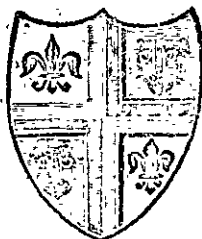

Cricket.

IN spite of the wretched weather which we experienced during the latter half of last term, we had a most enjoyable and successful Cricket season. The First XI. did remarkably well in all their School matches, and were beaten only by the Old Shastonians.

The batting of the first few was distinctly good, but the remainder did not make quite the progress we anticipated at the end of last season. H. E. Mitchell, H. F. B. Brown and J. Icke carried off the batting honours, while J. E. R. Dean, R. A. Hitch and W. H. B. Windebank occasionally made some useful scores. Mitchell, who is now the holder of the "Johnson" Cup, was in fine form throughout the season, and on two occasions scored a century. Brown did not make half as many runs as he was worth, and was only seen in his true form when he scored a brilliant 104 against Wimborne. Icke was the most improved cricketer on the side, and should make lots of runs next season. The remainder of the team, with very few exceptions, could not be persuaded to play with a straight bat, and were out to strokes which, had they made them at a net, would have exasperated even the most good-tempered of coaches.

Brown and Icke were our only reliable bowlers, and we badly needed a good change bowler. With the exception of Simpson, who has still a lot to learn before he can hope to be really successful with his lob, we had nothing but medium right-handed material to work with. Windebank occasionally took a wicket, but his length was so often at fault. May we take this opportunity of reminding bowlers that half the success in bowling is the outcome of their ability to sum up the opposing batsman's weaknesses.

The fielding, on the whole, was patchy, and several comparatively easy catches were dropped. There were, however, some really bright patches, and it will be a long time before we forget Icke's wonderful one-handed catch at forward short-leg against Dr. Ensor's XI. A word of praise is due to L. D. D. Brett for his plucky wicket-keeping. He was quite the "find" of the season, and with added experience should do well in the future.

The Second XI. were not a good side at the beginning of the term, but they improved considerably as the season advanced. Here again the batting was infinitely superior to the bowling. Of the batsmen, E. B. Brice, A. G. Egremont, B. Hillier, R. H. Hitch and F. N. Windebank were the most

promising: The last named was the best bowler on the side, the remainder being unable to keep a good length. The fielding, on the whole, was good.

The "Under 14" XI. was not a strong team, but the majority were very young, and we have every reason to expect a much stronger eleven next year. R. H. Hitch and A. J. Combes batted very well, and R. B. Brown will some day make a very good cricketer. J. S. Windebank, J. Cole, K. G. Mitchell and G. C. Tovey are all batsmen in the making, and we only wish we had as many promising bowlers as we have run-getters.

The Masters' XI. had a very enjoyable season, but did not win quite so many of their matches as usual. Dr. Tovey and Mr. Streather carried off the bowling honours, while the run-getting was fairly well distributed throughout the team.

Hugh Brown again proved an admirable captain, who set the whole school an excellent example of keenness and good sportsmanship. He showed a sound knowledge of the game in all its branches, and managed the bowling exceptionally well. Brown may look back with justifiable pride on his nine years at S.G.S., and we doubt whether we have ever had a better all-round athlete than he has been. Entering the School in September, 1913, he won the "Under 14" Junior Championship in 1917-18-19, Senior Championship 1922, was a member of the Football XI. 1920-21, Cricket XI. 1919-20-21-22 (Captain 1921-22). Our congratulations go with him to his new sphere of life, and we hope that he will have every opportunity of keeping up his games.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

School v. Motcombe C.C., home, May 6th, Won.—School batted first on a slow wicket, and made 94, to which total Brown, Windebank and Hitch contributed no less than 76. The rest of the batting was poor. Motcombe were out for 50, Brown, Simpson and Icke all taking wickets cheaply.

School v. Shaftesbury Town C.C., home, May 10th, Won.—Brown and Windebank again made most of the runs, the only other double-figure contribution coming from Mitchell. When Shaftesbury batted, Icke took 5 wickets for 21, and Simpson 4 for 11. In a second innings the School made 53 for 1 wicket, Icke and Hitch both batting well.

Masters v. South Wilts "A," home, May 13th, Lost.—The visitors batted first and, thanks to a fine hard-hitting innings by C. E. Pearce (o.s.) who scored 111 (not out), were able to declare at 175 for 7 wickets. Our batting broke down, and

we were all out for 81, Mr. Minchin making more than half our total.

