Cricket.

THE team of 1917 compared unfavourably with those of the last few years. Only four old colours remained, and of these W. J. Hitch, owing to an unfortunate accident, was unable to play in any of the matches. Hitch's absence had a bad effect on the team, as he was our best bat and a good wicket-keeper. The team, as a whole, suffered from lack of experience, and this was especially noticeable in the batting, which was lamentably weak. Still, it is only fair to say that the team showed great keenness, and did their utmost to profit by coaching, and some of them should do quite well another season. W. K. Sankey was our best bat, and A. J. Ensor was not far behind him, but neither of them could compare with the best bats of previous seasons; of the rest, R. N. Tayler and L. W. Toomer showed most promise. A. J. Prince was a long way our best bowler, while Smith and Sharp shewed promise. The fielding was very creditable all the season; A. G. Ensor was probably the pick, but several of the others were not far behind him. Sankey took Hitch's place behind the "sticks," and did his best in a strange position. Ensor had a difficult side to captain, but did his work very creditably; he had a lot to learn, and learnt it very quickly. Sankey was adjudged winner of the "Johnson" Cup for batting, and Prince won a bat kindly presented by Rev. C. A. Hutchinson for the best bowler. The Club Matches with various teams from Fovant and Blandford proved a very pleasant feature of the term; they generally managed to beat us, but we scored one very creditable win over a strong Australian eleven. We also managed to defeat two teams brought by our old friend, Rev. C. A. Hutchinson, and a team got together by Rev. C. O. Rockett.

The "Under 14" XI. were only able to play two matches, but their practice games showed them to be a very useful team; certainly above the average in batting, but rather uncertain in the field. H. E. Mitchell, Hugh Brown and R. Drew were all good bats, and S. C. Hayles made a great improvement as the season advanced; Hugh Brown and R. G. Scott bowled well in both matches. W. H. Wylie proved himself the most promising wicket-keeper we have had for some time, and A. J. Baxter did some very good work at "point."

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. R.N.D. (Blandford), home, May 26th, Lost.—

Our opponents batted first, and topped the century chiefly through the efforts of Petty Officer Gregory and Able Seaman Stevenson. The latter obtained 48 in good style, but was missed at the wicket before he had scored many runs. School fielding was quite good, especially the ground work of R. N. Tayler and L. W. Toomer. Dr. Tovey carried off the bowling honours (6 wickets for 35), two of his successive overs producing 5 wickets for 2 runs. School opened badly, Sankey being dismissed without scoring, and Dr. Tovey being unfortunate in a short run. J. B. Senior (31) and Mr. Ramshaw (24) were the principal scorers for School. Ensor looked like staying at first, but was bowled when he had obtained 12 runs.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, away, June 2nd, Lost.—

The ground was very much in favour of the bowlers, following a thunderstorm. School started, but wickets fell very fast to Mackie (eight, including hat trick), and Burgess also bowled very well. We secured 7 "ducks," and although Ensor kept up his "end" almost through the innings, yet he was unable to secure many runs. Sexey's did not fare much better with the exception of Burgess, who obtained 17 runs before being caught by T. D. Osborne. The game grew quite exciting as Sexey's had eight wickets down for 14 runs. At this point Sharp had a good chance of running the 9th out, but threw wide. Prince and Sharp took the wickets.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. O. Rockett's XI., home, June 6th, Won.—

School started very well and Dr. Tovey and W. K. Sankey found runs come easily until the former was run out. A. G. Ensor (23) and Mr. Ramshaw (33) backed them up well, if slowly. Sharp was dismissed by an excellent catch taken by Rev. Rockett. G. Atkinson was splendid at the wicket, and the same applies to the fielding of Rev. C. A. Hutchinson at point. School bowling was not effective at first, and Atkinson and Rev. Hutchinson had a long stand, the score being 75 at the fall of the second wicket. The last 8 wickets fell for 4 runs to A. Prince and Dr. Tovey. A. J. Prince took a very good running catch, and G. N. Rawlings also secured one at mid-on. W. K. Sankey did well behind the wicket and secured 2 catches.

