Cricket.

THE team of 1919 must be written down as a disappointing one, and as one of the weakest batting sides that has ever represented the School. The bowling was quite useful, and the fielding very fair without ever being brilliant; but the batting, not only in the first eleven, but throughout the School, was terribly poor and ineffective, in spite of a season in which everything favoured the batsmen, and in which we had only one slow wicket! It would be difficult to pick out half-a-dozen boys in the whole School who shewed any great improvement; and, given keenness, such a result would be well-nigh impossible considering the time devoted to net coaching and practice games. We have no wish to say more on this unpleasant subject—the batting averages speak for themselves; but we sincerely hope that next season will witness a return of that enthusiasm for the game which has previously been conspicuous in all our teams. It was impossible to award the "Johnson" batting cup this season.

A special word of praise must be given to W. H. Wylie for his excellent wicket-keeping, which was quite the best feature of the season. A. J. Prince, J. R. B. Pape and H. J. Hughes, all bowled well at times, and T. D. Osborne, A. J. Prince and G. C. Kelson were the pick of the fieldsmen, although H. F. B. Brown and R. C. Wyatt ran them close.

For the first time in the history of the School we played two Past v. Present Matches on the same day. Details of each game appear elsewhere, but we must take this opportunity of saying how delighted we were to see so many old boys back again playing cricket at the School. Both games were won by the Past teams after good finishes; the Present First XI. fielded and bowled splendidly, but threw the game away in the last innings by very bad batting, nine batsmen making fifteen runs between them on a perfect wicket!

It was very pleasant to renew Club games with some of our pre-war opponents, and we trust next season to find them all, and especially the local Town Club, once more firmly established. Several of these games provided very close finishes and plenty of excitement, but here again the batting was weak and depended too much on the efforts of Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin.

A. J. Prince had a difficult task as captain, but did all he possibly could for the side. Unfortunately he has never been a batsman, but in bowling and fielding he set his side an excellent example throughout the season. We must not forget to thank Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin for the many hours they

devoted to net coaching, and Mr. Watmough for mending so many of our bats; the small charge he made formed a welcome addition to our Memorial Fund.

The "Under 14" XI. was, like the School team, weak in batting; we felt all the term that the skill was there, but it never showed itself in trial games or matches. The bowling was only moderate, but the fielding was distinctly above the average. F. G. Hounsell (a very keen captain), W. H. B. Windebank and R. A. Hitch were the best bats, and Windebank, Hitch and H. B. Ford the most successful bowlers; F. G. Hounsell can get a great deal of spin on the ball, and, if some day he learns to keep a length, he will be a good School bowler. G. C. H. Woolston created a School record at Salisbury by making six catches at "point," five in one innings. Can any reader recall another instance of six opponents being caught by the same fielder, in the same position, in the same match?

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

School v. R.A.F. (Records), Blandford, home, May 24th, Won.—

The Airmen batted first, but found Mr. Minchin's bowling hard to score off. Seven wickets fell in the last six overs (3 to Prince and 4 to Mr. Minchin). School opened with Mr. Minchin, who treated us to an excellent display of batting, his cutting being exceptionally fine. His score included eleven boundary hits—one being a "6." The 100 was passed at the fall of the fourth wicket, the last 5 batsmen obtaining only 30 runs between them. School fielding was poor and catches were dropped. The exception was T. D. Osborne, who took two fine "country" catches off Kelson's "lobs" in the second innings of the R.A.F.

School v. Sexey's School, Bruton, away, May 31st, Lost.—

School showed an absolute lack of enterprise in running, and, with the exception of T. D. Osborne and S. C. Hayles, made no effort to stand up to the bowling of Burgess and Lawrence (who took 3 wickets in 4 balls) on a very fast wicket. Half the side were out for 32, and the rest could only add 17. Sexey's were more enterprising, and obtained every possible run, occasionally stealing such sharp ones as to flurry the fielders. Our bowling changes were made far too late, Hughes and Brown being very effective when put on. Burgess, for Sexey's, played a fine forcing innings, going in third wicket and being unbeaten at the close. H. F. B. Brown, for School, took 4 wickets for no runs in his last three overs.

School v. Mr. G. Atkinson's Shaston XI., June 4th, *Won.*—Shaftesbury won the toss and put the School in. Mr. Minchin started well, but was dismissed by a good "square leg" catch by B. G. Hacker. School did not settle down to the bowling of A. Dennis, who took 5 wickets for 20 runs. Though Shaftesbury opened badly (2 wickets for 5 runs), yet they nearly overhauled our total. The last wicket stand brought the total to within 8 runs of ours, when H. J. Hughes brought off a fine "country" catch, which saved the match. Mr. Minchin secured 9 wickets. School fielding was good.

School v. Gillingham Town, home, June 7th, *Won.*—Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin batted very well, and made the efforts of the rest of the team look poor in comparison. R. C. Wyatt showed good promise. School passed the 100 for the loss of 5 wickets, but did not add many runs after that. Gillingham started badly (3 for 22), but S. Burrow soon showed us how easy it looked to secure runs at short leg. A. Maidment was run out from a very good long field return by H. J. Hughes.

