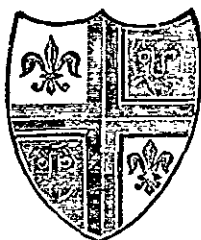

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Editorial.

WE have started another School year with largely increased numbers, and our roll call now contains 167 names—91 Boarders and 76 Day Boys. This is the first time in the history of the School that we have had over 150 boys, and it is now impossible to accommodate more in our present buildings. We were reluctantly compelled to refuse several boys this term, and there are now no vacancies till after Easter.

At the conclusion of last term, 33 members of our Cadet Corps volunteered to form a Harvest squad. Full particulars of our experiences are recorded elsewhere, from which it will be inferred that our Camp was a great success, and we should like to take this opportunity of offering our hearty thanks to the many kind friends we made at Drewsteignton, for the numerous kindnesses they one and all showed us. It was while we were there that the news came through that our O.C. had been gazetted "Captain," and Dr. Tovey, on behalf of himself and the Corps, took the opportunity of congratulating Captain Ramshaw on his well-deserved promotion, and suitably thanked him for the splendid work he had done for the Corps since its inception.

With profound regret we record elsewhere the deaths of C. M. Hall, V. C. Prince and G. B. Taylor, in action, on the Western Front. To their respective families we offer our heartfelt sympathy, and can assure them that we, too, feel their loss very deeply.

We would call our readers' attention to Dr. Tovey's letter, which appears on another page, and we feel sure that his idea of a War Memorial will commend itself to every boy, past or present. Let us see to it that the Memorial is one worthy of the occasion.

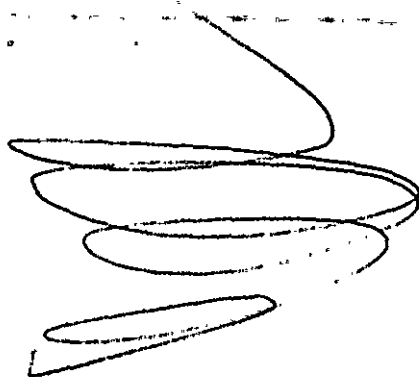
I have always remembered the name of Pellew and even his initials. Now I can hardly remember my own name !

Cricket.

WE are delighted to record a welcome improvement in last term's cricket, and the records of the season compare favourably with those of the last good team we had—that of 1915. The better the team against them, the better they played, and it was against moderate sides that they did worst. The fixture-list included two matches against Milton Abbas School, and we were delighted to resume games with them once more. Nearly all the members of the side were capable of making runs; W. K. Sankey and L. W. Toomer were our best batsmen, and were distinctly above the average of recent years. T. D. Osborne and J. W. Miles both did well on occasions, and W. H. Wylie, J. B. Brown and R. Drew are full of promise. A. J. Prince was a long way our best bowler, and took twice as many wickets as anyone else; he bowled practically at one end all the season, and very naturally shewed signs of "staleness" in the last few matches. H. J. Hughes has a nice delivery, and took several wickets, but lacks "head-work," while J. R. B. Pape, J. W. Miles and T. D. Osborne were all disappointing in matches, particularly the first-named. The fielding was good, particularly in practice games, but it failed once or twice in matches. T. H. Tayler did excellent work in the country, and T. D. Osborne was very good at extra-cover. W. H. Wylie proved a splendid wicket-keeper, the best we have had for years. The chief weakness observable was that very few of the team had a good "return," and the bowler and wicket-keeper suffered accordingly. J. W. Miles captained his team quite creditably, and worked hard to make the School cricket the success it was. During his absence for three weeks, W. K. Sankey proved an admirable deputy. The "Johnson" Batting Cup was eventually won by W. K. Sankey, although at one time it looked as if L. W. Toomer would run him close. A bat very kindly presented by Rev. C. A. Hutchinson for the best performance of the season, has been awarded to W. H. Wylie.