School v. Charnage C.C., home, May 17th, *Won.*—A splendidly contested game, won by the School by ONE run. Icke for us, and S. Burrow (o.s.) for the visitors, each made 36 in a low-scoring match. Simpson took 3 wickets for 12 runs at a critical period of the game, and had a 'big share in our victory. Our fielding was very satisfactory.

Masters v. Gillingham Town C.C., home, May 20th, *Won.*—A very interesting match. Mr. Minchin batted splendidly, and carried his bat through the innings for 81, and Dr. Tovey and Mr. Streather made useful scores, setting the visitors 140 to get to win. Their first five wickets fell for 27 runs, and then Rev. J. Vincent and V. Adlam made a good stand and took the score to nearly 80 before they were parted. Mr. Streather's pace proved too great for the remainder, and the whole side were out for 87. Mr. Streather took 7 wickets for 25.

School v. Warminster G.S., away, May 24th, *Won.*—We gave a disappointing display of batting, losing our five best batsmen for 41 against some very moderate bowling. Hesse, whose first appearance it was, made a useful little stand with Webb for the eighth wicket, but the whole side were out for 85. The home team fared even worse, and were all out for 40.

Masters v. South Wilts C.C., away, May 27th, *Draw.*—As the home team had too many players, we agreed to play twelve a side, and Col. French-Blake played for us. We batted first, and put together the satisfactory score of 288, seven of the team making double figures. Col. French-Blake made an excellent 66 before being run out, and Mr. Watts, Mr. Streather, Mitchell and Windebank all played well for their runs. When South Wilts went in to bat we got six of them out for 63, and looked like winning; but Messrs. Dawson and Jackson came to the rescue, and by careful batting saved the game. A capital match and a very enjoyable day.

School (Under 14) v. Warminster G.S. (Under 14), away, May 29th, *Won.*—We won the toss, but were all out for 68, of which R. H. Hitch made 32 in good style before being foolishly run out. The home team made 58 for the loss of only four wickets, but afterwards collapsed in unaccountable fashion before the bowling of K. G. Mitchell, and were all out for 59! Mitchell bowled really well, and his four wickets were actually obtained for no runs, ten being made off him before he took a wicket. The fielding on both sides was very creditable.

School v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., home, May 31st, *Won.*—School won the toss, and thanks to two capital "knocks" by Icke (67) and Hitch (40) our total realised 187. The visiting "skipper" played good vigorous cricket for 66, but the rest of his team could do little with the bowling of Brown (7 for 32), and we won an interesting game by 50 runs. Mention should be made of our fielding, which was quite good.

Masters v. Sherborne Town C.C., home, June 3rd, *Lost.*—We gave a very poor display of batting, and were dismissed for 104, nobody making 20 runs on a fast wicket. The visitors made 98 for six wickets, and then a collapse occurred and nine were down for the same total; however, by careful batting our total was passed, and Sherborne won by 21 runs. Mr. Streather took 5 wickets for 41 runs.

Masters v. Mr. C. H. Francis's XI., home, June 5th, *Won.*—We won the toss and again started badly, but D. T. Sutton came to the rescue with a splendid 69, and his good work was ably seconded by Mr. Newell, Windebank and Mitchell, so that we put together the respectable total of 248. The visitors were dismissed for 145, Dr. Tovey taking 7 wickets for 43.

School v. Poole School, home, June 7th, *Won.*—Poole batted first and played very steadily, B. Keefe being their principal contributor to a total of 108. Brown bowled very well, keeping an excellent length and taking 6 wickets for 25; of the rest of our bowling, the less said the better! When we went in to bat, Mitchell and Dean gave us a splendid start and put on 97 for the first wicket; Mitchell remained undefeated to the end with 110 to his credit, which included 18 fours and 10 twos. It was a fine forcing innings, consisting chiefly of powerful drives in front of the wicket.

School v. Warminster Town C.C., home, June 10th, *Draw.*—Warminster won the toss, and thanks chiefly to Pinniger (90) and Smith (61), were enabled to declare at 174 for 8 wickets. Windebank (5 for 32) was our most successful bowler, but Brown also bowled well with very little luck. Mitchell, for us, gave another fine batting display, and he was well supported by Brown; in fact, had not Brown been unfortunately run out owing to a misunderstanding, it is quite likely we should have won the match. Brett made his first appearance for the School as a wicket-keeper in this game, and gave a very promising display.