S.G.S. v. R.E. (Blandford), home June 9th, *Lost*.—Our opponents found run-getting fairly easy, the brunt of the bowling falling on Dr. Tovey and A. J. Prince. Sixty-one runs were registered before the first wicket fell. School found runs very hard to get, as the bowling and fielding were the best we had yet met. Dr. Tovey was the only one to face the bowling successfully, his sole support coming from G. Ensor. R. N. Tayler was dismissed by a magnificent catch at point.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Tovey's XI., home, June 13th, *Lost*.—School batted moderately well to the bowling of J. B. Senior and R. G. Mitchell, Sankey (15, including 3 boundaries) being the chief run-getter. Prince bowled well and tried hard to keep the runs down, but the School total was passed at the fall of the 9th wicket. Rev. Hutchinson (19) and G. Clarke (19) were the chief scorers. School had obtained in the second innings the same score—82—for 6 wickets, as in the first innings, when stumps were drawn:

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, June 16th, *Won*.—Mackie and Burgess again bowled well for Sexey's, and although School did not repeat the débacle of the first meeting, yet only W. K. Sankey and R. N. Tayler (19 each) did anything towards the score. Sexey's found runs just as hard to get, and lost 3 wickets for 13 runs, and after a sharp tussle the last man fell when 4 runs were required to win. A. W. Sharp and J. Miles were the best with the ball (3 for 12 runs and 3 for 2 respectively). Fielding was good, and five catches taken.

S.G.S. Past v. Present, home, June 20th, *Lost*.—A very good team of Old Shastonians assembled for this match, under the captaincy of the popular skipper of last year—G. Hemingway, and some fine cricket resulted. There were twelve players on each side. S. Burrow (25) and J. T. Hall (59) batted with all their former style and force. The score of the latter included 7 boundaries. D. C. Tayler showed us that he can still hit as lustily as ever, and his short and merry innings of 22 included 3 fours and a six. School fielded well, and Sankey was smart behind the stumps. School did not bat well to the bowling of Burrow and Hall, and 7 wickets fell for 32 runs. G. N. Rawlings (19 not out) made the best stand, receiving fair support

from L. W. Toomer. J. B. Senior (3 for 4 runs), J. Hall (4 for 36) and S. Burrow (2 for 16) shared the bowling. A second innings by the Old Boys saw some fine hitting by D. C. Tayler (57, including 9 boundaries).

S.G.S. v. Australian Pioneer Battalion, home, June 23rd, *Won*.—School lost Hemingway and Ensor for a total of 15, but Dr. Tovey played through most of the innings, and, although careful, showed complete mastery of the bowling. He was well supported by Sankey, Senior and J. Miles, in spite of the wonderful fielding of the Australians—probably the finest the School ground has ever witnessed. Our opponents were not nearly so good with the bat, and lost 6 wickets for 44 runs. G. Ensor took a very fine "country" catch. Mr. Williams (5 for 11 runs) did best with the ball.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. A. Hutchinson's XI., home, June 27th, *Won*.—Our opponents opened badly to the bowling of Mr. Williams, and 4 wickets fell for 29 runs. Rev. Saul and Rev. Hutchinson made a stand, and the score board soon changed to 6 for 70. Dr. Tovey was very successful with the ball in the latter half of the innings. School fielded well, and fine "country" catches were taken by Senior and Ensor. School's reply confined itself practically to the first wicket (Dr. Tovey 26 and W. Sankey 34). The first four wickets added 90 out of a total of 112. In the second innings Rev. Hutchinson's XI. obtained 86 for 8 wickets, chiefly through G. Atkinson, who carried his bat for 41. School did not very successfully reply; Dr. Tovey played throughout, and was unbeaten when stumps were drawn.

S.G.S. v. R.N.D., Blandford, home, June 30th, *Lost*.—A bowlers wicket, which was taken full advantage of by Luckhurst—a Yorks. County left arm bowler, who secured 8 victims. The Naval men did not at first find runs easy to get; and lost 5 wickets for 9 runs, chiefly through A. J. Prince. The next pair of batsmen absolutely mastered the bowling and put on over 100 runs before the innings was declared closed. School's second attempt was more successful, chiefly through Mr. Minchin (29).

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School, away, July 4th, *Won*.—R. N. Tayler was our chief run-getter, although he offered two easy chances, but the Wimborne fielders

were very weak. T. D. Osborne (not out 13) was the next best scorer. Wimborne's batting was also feeble apart from Harris (16). Toomer caught four very fair catches. The bowling was the best feature on both sides, especially that of Prince (6 wickets for 6 runs).

