We regret to record that Mr. L. B. Owen met with a nasty motor accident last term; we are delighted to hear he is making a rapid recovery, and hopes to be well enough to return to us shortly.

Cricket.

IT is pleasant to write of our Cricket side for 1921. Without being brilliant in any one department, they were a very useful all-round side, certainly the best we have had since 1915, and there is every promise of having even a better team next year. H. E. Mitchell was unable to play during the first half of the season owing to illness, and so it was decided to award *twelve* colours. The batting was better than statistics make it appear; owing to the very dry weather and a necessary restriction of watering operations, some of the wickets on which we played were very fiery, and this affected the averages. H. F. B. Brown and H. E. Mitchell are two good boy bats and full of promise; the former has a greater variety of strokes, and the latter is the harder hitter. The "Johnson" batting cup was awarded to Brown, but Mitchell can console himself with the fact that, in most seasons, he would have been quite good enough to have won it. W. A. D. Stimson and E. H. Simpson were uncertain, but useful at times; the former failed to reproduce anything like his 1920 form. R. W. Baker has a fine defence, but like D. L. Welman, lacks scoring strokes at present; J. E. R. Dean, C. W. Fräyling, J. Icke and W. H. B. Windebank should all improve another year. In bowling, F. J. Hitch did splendidly, and he and Hugh Brown made a capital opening pair. E. H. Simpson was useful on occasions, but the rest of the change bowling was only moderate. It seems very strange that so many of our prominent cricketers in the school do not possess the rudiments of bowling; we would remind them that a player who never bowls a good length ball is a nuisance to a coach at all net practices. The fielding on the whole was good, but the team had one or two bad days, and a series of dropped catches lost them the match with Mr. Francis's XI. H. E. Mitchell, R. W. Baker, H. F. B. Brown and E. H. Simpson were the pick of the fielders, while J. Icke and T. A. B. Webb were not far behind. W. A. D. Stimson kept wicket, but was too weak on the leg side to be a success; the School is very short of wicket-keepers at the present moment, and it is only fair to Stimson to say that in any other position he was as good as any other fielder on the side.

The Second XI. started moderately, but improved very much as the season advanced, and in the last match of the term gave a very good batting display. R. A. Hitch and B. Hillier should some day make big scores, and there are distinct possibilities about G. F. Simpson, J. G. Pike, E. B. Brice and G. C. Woolston. S. B. B. Webb and J. G. Pike were the best fielders on the side. The bowling was too erratic, but R. A. Hitch always kept a good length, and G. F. Simpson bowled

"lobs" with great success. The latter, against Milton Abbas G.S., took all ten wickets for 35 runs, and we believe this to be a performance never before accomplished, *with "lobs,"* by a schoolboy. We congratulate George Simpson most heartily on his unique performance, and think that with added experience he should develop into a good "lob" bowler.

The "Under 14" XI. was a disappointing side, and quite at their worst in the two matches they played. Their batting, bowling and fielding, were not up to the standard we usually expect from this side. We believe that several of them have cricket in them, but they apparently suffered from "stage fright." R. B. Brown should some day be a good bat, and, with age and experience, F. Hoddinott and F. W. Gibson should develop into quite useful bowlers.

The Masters' XI. had a very enjoyable season, and considering the strength of the opposing teams, did well to win more matches than they lost. Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin both made several useful scores, but the highest individual effort in these matches goes to the credit of H. E. Mitchell, who made a brilliant 127 in the last match against Gillingham Town C.C. Dr. and Mr. W. G. Tovey made what we believe to be a record for the ground by putting on 154 runs for the first wicket against Dr. Ensor's team. In bowling, F. J. Hitch and H. F. B. Brown carried off the honours, while Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey could generally be relied on to take a wicket when it was wanted.

Hugh Brown proved an admirable captain both on and off the field; he managed the limited amount of bowling at his disposal very well, and always set his team an excellent example. We thank him for his untiring efforts on behalf of our School Cricket, and congratulate ourselves on the fact that, all being well, we are to have his valuable services another season.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

School v. Motcombe C.C., home, May 7th, Won.—Motcombe batted first, but could make little headway against the bowling of Hitch and Simpson, the former taking 5 wickets for 30 runs, and the latter 5 for 21. School started disastrously, 6 wickets being down for 31. Frayling, however, batted well for 20, and won the match. The Rev. E. C. King bowled well for Motcombe (6 wickets for 15 runs).

School v. Mere C.C., home, May 11th, Won.—Mere found Hitch's bowling (6 wickets for 30 runs) difficult to score off, and were all dismissed for 48. School opened the innings

with Stimson and Welman, the former playing well for 32. The only other batsman to face the bowling with any confidence was Hitch (30). School fielding was fair.