School v. Shaftesbury Town C.C., home, June 14th, *Won.*—Another victory, memorable chiefly for a second century by Mitchell, including a five, 13 fours, 2 threes and 6 twos. He

was "not out" at the close, for as soon as he had made his century, Brown "declared" with the score at 183 for 6 wkts. The Town made a plucky effort to win, but were all out on the stroke of time for 158. The bowling honours went to Hitch, who took 6 wickets for 35. It is worthy of record that Mitchell had made 288 runs in three consecutive matches without being once out.

School ("A" Team) v. Milton Abbas G.S., away, June 14th, Won.—A low-scoring match, won by us thanks almost entirely to the batting of Egremont and the bowling of F. N. Windebank (6 wickets for 12). Our fielding was considerably better than that of our opponents, and special mention must be made of a fine catch by S. M. Jones at mid-off. We regret that the return match could not be played owing to illness.

Masters v. South Wilts "A," away, June 17th, Lost.—We won the toss, but gave a poor exhibition of batting, Mr. Newell and Windebank being top scorers with 14 each, and were dismissed for 80. The home team soon passed our total, and, thanks chiefly to Messrs. J. Mansfield & T. R. Bennett, had totalled 193 for 7 wickets when stumps were drawn. Our catching struck a bad patch in this match.

School ("A" Team) v. Donhead St. Andrew C.C., home, June 17th, Won.—The visitors batted first, and were dismissed for 75, F. N. Windebank taking 6 wickets for 26. Our wickets at first fell fast, and we lost 9 for 41. Then Webb joined E. B. Brice, and the two proceeded to play very plucky cricket, putting on 39 runs, and winning the match for us by five runs. Brice showed admirable coolness at a critical time, and we hope he will reproduce this form next season. A capital game, and a match worth winning.

School (Under 14) v. Warminster G.S. (Under 14), home, June 19th, Won.—Out of a total of 86, A. J. Combes (our Captain) made a very creditable 26. The bowling of K. G. Mitchell and R. H. Hitch proved too good for the visitors, and they were all out for 47. In our second innings several of the team showed promising form, notably J. L. Cole and R. H. Hitch, and it is evident that the Junior Clubs have some promising youngsters, who will some day be good cricketers.

School v. Wimborne G.S., home, June 21st, Won.—Hugh Brown's match, for after making a century he dismissed six of the visitors for 25 runs. At first he batted steadily as wickets were falling fast, but when Brett stopped with him he scored much faster; he hit 6 fours, 5 threes and 11 twos, but good as his display was, its chief feature was his admir-

able running between the wickets, in which he was splendidly supported by Brett.

Masters v. South Wilts C.C., home, June 24th, *Won*.—This match was spoilt by rain. After a few overs had been bowled we had to make a dash for the pavilion, and no further play was possible till late in the afternoon. The visitors were all out for 85, and in the time at our disposal we made 130 for 3 wickets, thus gaining an easy victory. Mitchell (52) and Mr. Streather (30) both played good free cricket for us, and Dr. Tovey took 5 wickets for 28. We deeply regret an accident to Col. French-Blake, who was struck on the chin by a rising ball.

School v. Warminster G.S., home, June 28th, *Draw*.—Very little play was possible owing to rain, and after our visitors had scored 72 for 7 wickets under conditions not really fit for cricket, the match had to be abandoned.

Masters v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., home, June 29th, *Lost*.—Played on a drying and tricky wicket. Our batting broke down before the bowling of F. W. Bridges (6 for 21), and only Mitchell and Mr. Streather made double figures. The visitors also found run-getting a difficult matter, with the exception of S. Boulton, who made 49 chiefly by a number of lusty "pulls." Mr. Minchin took 6 wickets for 46. In our second innings Dr. Tovey made 68 (not out), and Mr. Minchin and Mr. Watts also scored freely.

School v. King Edward's School, Southampton, home, July 1st, *Won*.—Shortly before the start of this match rain began to fall, but it fortunately stopped for a couple of hours in the middle of the afternoon, and in this time we dismissed our opponents for 39, and then made 93 for no wicket. Icke (5 for 20) and Brown (4 for 16) both bowled splendidly, but our visitors were worth more runs than they made, and luck was against them. Mitchell's innings for us was a very fine one, and Icke showed commendable defence in a poor light.

Masters v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., home, July 3rd, *Draw*.—We won the toss and made 135 on a slow wicket, of which Icke made 32 and Dr. Tovey 26. We just failed to get our opponents out, and when time was called their score was 71 for 8; Mr. Streather and Dr. Tovey shared the wickets. Our fielding reached its high-water mark in this match, the ground work and catching being alike excellent.

