and kept a good length throughout; he obtained 5 wickets at a cost of 22 runs. Ellerton got 4 for 10. In the second innings School did not do quite so well, though H. Brown obtained 14, including three good boundary hits. The innings was declared at 51 for 6 wickets, leaving the Choristers just over 100 to get in 50 minutes. These were secured just on time by Sankey (81) and Prince (25) by very vigorous use of the "long handle." The fielding of the School team was quite good.

S.G.S. v. Gillingham Grammar School (Under 14), home, June 24th, Won.—Gillingham put up a very feeble defence against the bowling of G. Kelson and J. Hughes. The former took 5 wickets for 3 runs, and Hughes 2 for 2. The School team was equally successful with the bat, and the first wicket—R. Drew (40) and H. Tayler (44)—soon hoisted the century. They were well supported by G. C. Kelson (29).

S.G.S. v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, home, July 5th, Lost.—Sankey was the most successful batsman, securing 33 out of a total of 80. H. Brown (2 for 10) and J. Hughes (4 for 20) were very successful with the ball. School batting was not good by any means, and the small total of 12 appeared on the board for the loss of 7 wickets. H. Brown, going in fifth, was unbeaten at the finish with a well-earned 22. G. Read (15) was the next best scorer. Sankey and Prince again carried off the chief batting honours in the second innings. Hughes bowled well (5 for 23). School had a hard fight to top the total, H. Brown making the best effort. No-one was able to stay long, except Brown and Scott, before the bowling of Prince and Mathews.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit. Only ten Colours were awarded).

G. HEMINGWAY (Captain).—A much improved bat; would have made many more runs if the wickets had been faster. Is especially strong on the "off" side, and has a delightful late cut. Good judge of a run, and a safe field. Admirable captain.

J. B. SENIOR.—A good forcing bat, with much improved defence. Excellent country field, but fell off in bowling. An unfortunate accident kept him out of several matches and games.

G. E. BOWLEY.—Much improved bat, but rather a poor starter. Has a good defence, but lacks power. Good field at point.

E. G. H. MAIDMAN.—A very useful bat, with plenty of strokes and a much improved defence. Very fair bowler, with a quick "whip-back" when the wicket gave him any help. An uncertain field.

R. S. PAYNE.—Kept a better length than last year, but is still too erratic. His back play was too weak to make many runs. Fair field.

A. G. ENSOR.—A very keen and promising cricketer; his batting shewed much improvement, and his fielding was excellent. Bowling disappointing.

W. J. HITCH.—Has entirely altered his style of batting; his defence is now good, but he is too slow. Promising wicket-keeper; must learn to get across on the leg side.

F. C. INNOCENT.—Made more runs than we expected him to. Has plenty of scoring strokes, and an improved defence. Fielding moderate at present.

A. W. SHARP.—A cricketer in the making. A promising bowler and bat, but at present lacks experience. Very fair field.

J. W. MILES.—Did not fulfil expectations. Was too fond of playing back to "half-volleys." Fell off in bowling. Very fair field.

J. W. Taylor was at School from September, 1893, to August, 1901. He passed the Cambridge Preliminary and Junior Exams., and also the London Matriculation. On leaving School he entered Nottingham University and obtained the London B.Sc. degree in Dec., 1904.

AGED 24 YEARS.

Tunnington was at School from January, 1905, to December, 1908. He passed the Cambridge Junior Locals in July, 1907 (11. Class Honours, distinguished and top boy in England in Physical Geography), the Cambridge Senior Locals, July, 1908, the Preliminary Exam. for Institute of Chartered Accountants, December, 1908. He was Head Prefect from September, 1907, in the Cricket XI's of 1906, 1907 and 1908 (Captain), and in the Football XI's of 1906, 1907, and 1908. After leaving School he was articled to a Liverpool firm of Chartered Accountants, and passed his final examination shortly before war broke out.

We deeply regret to have to record the deaths of the three old boys above mentioned, and we offer our deepest sympathy to their sorrowing parents and relatives. They obeyed the call of duty like men, and offered their services to their country on the outbreak of War.

The brothers Taylor were the nephews of our former Head Master, Mr. Pryce Taylor. Four of them, all sons of Mr. John W. Taylor, of Loughborough, were on active service, and in addition to the two mentioned above, a third ("Pryce") has since received a bullet wound in the left wrist, and is now in an English Hospital. Arnold Taylor was killed by a heavy shell which burst close to him; he had just come back to the trench after helping to bring in the wounded. A fellow-officer, in a letter to his father, says: "he was the most conscientious subaltern in the company, and his loss will be sadly felt by all of us." Arnold, with his brother Pryce, last visited the School, Whitsun, 1915.

N. J. Tunnington was an old boy who kept very closely in touch with the School after he left. While here he was good at work and games, straight as a die, and a general favourite with everybody. He was a first class shot, and was "sniper" to his platoon. His commanding officer speaks of him as "a fine soldier, trustworthy to the utmost degree, and of great personal charm and character." He last visited the School on October 30th, 1915, shortly before going out to France.

J. E. P. Strange, we regret to hear, has been wounded in France, and is now in a Bristol Hospital.

R. Charlton has obtained a commission in the Dorset Regiment, after serving in India with the 6th Haris.

As we go to press we hear that Roy Cox has been wounded in France.