School v. South Wilts, away, May 14th, *Lost*.—South Wilts batted first, and lost 7 wickets for 121. A determined stand for the 8th wicket, however, enabled them to reach a total of 222. The School country fielding was weak, but Baker made a good catch at extra cover. Mr Minchin was the most successful bowler. School's total was 154, Dr. Tovey playing a good innings for 58, and Simpson, a very useful 21.

School v. Gillingham Town, home, May 16th, *Lost*.—This was our worst performance of the season, our total only reaching 44. Our opponents treated us to a good all-round batting display, and scored 208 for the loss of 5 wickets (D. C. Ellerton 52 not out, Major Wynne Willson 42, and S. Burrow 40, being the chief contributors). School fielding was "patchy," but the catch in the slips with which Baker dismissed Major Wynne Willson was an exceptionally fine one. Our second innings produced 82, of which H. F. B. Brown scored 34.

School v. Warminster Casuals, home, May 18th, *Lost*.—Thanks to a good individual effort by A. Lockyer (40), our opponents scored 104. Brown was our best bowler, and secured five wickets for 32. School batting was weak, and three wickets were lost for 5 runs only. Hitch and Baker made a good attempt to pull the game out of the fire, but the former was bowled while attempting to hit the wrong one. School total, 85. In Warminster's second innings, T. A. B. Webb was very successful with the ball, his figures reading—3 overs, 8 runs, 6 wickets.

School v. Sexey's School, Bruton, home, May 21st, *Won*.—Sexey's found Brown and Hitch's bowling much too good for them, and were all dismissed for 36, Brown taking 6 wkts. for 18, and Hitch 3 for 6. School batted well, and by good all-round cricket obtained a total of 183. Eight of the team secured double figures.

School v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., home, May 25th, *Lost*.—School batted first, and three wickets were soon lost for 34 runs. Dean and Simpson, by dint of steady cricket, put on 58 for the fourth wicket, the latter giving his best performance of the season. The other batsmen failed disastrously, 3 wickets falling at 124, and the remaining 3 at 129. Our visitors replied with a total of 182. The School fielding, with the exception of one mistake in the slips, was good. Brown and Webb made excellent catches in the slips and at mid-off respectively. Stimson was good behind the stumps.

School v. Sexey's School, Bruton, away, May 28th, Won.—

School obtained a total of 98 on a very hard wicket and with long grass in the "country;" consequently, most of the runs were singles. Brown, Welman, Stimson, Simpson and Windebank all batted very consistently, but there were too many leg balls allowed to go unpunished; Stimson and Simpson were the chief offenders in this respect. Sexey's found the bowling of Brown and Hitch too good for them, and were dismissed for 32. School fielding was fair, but several chances were not accepted.

School ("A" team) v. Milton Abbas Grammar School, away, May 30th, Won.—

School started badly and lost 5 wickets for 29 runs. Webb and Phillips, however, improved matters by adding 20 runs for the sixth wicket and thus enabled us to reach a total of 70. J. Martin bowled well for Milton Abbas and secured seven wickets. Our opponents could do little with R. A. Hitch's bowling, and were out for 32, Hitch taking 8 wickets for 17 runs.

School v. Sherborne Town, home, June 1st, Won.—

School opened with Mr. Minchin and Welman, the latter being caught immediately. Mr. Minchin, however, hit out vigorously and obtained 62 (11 boundaries). Hitch also hit very hard and obtained a valuable, though lucky, 54 (including 8 boundaries). Sherborne were all dismissed for 72, Mr. Minchin being the most successful bowler (6 for 26).

School v. South Wilts "A," home, June, 4th, Won.—

School batted first and obtained 136 runs, mainly due to good work by Welman, Brown, Hitch and Baker. The bowling of Brown and Hitch, backed up by some very good fielding, enabled us to dismiss our opponents for 90. No less than seven wickets fell to catches, two were l.b.w., and on only one occasion were the stumps hit.

School "A" v. Secondary School, Blandford, away, June 8th,

Lost.—With the exception of T. A. B. Webb, School could do little against the bowling of Gale (7 wickets), and were all dismissed for 69. Webb batted very stubbornly for 28, but the others seemed to be suffering from nerves. Blandford, thanks to a good 3rd wicket partnership by Foot and Gale, passed our total for the loss of 2 wickets only. The whole team, however, were eventually disposed of for a total of 107, Webb (6 for 21) being the most successful bowler. School fielding fair.