S.G.S. v. R.E., Blandford, home, July 7th, *Lost*.—The Engineers batted fairly well, and Prince did most execution with the ball (5 for 21). School's reply was poor, and we found runs hard to get off the excellent bowling of Nightingale, who took 9 wickets. The second innings of the R.E.'s was not so productive of runs, 4 wickets falling for 10 runs, and 8 for 34. A. J. Prince obtained an excellent "c and b." School lost 3 wickets before stumps were drawn. Dr. Tovey is to be heartily congratulated on playing through the whole match without being beaten.

S.G.S. v. Rev. Hutchinson's XI., home, July 24th, *Won*.—In the first innings Mr. Williams was very successful with the ball, taking 5 wickets for 13, and the School fielding throughout was excellent, Ensor taking two fine "country" catches, and good ones being secured by Dr. Tovey and A. J. Prince. R. N. Tayler fielded excellently at mid-off. Dr. Tovey again did a very fine performance in carrying his bat through the first innings for 64; the rest of the side showed up very badly, getting under 30 amongst them. Our opponents started the second venture badly, but recovered after 4 wickets had fallen, and were finally dismissed by Mr. Williams and A. J. Prince for 87. School lost 5 wkts. before time was called.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, July 4th, *Won*.—School found the bowling very easy on the whole, and H. E. Mitchell was not beaten until he had obtained the excellent score of 60 (including a 5 and six 4's). R. Drew and S. Hayles were the next best scorers. School "declared" at the fall of the ninth wicket. The Choristers made a very feeble reply to our bowling; R. Scott got 4 wickets for 1 run, and H. B. Brown 6 for 10. School fielded well, many catches being taken. A second innings by Salisbury produced more runs, but these fell chiefly to one batsman—Roffe, who caused the score to jump from 6 for 11 to 8 for 42. A. H. Brown, J. Brown and Scott shared the bowling honours.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, home, July 11th, *Won.*—Runs fell to H. Brown, J. Brown and H. Mitchell. The Choristers' reply was again very poor, R. Scott and H. Brown dismissing them easily for 12 runs. However, they put up a much better fight in the second innings, obtaining the more respectable total of 60, Roffe, Swanton and Garstang being the best run-getters. At the close of play School had obtained 22 for 4 wickets, chiefly through S. C. Hayles (18 not out). J. Brown and H. Mitchell bowled well during the Choristers' second innings.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

A. G. ENSOR (Captain).—A forcing bat, with a weak shot on his leg stump. Has the makings of a bowler, but at present is too erratic in length. Excellent country field. Captained the side with good judgment.

A. W. SHARP.—Did not make the improvement hoped for. Keeps a good length outside the "off" stump, but his bowling lacks skill. Moderate bat. Fair field.

J. W. MILES.—Started batting well in practice games, but did poorly in matches. Bowled fairly well at times. Moderate field.

W. K. SANKEY.—A promising bat; has good off-side strokes, but is inclined to pull his shoulder round to a straight ball. Good field anywhere. Kept wicket creditably.

A. J. PRINCE.—A promising natural fast bowler, gets up quickly off the pitch; at present lacks experience. Poor bat, good field.

R. N. TAYLER.—Improved considerably in batting as the season advanced; has plenty of scoring strokes, and with luck would have made many more runs. Very fair field.

L. W. TOOMER.—Worked very hard all the season. His defence improved very much, and we hope for lots of runs from him next season. Made some good catches at point.

R. W. SMITH.—A natural left-handed bowler with a nice easy action. Would be a better bowler if he knew more about batting. Poor bat, uncertain field.

G. N. RAWLINGS.—A much improved bat with a style of his own. Has plenty of confidence. Fair field. Bowls "lobs" occasionally.

T. D. OBOURNE.—Had a disappointing season. Is distinctly promising, and often looked like making runs, but did not do so until the last School match.. Good field.

H. T. TAYLER.—A cricketer in the making. Good field and promising bat, rather weak on leg stump. Will do well in time.

He became Head Prefect, January, 1913. He was a member of the 1911, 1912 and 1913 Football teams, and of the 1912 and 1913 Cricket teams. When War broke out he was farming with his father.

We deeply regret the loss of three such prominent old boys, and the School is indeed the sadder and the poorer for their loss. They were three splendid fellows of sterling character, and were all good sportsmen.

Harry Robins was holding a bombing post when a large piece of shell struck him in the small of the back and injured his spine.

Willie Jeffery was wounded in the eye and sent over to a hospital at Chelsea. For a time he made splendid progress, but had a relapse and died suddenly.

Details of Jim Tayler's death have not yet been received.