School v. Poole School, away, July 5th, *not played*.—We made the journey to Poole, but it rained incessantly the whole afternoon, and not a ball could be bowled.

Masters v. Sherborne Town C.C., away, July 8th, *Draw*.—A terrible day for cricket; a gale blew across the ground with such force that the bails would not stay on. Eventually the captains agreed to play without them!! Sherborne batted first, and declared at 153 for 6, M. B. Elderton batting well for 74. We made a bad start, and looked like being beaten; but J. Dean and Icke came to our rescue and played carefully for half-an-hour, thus saving the match. Both played capital cricket under very difficult conditions.

Masters v. Dr. C. A. Ensor's XI., home, July 10th, *Won*.—Mr. Minchin and Mr. Newell were the principal contributors to our total of 91. Our opponents were dismissed for 77, thanks to splendid bowling by Mr. Streather, who took six wickets for 36. In our second innings Mr. Watts made 37 and Mitchell 26 (not out). The wicket was difficult all day, and the batsmen had to work hard for their runs. Our fielding was good, and Icke's effort at forward short-leg off Dr. Tovey's bowling was "the catch of the season."

Masters v. Hinton St. Mary C.C., home, July 15th, *Lost*.—Brown (32) and Mitchell (29) were the only batsmen to make any runs for us, and we were all out for 96. To this, Hinton replied with 98 for 8, thanks almost entirely to a splendid effort by Gen. Poore, who went in first wicket and carried his bat for 66. Mr. Minchin was our most successful bowler, taking four wickets for 24.

Masters v. Gillingham Town C.C., home, July 22nd, *Draw*.—Once more rain was the "spoil-sport." It was only possible to start play at 3.15, and Gillingham made 107 (A. G. Maidment 33 not out). Dr. Tovey took eight wickets for 33. We had lost six wickets for 34, when rain prevented any further play.

School v. Old Shastonians, home, July 26th, *Lost*.—The School team gave a very poor batting display, and so sustained their only defeat during the term. They seemed quite powerless to deal with the bowling of F. J. Hitch (7 for 24) on a slow wicket, and were all out for 46. The Old Boys replied with 131, of which J. T. Hall made 47 by very sound cricket. The "Present" were dismissed a second time for 69.

School (2nd XI.) v. Old Shastonians (2nd XI.), home, July 26th, *Lost*.—The School 2nd XI. were also defeated by the Past 2nd, but it is to their credit that they made a better fight of it than the 1st XI. did. Batting first, they made 104, F. N. Windebank and Egremont being top scorers. The Old Boys replied with 149, of which R. S. Payne contributed 50 and R. G. Mitchell 33. Had it not been for two dropped

catches early in the game, the "Present" would probably have won. In a second innings the School scored 69 for 7, when R. N. Tayler beat all his previous bowling performances by taking two wickets!!

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

- H. F. B. BROWN (Captain).—A good all-round cricketer. Cuts exceptionally well, and has more scoring strokes than any other member of the team. Did not make half as many runs as he was worth. Good medium-paced bowler, but hardly as consistent as he was last year. Excellent field, especially in the covers. A good sportsman and an admirable captain.
- H. E. MITCHELL.—A fine punishing bat with a sound defence, but appears to be a bit nervous when starting. Hits exceptionally hard on the off side, and has a good—though somewhat dangerous—lifting shot to the leg boundary. Has not yet learnt to cut. A good field, with a safe pair of hands. Fair change bowler.
- J. E. R. DEAN.—A good defensive batsman, who made several useful scores when they were badly needed. Has very few strokes on the off side, but rarely fails to score off a ball outside his leg-stump. Must try and adapt his play to the varying paces of the wicket. Slow in the field, but a safe catch.
- C. W. FRAYLING.—A disappointing batsman with very few strokes. Does not make use of his left leg, and consequently is apt to play across a straight ball. With an improved defence might make a lot of runs. Very fair field.
- W. H. B. WINDEBANK.—Made several useful scores, but does not get across to balls on the off. Can hit hard, but has several weak spots in his defence. Would be a good bowler if he could control his length. A good field and a very keen cricketer.
- J. ICKE.—The most improved cricketer in the team. His defence and scoring power have increased considerably, and he should make lots of runs next year. Good bowler, who can be relied on to keep a length. Very good field and a safe catch.
- L. D. D. BRETT.—Quite the find of the season. Took his cricket very seriously, and developed into a very useful wicket-keeper. Stood up to the fast bowling exceptionally well, and will, with added practice and experience, develop into a good "stumper". Will some day make a useful batsman. A good runner between the wickets.