The "Under 14" XI. could only play two matches, and they won both of them quite comfortably. They proved themselves the best all-round batting side we have had for several seasons. The captain (H. F. B. Brown) was undoubtedly the pick, but H. E. Mitchell, D. L. Welman, J. E. Melsome, E. M. G. Perrin and F. G. Hounsell should all make their mark in School cricket in

the near future. The bowlers were only moderate; Hugh Brown was a long way the best, but of the rest it can only be said that they sometimes took wickets. The fielding, on the whole, was very fair without ever being brilliant.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. O. Rockett's XI., home, May 20th, *Won.*—Our opponents batted first, and although the first wicket fell for 1 run, 85 were scored before the fourth batsman was out. The Rev. C. A. Hutchinson was in good form, and easily top scorer (41) for the side. Pape had the best result with the ball, obtaining 5 wickets for 32. A fine display of wicket-keeping was given by Wylie, who stumped three of the opposing side. School started badly, but Sankey, by very good cricket, obtained the excellent score of 93, including 12 boundaries. Miles, Prince, Wylie, and H. J. Hughes were the only other batsmen to show any defence.

S.G.S. v. 5th Australian Training Battalion, Fovant, home, May 25th, *Won.*—With the exception of the first wicket, our opponents found Dr. Tovey's bowling too good for them (8 wickets for 35 runs). Wylie was again good behind the wicket, securing three victims. Dr. Tovey and T. H. Tayler were our best batsmen, and J. W. Miles backed them up well.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, away, June 1st, *Won.*—School, as in former years, gave a very feeble display of batting, and the only batsman who hit out with any confidence was R. Drew. The wicket was dry and somewhat "fiery," and Sexey's bowling and fielding were very good. When the score read 4 for 17 our position looked hopeless. Sexey's, however, were quite unable to score off Prince and H. J. Hughes, and they practically averaged one run per wicket. Prince got 3 wickets for 5 runs, and Hughes 4 for 5. With the exception of two men run out, the rest were all bowled. Pape, who went on to bowl *vice* Hughes, obtained 3 wickets at a cost of 2 runs only.

S.G.S. v. Milton Abbas School, Blandford, away, June 5th, *Won.*—Toomer lost his wicket right at the start, but Miles and Sankey made a very good stand, and 50 was registered before they were parted. T. D. Osborne was the next most successful batsman. Milton Abbas started badly, 3 wickets being down for 14 runs. Their third and fourth wickets were the only ones to offer any resistance to the bowling of Hughes and Pape.

S.G.S. v. Rev. C. A. Hutchinson's XI., home, June 12th, *Won.*—Our first wicket made a fine stand, and by excellent batting Sankey and Toomer put on 72 before being separated. Wylie was the only other batsman who made a good score. For our opponents, Rev. Hutchinson made an excellent stand; going in "first wicket," he was unbeaten at the close of the game. The rest of the side found Prince's bowling somewhat deadly (6 for 30, including 3 wickets in 4 balls). School fielding was poor, and both Osborne and Tayler dropped catches which should have been held.

S.G.S. v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, June 15th, *Won.*—The early batsmen started badly, 3 wickets falling for 15 runs. T. D. Osborne and J. B. Brown came to the rescue, and a very good stand resulted. The rest of the side made a very poor display. Sexey's found Prince's bowling too good for them, and the scoring was very low until the sixth batsman—Harrison—set about scoring, obtaining 39 before being bowled. Pape bowled well, and Sankey made a fine catch at point off Prince. Hughes missed a very easy catch, with the result that the batsman secured a useful 25. Tayler also dropped a "sitter." Hughes secured a smart catch in the "slips" later.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Ensor's XI., home, June 22nd, *Won.*—School batted first, and runs came steadily, 91 being hoisted up for 3 wickets. Mr. W. G. Tovey was in excellent form, and treated us to a fine batting display, scoring rapidly all round the wicket; his total of 138 included 17 boundaries. Our opponents found Mr. Williams' bowling difficult, and only two reached double figures, half the side being out for 45 runs. A "follow-on" produced practically the same result.