School v. Mr. J. B. Senior's XI., home, June 11th, *Lost.*—School gave a poor display against a strong combination, and only H. F. Brown and S. Granger made a stand against the bowling of D. Brown and A. Maidment. School total was passed at the cost of only 5 wickets. Our opponents hitting was very vigorous, and School fielding generally poor; the outstanding exceptions were when Hughes at "3rd man" dismissed Barnes, and Kelson at slip caused Maidment to retire without scoring. Wyatt, by a good "return," dismissed Darawalla. One of Kelson's "lob" overs was very costly, 22 runs being secured from it.

School v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, June 14th, *Won.*—School opened well, and the score soon read 4 wickets for 112, Kelson batting well for 40, and Wyatt and H. Brown also showed some good cricket. Moore bowled well. Prince and Hughes easily accounted for Sexey's; at one time the score board reading 7 for 25. School fielding was good, the most noticeable piece of work being the sharp return that enabled Wylie to dismiss Moore. In Sexey's 2nd innings Kelson's slow "underhands" were very effective, and Wylie did some smart work behind the stumps.

S.G.S. v. Old Shastonians (1st XI.), home, June 18th, *Lost.*—The Old Boys opened badly, Bowley being out (l.b.w.) to Prince's first ball. Prideaux fell into the same trap. Maidman, Senior and J. Hall batted well, and F. Innocent hit out lustily. School fielding was weak. Senior was dismissed by a sharp return from Pape. School were 25 runs down at

the fall of the 9th wicket, and Hughes and Hayles tried very hard to wipe off the arrears, being only 3 short at the close of the innings. In the second innings Hughes bowled well, obtaining 7 wickets, one a splendid "c. and b." School fielding showed improvement, and Brown made a fine country catch. Our batting was not so good, only T. D. Osborne being successful against Maidman and Kilpatrick. Senior showed that he is still a first-class fielder by the manner in which he caught Wylie and Kelson.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Old Shastonians (2nd XI.), home, June 18th, Lost.—School gave a poor batting display with the exception of Swanton who hit very vigorously and obtained 8 boundaries. Five wickets fell for 22 runs. The O.B.'s, chiefly through Shepard, R. J. Walker and T. Jones, passed our score for the loss of 6 wickets only. R. J. Walker was the chief run-getter in their second innings.

School v. Old Shastonians, home, June 19th, Lost.—Dr. Tovey, H. B. Brown and S. C. Hayles all batted well for School. R. B. Minchin was the mainstay of the O.B.'s and batted splendidly for '84 (13 boundaries, including one six); he had previously dismissed 4 of our batsmen behind the stumps. Wylie, for School, was also good behind the wicket. Fielding was generally good.

School v. R.A.F. (Records), Blandford, home, June 21st, Won.—School fielding was good, and especially the "c and b" by which Pape dismissed Major Stevenson. School batting opened well with Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin. The rest, with the exception of Mr. Ramshaw and Kelson, obtained few runs; the latter's innings won the game for us.

School v. Milton Abbas Grammar School, away, June 25th, Won.—School batted first on an easy wicket, and after a shaky start settled down to a very fair batting display. Brown and Wylie, by very steady cricket, put on 42 runs for the second wicket. Wyatt played a very good forcing innings for his 40 and was ably backed up by Stimson and Granger. School declared at 176 for 8 wickets, leaving their opponents an hour-and-a-half in which to get the runs. This, however, they were unable to do, and with the exception of R. Fookes and L. Marsh, who scored 46 between them, they found Pape's bowling too good for them. Their innings closed for 69 runs, Pape taking 5 wickets at the small cost of 13.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, June 25th, Won.—A low-scoring match in which the batting on both sides was not as good as usual. J. A. Wilson was top scorer for us with 18 and 21, and W. H. B. Windebank, E.

J. Perrett and J. Dean were the only other boys to reach double figures in either innings. When Salisbury batted they found the bowling of Ford and Windebank much too good for them. The most pleasing feature of our team was their catching; Townsend made a good one at long leg, and Geoffrey Woolston distinguished himself by catching six at "point," the last one being a very smart one. Ford and Windebank bowled well, but our slow bowlers were unable to find a length on a ground they were not used to. Perrett stopped the byes very well, but is too slow in his movements to make a good stumper.

School v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., home, June 26th, Won.—School batted very feebly with the exception of Dr. Tovey, who gave an excellent display of all-round hitting, his only supporters being Wylie, Pape and Hughes. Six wickets were down for 53; but the total turned the century before the next fell. The reply of our opponents was confined chiefly to Mr. W. G. Tovey, who, going in third wicket, was unbeaten. He was ably seconded by Mr. J. S. Lawson. Prince bowled well, and Wylie was smart behind the stumps, being responsible directly for the fall of 5 wickets. The game got very exciting when our opponents only needed 4 to win and 1 wicket to fall. R. C. Wyatt made a fine "country" catch.