R. A. HITCH.—Plays with a straight bat, but at present lacks scoring strokes. When he learns to get his left shoulder further round he will make many more runs. A good field when thoroughly awake, and can also keep wicket. Very fair change bowler.

S. B. WEBB.—Was awarded his colours owing to his good fielding. Usually a very safe catch, but occasionally had his off days. Good ground field with an accurate return. Does not pretend to bat, but occasionally hits a "four."

G. F. SIMPSON.—Did not bowl his lobbs quite so successfully as he did last year. Can make the ball spin, but must try and use a little more guile. Poor batsman with a weak defence. Very fair field and a keen cricketer.

E. L. HESSE.—Will some day make runs, but at present lacks confidence. Can hit a ball hard, but does not always pick the right one. Good field, though somewhat slow. Keen cricketer.

The Old Shastonian Club Tour.

WE were singularly fortunate in the weather we encountered during the 1922 Cricket Tour, and throughout the trip we met with bright sunshine and little rain. This factor, combined with an excellently-arranged fixture list and consistently good wickets, ensured a most enjoyable tour, in the course of which we played four matches, resulting in three victories and one defeat.

We started off from Shaftesbury on the morning of July 27th, and motored the entire way to Southsea, lunching *en route*, and arriving between 3 and 4 in the afternoon. For this pleasant means of reaching "the starting post" our very best thanks are due to Dr. Tovey, who so kindly secured the bus and put it at the disposal of the Club.

On the following day, July 28th, we encountered Southsea. By an unfortunate misunderstanding, this match, which was to have been a whole-day fixture, could not be commenced till the afternoon, when the home team won the toss and opened on a good wicket to the bowling of Mr. W. G. Tovey and Mr. Streather. Only three of the Southsea team reached double figures, and they were all dismissed for a total of 99, Mr. Streather securing 6 wickets for just over 5 runs apiece, to one of which Mr. W. G. Tovey helped him by a brilliant catch at third slip. We opened none too well by losing 4 wickets for 29 runs, but a valuable 49 (not out) by Mr. R. B. Minchin, backed up by L. G. Prideaux and F. G. Minchin, enabled us to win comfortably by 27 runs and 3 wickets.

The following morning we crossed to the Isle of Wight, and in the afternoon played Ryde, again losing the toss. Ryde opened on a perfect wicket and totalled 184, including an excellent "knock" of 66 by Major Love. Mr. W. G. Tovey and S. Burrow opened for the Club, and were not long in settling in. Both played with confidence from the start, and by excellent batting and well-judged running between the wickets, put defeat out of the question before the first wicket fell at 141. We had won the match before the second wicket went down, and curiously enough each of the opening pair secured 81.

Having made Ryde our headquarters, we motored over to Shanklin on the Monday (July 31st), and took the field, after losing the toss for the third time. Without disparaging the home side in any way, it must be conceded that they were somewhat lucky in reaching a total of 207, several catches just failing to go to hand, and one "sitter" being dropped owing to an "end-on" collision between two of our field. In reply to this we were able to secure only 161, of which Mr. W. G. Tovey

contributed an excellent innings of 68. Dr. Tovey made a strenuous effort to pull the game out of the fire, but could get no-one to stay with him. S. Burrow, D. C. D. Ellerton and Mr. Minchin all left when they seemed well "settled in," and Shanklin was thus the first and last side to which we had to lower our colours.

The final match of the tour was played at Newport on August 1st, and provided an excellent game and a fittingly exciting climax to the tour. Having won the toss for the first time, Dr. Tovey sent Mr. W. G. Tovey and S. Burrow to open, and the former excelled his previous performance by playing the best innings of the tour, and collecting, incidentally, the only century. It was a superlatively good "knock," and made all the more creditable by the fact that very long boundaries made it necessary to run out almost every hit. Eventually we were enabled to declare with a total of 211 for 5 wickets, leaving our opponents over two hours to get the necessary runs, a by no means impossible task as events proved. They reached 71 before the second wicket fell, but thereafter no-one could stand up against Dr. Tovey's bowling. The latter had the batsmen "guessing" the whole time, and at one time looked like securing even better results than the excellent figures of 6 wickets for 66 runs indicate. In his third over, Dr. Tovey did the "hat-trick," and in spite of a plucky stand by the last pair, who put on 47 for the tenth wicket, we won with time to spare.