S.G.S. v. An Old Shastonian XI., home, June 26th, *Lost.*—Very few Old Boys were available, but a good "scratch" XI. was gathered together. School opened, and quickly lost 3 wickets for 23 runs. L. W. Toomer, however, after giving a chance, settled down to score steadily, and obtained 80 (including 9 fours) before falling a victim to Mr. Williams. J. B. Brown was the only other batsman to obtain double figures. Seven wickets fell to Mr. Williams. G. E. Atkinson (o.s.) captained the opposing XI., and he and S. Burrow defied the bowling for quite a long time, both eventually falling to catches off H. J. Hughes. The School total of 146 was passed before the fall of the fifth wicket. The rest of the O.S.'s

could only carry the score to 187. H. J. Hughes obtained 4 wickets for 7 runs. Fielding was moderate, R. Drew being noticeable for dropped catches.

S.G.S. v. 4th Australian Command Depot, home, June 29th, *Won*.—A fine first-wicket stand by Dr. and Mr. W. G. Tovey produced over 100 runs. The great feature of the match was the wicket-keeping of Private Webster (of International fame). Wylie, for us, proved a good understudy, and "kept" really well, dismissing three behind the wickets. Dr. Tovey and Mr. W. G. Tovey shared the bowling honours. School fielding was very good, especially Sankey (catching and ground work) and Toomer in the slips.

S.G.S. v. 9th Australian Training Battalion, Fovant, home, July 6th, *Won*.—Dr. Tovey, Toomer and Miles were the only batsmen who could successfully face the bowling. Five "ducks" in succession show the efforts of most of the others. The Australians put up a good fight against the bowling of Mr. Williams and Prince, but the last wicket fell to the last ball of the match, "last over" having been called. Good catches were made by Dr. Tovey (3), Tayler and T. Osborne.

S.G.S. v. Milton Abbas Grammar School, home, July 13th, *Won*.—School opened very badly, losing 3 wickets for 21 runs. Things still went badly, and when No. 8 on the batting list fell, the score board only shewed 48 runs. However, the ninth wicket altered matters slightly, J. Pape hitting out vigorously. For Milton Abbas, Fookes and Gifford bowled well. Our opponents found runs just as hard to get, and from the bowling of Prince and Hughes they could only secure 39 for 7 wickets, and were all dismissed for 55. School fielding was good, and seven catches taken, Sankey at point being the "star."

S.G.S. v. Capt. Baker's R.E. (Fovant) XI., home, July 20th, *Won*.—School opened very well with Dr. Tovey (59) and W. K. Sankey (38). The century was passed just as the third wicket fell; the next five wickets could only add 20 runs. Mr. Williams (20 not out) and T. Osborne (16 not out) made things more lively. The R.E.'s put up a very feeble defence against Prince (5 wickets for 6 runs) and Mr. Williams (3 for 3), and the whole side could not muster 20 runs. It was essentially a bowlers' day, and the wicket was very wet.

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School, home, July 22nd, *Drawn*.—Our first wicket fell for 7 runs, but Miles and Sankey, and afterwards T. Osborne, made a great difference to the score, with the result that "100" was hoisted before the fall of the fifth wicket. School "declared" at 7 wickets, and Wimborne found H. J. Hughes bowling well at one end, and Prince at the other. The first 3 wickets fell for 17 runs only, and when "time" was called, 8 wickets were down for 77 runs. D. Foyle was the batsman responsible for the good recovery.