School v. Gillingham Town, home, June 28th, Lost.—Gillingham brought a strong team and soon began to score merrily; the 100 was passed at the fall of the 4th wicket and 200 at the fall of the 7th. Vigorous hitting was the order, and numerous boundaries were registered. School made a disastrous reply to this, the score reading 2 wickets for 0, and soon afterwards 6 wickets for 5 runs. C. Barnes was proving very destructive with the ball. School fielding, as a whole, was weak, but T. D. Osborne took a good country catch.

School (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, home, July 2nd, Won.—School did not display any great batting form. Hitch and Ford shared the bowling, and soon dismissed the Choristers. School fielding and catching were good, Icke making 4 catches.

School v. Australian A.S.C. (Warminster), home, July 5th, Lost.—The Australian team included a fine left-hand bowler, Wilkinson, who played havoc with our wickets. Our opponents passed our small score before the loss of a wicket. Pape was our most effective bowler, his four wickets being due to good catches; especially fine was one in the deep field by H. Brown.

School v. Wimborne Grammar School, away, July 9th, *Won.*—School gave a very tame display, and appeared almost afraid of going for runs. The "tail" hit out a little more and raised the score from 69 to 93. Foster bowled well for Wimborne, while Ward very smartly caught T. D. Osborne. H. Hughes took 3 wickets in one over, and Pape made two good country catches.

School v. Kilmington & Stourton C.C., home July 12th, *Won.*—School opened badly and lost 4 wickets for 16 runs. Stimson and Pape quickly altered the score by vigorous hitting. A. J. Prince and H. Hughes shared the bowling honours. Fielding satisfactory, numerous catches being taken, one by Kelson being especially good.

School v. Milton Abbas Grammar School, home, July 16th, *Won.*—School opened with Kelson and Hayles, but both were dismissed without scoring. Brown and Wylie gathered some runs together, but the whole of the batting was very tame. Our opponents did not offer much resistance to Hughes and Pape. The fielding of the School was not very great; but Osborne made a good catch on the boundary, and Hughes a good "c. and b." The latter took his 5 wickets in 4 successive overs.

School v. Dr. Ensor's XI., home, July 17th, *Lost.*—With the exception of Dr. Tovey and G. Hemingway our batting was very feeble, seven of our side obtaining only 10 runs between them. Our opponents after a bad start pulled up splendidly and the last three batsmen put on over 50 runs. Prince bowled well. Hughes had one costly over of 18 runs. Osborne and Kelson both took fine catches.

School v. R.A.F. (Netheravon), home, July 24th, *Won.*—The wicket was very slow, and School made a bad start losing 3 wickets for 11 runs. Dr. Tovey batted very steadily and eventually was dismissed for an extremely valuable 37. The rest of the team found it very hard to get the ball away, but the last two batsmen put on a useful 30. Our opponents had a fine chance of winning as they were only 5 runs behind our total at the fall of the 7th wicket. A fine catch by Hughes dismissed the 9th wicket and so removed the only batsman who was scoring freely. School fielding was moderate, Wyatt missing two catches in the "country."

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

A. J. PRINCE (Captain).—Bowled very well at times, but was not quite so consistent as last season. Is no batsman. Good energetic field in any position. Has made a very satisfactory captain.

T. D. OBORNE.—Started the season fairly well, but during the latter half of the term his batting fell off lamentably; is very weak on his off stump. Good field anywhere, made some admirable country catches.

W. H. WYLIE.—Kept wicket splendidly throughout the term and stood up to all bowlers. Has slightly improved as a bat, but still lacks punishing power.

J. R. B. PABE.—A distinctly improved bowler, his length was much better than in 1918. Occasionally hits a few "fours" but has no defence. Useful field.

H. J. HUGHES.—Is a good natural left-handed bowler and at times bowls a really difficult ball. Would be a much better bowler if he knew a little more about batting. Poor bat; very fair but uncertain field.

H. B. BROWN.—Will make lots of runs when he has learnt to play a good length ball just outside his off stump; quite good on the leg side. Promising bowler and field. A keen cricketer.

G. C. KELSON.—Has all the makings of a batsman but frequently gets out with very weak strokes. Fielded well at "point," and bowled "lobs" occasionally.

R. C. WYATT.—Probably the most improved bat on the side. Has some good strokes on the "off" side, but at present his on-side play is weak. Good, keen field.

S. J. GRANGER.—A batsman with a style of his own; occasionally hit hard and well, especially in practice games. Moderate field.

S. C. HAYLES.—Did not make the runs we hoped for; lacks scoring strokes on the "off" side and would probably do better on slow wickets. Safe catch, but very slow in the field.

W. A. D. STIMSON.—A disappointing batsman; in the first weeks of the term he looked like making many runs. Drays away on his leg stump. Safe catch, but does not like stopping a hard drive.