School v. Gillingham Town, home, June 11th, Won.—

Gillingham batted first and obtained 110 runs, L. G. Prideaux being top scorer with 34. The bowling and fielding were good, Hitch making two good catches in the slips. School replied with 168 (Mr. Extras 43 (1), Brown 28, Hitch 27, Frayling 23).

School (Under 14 XI.) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, June 15th, Lost.—With the one exception of A. J. Combes, School gave a very disappointing display, and were all out for the small total of 57, of which Combes claimed 28 (not out). Pomeroy, for the Choristers, bowled very well and secured 8 wickets. Our opponents scored 120, of which King obtained 45. School's bowling and fielding were weak.

School v. South Wilts "A," away, June 18th, Lost.—Our opponents won the toss, and, thanks to a very fine innings by J. M. Whittle (65), secured 192 runs. The fielding was good, Dr. Tovey making an excellent catch off Hitch, and Baker securing another after having previously dropped an easier one. School started with Dr. Tovey and Welman, but two wickets were quickly lost for 5 runs. Stimson, however, joined Dr. Tovey, and played a good innings for 39 runs, our final total being 131.

School v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., home, June 20th, Won.—School obtained 119, thanks to some good batting by Mr. Minchin, Brown, Stimson and Frayling. Our opponents started badly, and lost 3 wickets for 17 runs. Major Wynne Willson, however, played an exceptionally fine innings, and nearly won the match for his side. His score of 60 included one "six" and seven "fours." The best bowling performance was that of Brown, who kept an excellent length throughout, and obtained 5 wickets for 21 runs. The fielding was good and Stimson was at his best behind the "stumps."

School v. Wimborne Grammar School, away, June 22nd, Won.—School gave a poor batting display, and 5 batsmen were dismissed for 32 runs. The "tail," however, "wagged," and thanks to some forceful cricket by Hitch, Dean, Baker, Windebank and Icke, our ultimate score reached 129. Wimborne started disastrously, their batsmen being able to do little with Brown's bowling. The last named secured four wickets in his first four overs, for one run only. Hitch also bowled well on a wicket which suited him. School fielding was good, Dean securing a good catch at mid-off. In the second innings, Simpson bowled with marked success (4 wickets for 8 runs).

School v. Dr. Ensor's XI., home, June 25th, Drawn.—This whole-day match provided an excellent day's cricket, no less than 552 runs being scored. Dr. Ensor brought a strong side, and we were given a long spell in the field. A. G. Ensor scored an excellent 94, and he was ably backed up by the Rev. F. Meyrick Jones (45), Rev. G. D. Archer (51) and P. S. J. Randall (38). Our opponents final score was 313

(for 8 wickets). School fielding was good, Mr. Minchin making a good catch at deep cover. Stimson had an "off-day" behind the stumps. The feature of our batting was an excellent first wicket partnership by Dr. Tovey and Mr. W. G. Tovey. Their partnership yielded no less than 157 runs, the former obtaining 70, and the latter 88. The rest of the team, with the exception of Mr. Minchin, Hitch, and Simpson, made very few runs. Our score when stumps were drawn was 239 for 9 wickets.

School v. Shaftesbury Town, home, June 29th, *Won*.—School opened with Welman and Baker, and 42 runs were scored without loss, both batsmen playing cautiously. Mitchell, playing for the first time this season, played a very sound innings of 25, and ably assisted by Icke and Phillips, enabled us to reach a total of 156. The Town did not find Hitch's and Simpson's bowling easy to score off, and were dismissed for 108. The last named took 6 wickets, 4 of them in 3 overs for 9 runs only. School fielding was good, Baker being responsible for 2 good catches.

School v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., home, June 30th, *Won*.—Mr. Minchin and Welman gave the School a good start by scoring 53 for the first wicket. Later batsmen, however, with the exception of Mitchell (31 not out) did not face Mr. Robson's "lobs" with any confidence, and the side were all out for 139. Mr. Robson played for England v. Australia in 1907, so we were delighted to see him on our cricket field. Thanks to some good bowling by Brown (6 for 43), backed up by some keen fielding, we were able to "out" our opponents for 124. A beautiful day and a most enjoyable match.

School v. King Edward VI. School, Southampton, away, July 2nd, *Won*.—This match was played on a very fast wicket, and, although the scores were not high, the School accomplished one of their best performances of the season. We batted first, and our score of 83 was mainly due to the efforts of Brown, Stimson and Simpson. The rest of the team secured only 17 runs between them. Thanks to some very good bowling by Hitch, and clever captaincy by Brown, who changed his bowling most discreetly, we were enabled to win by a margin of 18 runs. Hitch's figures were as follows:—14'3 overs, 7 maidens, 17 runs, 7 wickets. School fielding was good throughout, and we were delighted to win such an excellent match, especially as Southampton had not suffered a reverse in all their previous matches.