S.G.S. v. Dr. Ensor's XI., home, July 23rd, *Lost*. (12-a-side.)—A very wet morning caused the pitch to get very muddy and slow. School opened, but almost immediately lost 2 wickets for 9 runs. Sankey was the only batsman to help himself to double figures, and the whole dozen batsmen could not collect 50 runs. Dr. Ensor's side gave us a fine display of fielding. School fielding on the other hand was extremely poor, and numerous easy catches were dropped. T. D. Osborne was the one bright exception, taking two splendid "country" catches off Dr. Tovey's bowling. Our total was passed at the fall of the fifth wicket.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury.—This match was played on June 19th, at Salisbury, and resulted in a win for the School by 50 runs. The chief scorers in the first innings were Mitchell (44), Melsome (31) and Perrin (24). In the second innings H. Brown (75 not out), Hounsell (49) and Welman (22) shewed good cricket. H. Brown took 5 wickets for 21, and Harris 2 for 23.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury.—The return match was played at home on July 10th, and resulted in a win for the School by 111 runs. The batting of our boys was very consistent, as most of them made a fair number of runs. The chief scorers were H. Brown (45), Welman (34), Melsome (18) and Chandler (17 not out). In the second innings Perrin played a good innings with 28 (not out); Mitchell made 14. The best bowling was done by H. Brown (6 for 11) and Harris (2 for 21).

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

- J. W. MILES (Captain).—A good forcing bat, especially on the "off" side. Against slow bowling was the best bat in the team, but was not good against fast bowling. Keeps a good length, but his bowling lacks guile. Good field. Made a very keen captain.
- W. K. SANKEY.—Batted well throughout the season; is still rather inclined to pull his left shoulder round to a ball on the leg stump. Has some beautiful strokes on the off side. Good field, made some capital catches at point.
- A. J. PRINCE.—Bowled well throughout the term; was faster, and kept a more reliable length than last year. Is learning to bowl a slower ball with effect. Hits hard in his own style, but lacks defence. Very good field.
- L. W. TOOMER.—The most improved bat on the side. Has some splendid forcing strokes, and with experience should make a fine player. Is not good on slow wickets at present. Good field.
- T. D. OBORNE.—Has much improved his defence, and should make a lot of runs next year; at present lacks punishing power. Moderate slow bowler. Very good field anywhere.
- T. H. TAYLER.—Started well, but fell off latterly in batting. Has a very weak stroke on his leg stump. Capital country field.
- W. H. WYLIE.—The "find" of the season. Kept wicket admirably throughout, and stands up to all kinds of bowling. Has a promising defence, and will make a good batsman some day.
- J. R. B. PAPE.—Did not take as many wickets as he should have done. Must learn to vary his pace and to avoid bowling on the leg side. Hits hard, but lacks defence. Good field.
- J. B. BROWN.—Improved very much as the season advanced, and will some day make lots of runs. Once or twice did well when most of the team failed. Much improved field.
- H. J. HUGHES.—Bowls a difficult ball, but also too many loose ones. Must learn to study a batsman's weakness. Moderate bat, very fair field.
- R. DREW.—Very fair bat, did not make as many runs as he was worth. Should do better another year. Must improve his "catching."

School Harvest Camp.

(By One of the Party).

LAST May, the bigger boys of our Cadet Corps volunteered to work on the land during three weeks of the Summer holidays. The Ministry of National Service accepted our offer with gratitude, and asked us to go to Drewsteignton, a Devon village on the outskirts of Dartmoor.

On July 26th we started off by train, and, thanks to the admirable arrangements made for our comfort by the Station-master at Semy, we had a splendid journey, going through to Moretonhampstead without a change. The chief feature of the journey was the ride by the sea shore from Exeter to Newton Abbott, one of the most charming bits of railway scenery in England. It rained hard most of the way, but fortunately was fine when we arrived at Moretonhampstead. From here we had a hilly bicycle ride of seven miles in semi-darkness, memorable chiefly for a sign post which led most of our party astray. At last, after climbing a hill as dreary and difficult as that which led to Bunyan's Mount Zion, our breathless and now perspiring company reached its destination.