School "A" v. Donhead St. Andrew, home, July 2nd, *Lost*.—Our First XI. being at Southampton, we were obliged to play a genuine Second XI. Donhead's total of 132 was

mainly due to a vigorous display of hitting by R. Baskett, who obtained 57 runs (including 1 "six" and 9 "fours.") School's batting was weak, the whole side being disposed of for 69 runs. Phillips, Icke, and Simpson, were the most successful bowlers. School fielding was fair.

School v. Sherborne Town, away, July 6th, *Won.*—Sherborne batted first, and 47 runs were scored before the first wicket fell. The rest of the team, however, with the exception of W. Paulley, offered little resistance. Dr. Tovey was most successful with the ball, taking 6 wickets for 34 runs. Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey gave an excellent display of batting, the former obtaining 78 (15 boundaries) and the latter 50 not out. For the third wicket they put on no less than 89 runs. When stumps were drawn we had scored 158 for 5 wickets.

School v. South Wilts, home, July 9th, *Lost.*—School opened with Mr. Minchin and Welman, and 30 runs were obtained before the latter was bowled by a fast one. Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey added 35 runs for the third wicket, after which the former was easily caught at forward short-leg. Dr. Tovey was unfortunate to "play on" when he appeared to be in for a big score. The rest of the team did not bat with any confidence, and we were all dismissed for 126 runs. South Wilts made a poor start against the bowling of Hitch and Mr. Minchin, eight wickets going down for 68 runs. Mr. Taunton and Mr. Jackson then became associated, and we were treated to an excellent display of batsmanship, the partnership yielding no less than 105 runs. The former's score of 99 included 17 boundary hits. School's fielding was very fair, seven catches being made.

School "A" v. Milton Abbas School, Blandford, home, July 11th, *Won.*—School, after a somewhat shaky display of batting, obtained a total of 85, S. B. Webb being top scorer with 17 not out. Milton Abbas, however, could do little with the bowling of R. A. Hitch and Phillips, seven of their batsmen failing to score. Hitch took 6 wickets for 6 runs in 6 overs. School fielding was good, Hitch making an excellent catch at "third man," off Phillips. In our second innings Hitch and Pike knocked up 36 and 24 respectively, and the innings was declared closed with 69 (for 2 wickets) on the board. Milton Abbas could do nothing against Simpson's lobs, and were dismissed for 40. Simpson's performance in taking all ten wickets, with lobs, constitutes a School record, and we have not heard of another instance in the cricket history of recent years.

School (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, home, July 13th, Lost.—The Choristers batted first, and, thanks to a good innings by J. H. Johnson (30 not out), compiled 61 runs. Windebank was the most successful bowler (5 wickets for 19 runs). School gave a very poor display of batting and were all dismissed for 39 runs, B. H. Hacker taking six of our wickets for thirteen runs. The second innings was practically a repetition of the first, Geyton and Hoddinott being the only batsmen to offer much resistance.

School v. Gillingham Town, home, July 16th, Won.—Major Wynne Willson (34) was the only batsman who played. Hitch and Dr. Tovey with any confidence, the whole side being dismissed for 89 runs. Dr. Tovey's first four overs were all "maidens," and included two wickets, his final figures reading 4 wickets for ten runs. The feature of our innings was the brilliant batting of H. E. Mitchell. Starting somewhat shakily and being missed when about 40, he batted with the greatest confidence, and was not dismissed until he had made 127, the highest individual score of the season. His off-driving and hitting to leg were a pleasure to watch, his score including no less than 18 "fours." Hitch (43) and Frayling (33) also gave a good account of themselves.

School v. Stourton and Kilmington, home, July 23rd, Drawn.—School batted first and gave a good display of batting, Brown (57), Simpson (50), Mitchell (29) being the chief scorers. With 201 (for 7 wickets) on the board, Brown declared the innings closed. Our visitors opened their innings in vigorous style, and scored 132 (for 3 wickets), when rain stopped play. G. W. Aldridge played a good innings for 48 not out (including 1 "six" and 6 "fours.")

School v. Mr. C. H. Francis's XI., home, July 25th, Lost.—This 12-a-side match was played on the last Monday of the term. School opened with Brown and Welman, who gave the side a good start by scoring 70. Brown batted in excellent style for his score of 33, and Welman (43) accomplished his best performance of the season. The rest of the team, with the exception of Mitchell (23), batted very feebly, and we were all dismissed for 133. Our visitors, mainly due to the forceful batting of Messrs. W. G. and W. E. Hannam, secured a lead of 27 runs. School catching was poor and lost us the match.

School (1st XI.) v. Old Shastonians, home, July 27th, Lost.—The Old Boys batted first and compiled a total of 160, J. B. Senior being top scorer with 34. School started badly, but Baker and Mitchell added 40 runs for the 4th wicket. Baker played an invaluable innings for his side, and was unbeaten

at the close of the innings with 42 to his credit. Of the remaining batsmen Icke alone showed any enterprise, and we were beaten by a margin of 34 runs.

Although missed in the early stages of his innings, he played good forcing cricket, and his score included 12 fours, most of them being well-timed off-drives. The Old Boys were dismissed twice—for 62 and 100 respectively; Windebanks (7 wickets for 26) was the most successful bowler in the first innings, and G. F. Simpson (6 wickets for 47) in the second. The fielding was good, and Law, as wicket-keeper, was responsible for stumping 3 batsmen off Simpson's lob.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit.)

- H. F. B. BROWN (Captain).—A very promising all-round cricketer. Has a good defence with lots of scoring strokes, his cutting being a strong feature. Is rather inclined to get his left shoulder too far round. Always kept a good length when bowling and comes quicker off the pitch than his pace would appear to warrant. Good field. One of the best captains we have ever had.
- W. A. D. STIMSON.—Struck a bad patch and lost confidence in himself. Has plenty of scoring strokes, including a fine drive past extra cover, but often plays back with a crooked bat. Kept wicket moderately, but is a fine field anywhere else.
- F. J. HITCH.—A good school bowler, comes off the ground at a good pace and very often keeps low. A hitting batsman of a somewhat rustic type. Very fair field and a promising wicket-keeper.
- E. H. SIMPSON.—Hardly made the runs we hoped for. His left shoulder never points to the bowler and so he frequently plays across a good straight ball. A very useful change bowler and a good field anywhere.
- H. E. MITCHELL.—Came into the team at half-term and quickly showed himself the most improved player on the side. He has a good defence and some very powerful strokes in front of the wicket; must learn to cut. Good field and a very safe catch.
- J. E. R. DEAN.—Hardly came up to expectations; when he has improved his back play he will make lots more runs. Too slow in the field at present, but can hold a catch, and is very keen.

- R. W. BAKER.—Has the best defence of anyone on the side with the exception of Brown and Mitchell. Played several very valuable innings, but at present has no "off" side scoring power, due largely to the fact that he does not turn his left hand in making certain strokes. A fine field at extra cover and a keen cricketer.
- D. L. WELMAN.—Improved very much in batting as the season advanced, but made nearly all his runs on the "on" side. If he can learn to cut and drive, will make lots of runs in the future. Moderate field.
- C. W. FRAYLING.—A very keen cricketer, but at present too weak on his leg stump. When he has strengthened his defence he will be a good forcing bat. His fielding was variable; he had some good days and some bad ones.
- W. H. B. WINDEBANK.—Is a cricketer in the making, but has not yet sufficient confidence in himself. Hits the ball hard and well, but, like many left-handers, is too fond of nibbling at balls wide of the "off" stump. Should be a useful bowler next season if he can control his length. Much improved field.
- J. ICKE.—One of the most promising players on the side and should some day be a good all-round cricketer. Has some very nice strokes which will some day give him lots of "fours," keeps a good length when bowling, and fielded well at point throughout the season.
- T. A. B. WEBB.—A slow left-handed bowler, who would have been much more successful if he could have bowled a little faster. Has little idea of batting, but is a good field and a keen cricketer.

Old Shastonian Club Tour.

THE weather for our 1921 Cricket tour, in strong contrast to that which we experienced last year, was everything that could be desired. Our first fixture was a whole-day match with the Old Choristers, on the School Ground. We batted first, and, thanks to useful contributions by F. G. Minchin, G. E. Bowley, W. G. Tovey and J. B. Brown, compiled the moderate total of 154 runs. The Choristers were dismissed for 111, S. Burrow taking six wickets for 33 runs. In our second innings, G. E. Bowley (82 not out) and R. J. Walker (60 not out) batted exceptionally well, and put on no less than 139 runs for the fourth wicket before stumps were drawn.

On the following day we made an early start and motored to Basingstoke, arriving there about 11 a.m. The Club opened with Dr. Tovey and Mr. W. G. Tovey on a perfect wicket. Forty-five runs were scored without loss, but a "rot" then set in, and we were all dismissed for 132. Mr. W. G.