Our camp had been previously pitched for us by Captain Ramshaw and Sergt.-Major Milner, on land belonging to Mr. J. C. Drewe, who most kindly gave us the necessary permission to use it. The position was a superb one, in full view of Sharp's Tor, which stood 1,000 feet high in the midst of yellow gorse and purple heather, with great rock masses and screes on either side. In a wooded gorge 500 feet below us ran the River Teign, turning through a gorgeous course to the famous Fingal Bridge. On three sides of us we had magnificent views of Dartmoor, while far away to the north we had, on a clear day, a distant peep of Exmoor. Beneath us, a Church spire, peeping out of the wooded valley, shewed where the village of Drewsteignton nestled. But while we each gazed with *one* eye on the magnificent expanse of country around us, the *other* did its best to see what our Army cook was doing. Bowls of tea were handed around and eagerly emptied, and after we had filled our palliasses with straw, and blankets had been served out, we went into the marquee and did justice to a stew of rabbits and vegetables. By this time everyone was very

tired, and we repaired to our tents and settled down for the night.

Every morning reveillé sounded at 6.30 a.m., and washing in buckets out-of-doors began. Blankets had to be shaken and rolled up, and then, if our knife and fork was not doing time in front of a neighbour, we were ready for breakfast. The post was eagerly awaited, and after letters and parcels had been distributed, and rations drawn for the mid-day meal, we left for work about 8.30 a.m., some on bicycles and some walking. Upon returning in the evening we all first enjoyed a much-needed wash, and then sat down to a hot supper. After this meal several punctures usually had to be mended, and the ground was dotted with searchers after lost washers and valves, in the semi-darkness. On two Saturday evenings a whist drive was arranged, which abounded in novelty and good humour. Both were great successes except that perhaps the ladies did not receive as much attention as usual! A prominent feature of each was the unwarlike nature of the refreshments, which, needless to say, were greatly appreciated! On Sundays, Church Parade was at 10.30 a.m., but owing to the Church being under repair the service was held in the village schoolroom. The arrival of the Cadets created a mild excitement, and a good many folk turned up to view our arrival and departure. It was a typical village service, marked by the unusual presence of a vergeress. The remainder of the day was devoted to letter-writing, bathing and walking.

And now for a few words about our farm work. As we arrived before the harvest was quite ready, our work, for the first week, was very varied; some went hoeing, some charlock-pulling, others cut hedges or thistles, or spread dung, and most of us were glad when harvesting really began, although it necessitated an earlier start and a much later finish. We stayed on a week longer than we volunteered for, and, by the time we left, all the wheat and most of the other corn had been carried. While we were thus employed, Dr. Tovey and Captain Ramshaw would either pay a visit to some of the farms or go to Chagford on the somewhat troublesome errand—in these days—of “food-hunting.”

It is not for us to say how successful our work was, but we record with pride that the Ministry of National

Service sent us the following message in a letter to Dr. Tovey: "I shall be grateful if you will convey to your boys the Ministry's appreciation of their very valuable assistance in the national cause." What we can say is that we thoroughly enjoyed our visit, and that we experienced nothing but kindness from all with whom we came in contact. The farmers treated us splendidly, and we venture to state that no other Public School Camp struck a more generous and kind-hearted set of men. If they did, they were indeed lucky, and it will be a long time before some of us forget those Drewsteignton teas! And, indeed, not only the farmers, but also the whole village seemed to lay themselves out to make our visit as pleasant as one as possible, and while it is impossible to mention by name our many kind friends, we feel a special word of thanks is due to Mr. W. Bevens, the local representative of the Ministry of National Service, who worked indefatigably all the time to make things go smoothly and pleasantly for us. To one and all we offer our heartfelt thanks, and can assure them we thoroughly appreciated all that was done for us.

All good things have an end, and at last came the morning when we had to "break camp." It opened with heavy rain, and it was only between the showers that we could take down our tents and pack up our camp equipment. At our last meal we indulged in a little speech-making. Captain Ramshaw spoke very kindly of the N.C.O.'s and Cadets who were leaving School, and we all "sang to their tribute." Sergt. Borley next spoke, and thanked Dr. Tovey and Capt. Ramshaw for all they had done to make the camp a success, and then Dr. Tovey spoke of his appreciation of the conduct of all in the camp, and of the work performed during our visit, which, he added, he had enjoyed as much as we had. He told us that between us we had worked for 4,628 hours, and had earned (at 4d. an hour) £77 2s. 10d. At about 9 p.m. we retired to rest (!) in a barn very kindly lent to us by our genial neighbour, Mr. E. P. Strong. At 5 a.m. we were on the move again, and after we had had a breakfast kindly prepared for us by Mr. Strong, the first relay started for Yeoford Junction over truly awful roads, followed by a second relay a few hours later, whence we dispersed to our respective homes. Thus ended a most novel holiday, full of delightful experiences, thoroughly enjoyed by all of us, and deeply imbedded in our memories by reason of the kindness we received from one and all.

He was Head Prefect, Sept., 1915, a member of the Cricket teams of 1914 and 1915, and of the Football teams of 1913, 1914 and 1915 (Captain, 1915), and Sergeant, Cadet Corps, September, 1915. He was also Champion Athlete in 1914 and 1915, and won 100 Yards, 220 Yards, and Quarter-Mile, in Dorset Inter-School Sports, in 1914 and 1915. After leaving School he entered the London City and Midland Bank, Salisbury Branch.

ALSO OF

GERARD BARDSLEY TAYLOR,

2nd Lieut.; Leicestershire Regiment

AGED 32 YEARS.

"Jerry" Taylor was at School from September, 1893, to July, 1902. He passed Cambridge Preliminary Locals in December, 1898, and the Oxford Junior Locals in 1900 and 1901. He was Captain of Cricket and Football and Champion Athlete in 1901 and 1902. After leaving School he entered Nottingham University, and then went to Canada in 1905, where he remained until the outbreak of war.

Our list of Old Boy casualties, alas! grows, and this number contains the names of three more who have laid down their lives for their country:

Claude Hall was at School under Mr. Pryce Taylor and Dr. Tovey. Although not brilliant at games, he was a real sportsman, and always turned up for practice games. He was of a bright and cheery disposition, always willing to lend a helping hand to anybody, and he will be very much missed.

Victor Prince joined the Rifle Brigade in August, 1916, and obtained his commission in December, 1917, proceeding to France shortly afterwards. He was home on leave in August, 1918, and visited our Harvest Camp at Drewsteignton. When killed, he was gallantly leading his men into action; he had already been previously wounded and had refused to go back, and he and his greatest friend were killed by the same shell. His O.C. wrote to his father as follows: "I really cannot tell you in words what a splendid fellow he was, and how much he will be missed by myself and his brother officers. He was always so cheery, and never happy unless seeing to the comfort and welfare of his men, with whom he was a great favourite. I am sure it will be a solace to you in your deep grief to know that your son died at the head of his company, in an attack which was a great success, gallantly doing his duty." He was one of the most prominent of our old boys, and had an athletic record of which any school might be proud. At present he holds the School record for the 100 Yards, Quarter-Mile and Long Jump, and in April, 1914, was second in the Long Jump in the Public Schools' Athletic Meeting at Stamford Bridge. He is also the only old boy whose name appears on all three of our Honour Boards hanging in the School-room. Like all true sportsmen, he was very modest and retiring, and he possessed a charm of manner that endeared him to all with whom he came in contact.

"Jerry" Taylor enlisted in a Canadian Infantry Battalion (31st Alberta) soon after the war broke out, and went to the front in September, 1915. He soon rose to be a sergeant, and after the Somme offensive in July, 1916, he came home, and took a commission in the Leicestershire Regiment. He was again sent to France, and was home on leave during the first fortnight of September. On Sept. 23rd, a neighbouring battalion of

the Durham L.I. applied to his regiment for three officers to go "over the top" with them next day. "Jerry" was one of the three selected, and had scarcely crossed the parapet when he was instantaneously killed by machine gun fire. He was a fine all-round sportsman, and after leaving School played regularly for the Loughborough Corinthians F.C. A magnificent figure of a man, full of life and energy, and yet so gentle and affectionate that he was beloved by all. He is the third of his brothers to die in this war, Arnold having been killed in July, 1916, and John in September, 1916, and we offer our very deepest sympathy to his father and family in their terrible losses.
