Cricket.

THE past Cricket season opened under somewhat chilly
climatic conditions, but towards the end of June the
weather became much warmer, and on two occasions
only did rain interfere with matches.

Five old colours remained from the 1922 team, leaving six
vacancies to fill. Five of these were soon filled, but no suit-
able candidate was forthcoming for No. 11. After considerable
experimenting and thoughtful discussion between the Masters
and the School Captain, it was decided not to award the
eleventh colour. By doing this, we rather created a precedent,
but it was felt that if one boy was worth his colours, six others
were equally as good.

Consistency rather than brilliance was the characteristic
of the first eleven. No centuries were scored, but each
member of the team was worth runs, and it was always hard
to decide the correct batting order. The team was a little
slow and uninteresting during the earlier part of the season,
but experience, combined with a few early successes, put more
enterprise into their batting, and runs came at a more rapid
pace. The last match of the term provided a fitting close to a
successful season, F. N. Windebank and L. D. D. Brett making

an excellent last-wicket stand, which resulted in the defeat of the Old Shastonians by the narrow margin of 8 runs.

R. A. Hitch was easily the best all-round cricketer on the side, and he would undoubtedly have made many more runs if he had only been a little more patient. Icke and Dean played several good innings, but they did not make quite the improvement we anticipated. Coaker was undoubtedly the most improved player on the side, and Egremont was often very difficult to get out.

In Hitch and Icke we had two very useful School bowlers, but unfortunately they were both very similar in pace, and we had no slow bowler with whom to vary the attack. J. E. R. Dean and F. N. Windebank were our only change bowlers, and could generally be relied on to take a wicket when required. We sincerely hope that next year some boy will come forward and develop into a slow bowler, and by so doing remedy a defect which is an appreciable handicap to our School cricket at the present time.

The fielding was not as good as it might have been, and too many catches were dropped. The ground fielding was quite satisfactory, and the returns to the wicket were considerably better than last season. Brett kept wicket very pluckily and took the fast bowling well. He is not at present quite a good "stumper," but the absence of a slow bowler gave him very little practice in this respect.

The Second XI. were only a very moderate side, and they would have been even weaker without the assistance of R. H. Hitch, J. S. Windebank and R. B. Brown—three members of the "Under 14" XI. The batting and bowling were far from being strong, and the fielding was uncertain. A. J. Combes and F. Hoddinott both have lots of cricket in them, and were tried for the First XI. R. H. Hitch, J. S. Windebank and K. G. Mitchell did most of the bowling.

The "Under 14" XI. was a very good one, stronger than any we have had for several seasons. In R. B. Brown, R. H. Hitch, J. S. Windebank and D. N. Hoddinott, we had four very promising young cricketers; and G. C. Tovey, Henry Young, the brothers List, and J. P. Cross will all make runs in the near future. J. S. Windebank and R. H. Hitch promise well as bowlers, and were good enough to dismiss their opponents very cheaply. The fielding reached a high level of efficiency, and in the match at Salisbury, especially, some excellent catches were taken.

The Masters' XI. had a very enjoyable season, but as a team they were not very consistent, and consequently lost

rather more matches than usual. Dr. Tovey made three excellent scores when runs were badly needed, and Mr. Streather was again very successful with the ball. Our two matches with Bulford Garrison were a most welcome addition to our fixture list.

In conclusion, we offer our very best thanks to those masters and boys who spent hours coaching at the nets, and also to J. E. R. Dean (our School captain) for the good example of enthusiastic sportsmanship which he set the whole school. He and his team played good cricket, which was followed most keenly, and commented upon most favourably by many local lovers of the game.

The "Johnson" Batting Cup was awarded to R. A. Hitch, and the same player also won a cricket ball presented by R. H. Symons, Esq., to whom we offer our sincere thanks.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Warminster School, home, May 16th, Won.

—Warminster batted first, but did not play J. Brice's slow off-breaks with any confidence, and were dismissed for 40. Brice took 7 wickets for 18 runs. School did not bat very well, A. G. Egremont being the best performer with 27 runs to his credit. School's total was 88.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Hinton St. Mary, home, May 19th., Drawn.

—Our opponents batted first, and declared at 152 for 6 wkts. This score was entirely due to a magnificent batting display by Gen. R. H. Poore, who scored 110 (not out) out of 152. School replied with 127 for 6 wickets, but time would not permit a finish. Dr. Tovey batted extremely well, and was not out (68) when stumps were drawn. School fielding was fair.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Mr. C. H. Francis's XI., home, May 21st, Lost.

—School batted first, but except for Mr. Minchin (25), found runs hard to get against the bowling of Capt. Pepper and W. Brockliss. Our total of 69 was only just surpassed by our opponents, whose victory was mainly due to a very valuable 29 (not out) by Capt. Pepper. School fielding was quite reliable, and Brett was good behind the stumps. In the second innings we scored 125 for 6 wkts., Mr. Streather and Icke being the chief contributors.

S.G.S. v. Motcombe C.C., home, May 26th, Won.

—Motcombe started badly, and soon had four wickets down for 14 runs. Twenty-one runs were put on for the fifth wicket, but no further serious resistance was offered, and the last wicket fell when the score reached 59. Icke and Hitch both bowled

well, and Windebank took the last three wickets for 4 runs only. Brett kept wicket exceptionally well, and had no byes registered against him. School had little difficulty in winning, Egremont playing a very good innings for 67. He was ably backed up by Stirling (32) and Hitch (27), the final total being 182.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Warminster School, away, May 26th, Lost.

With the one exception of F. Hoddinott, our captain, the School's batting was very weak. Hoddinott carried the side on his shoulders, and was undefeated at the close with 21 to his credit. Our total was 41. Warminster replied with 70, Tinkler and Hoddinott being the most successful bowlers. A curious feature of their innings was that nine of their batsmen were clean bowled, the other one being l.b.w.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Bulford Garrison, away, May 30th, Lost.—

School batted first, but started disastrously, 3 wickets being down for 9 runs. Icke, however, proved to be in form, and batted very nicely for 50. The Bulford fielding was very good, two of our batsmen being run out while attempting short runs. Our total of 88 was not nearly large enough, and was passed for the loss of 5 wickets, Lieut. Vezey batting splendidly for 61. The School fielding was not very good considering the excellent condition of the out-field.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. South Wilts, away, June 2nd, Won.—

South Wilts found Mr. Streather's bowling a little too fast for them, and were dismissed for 52, Mr. Streather taking eight wickets for 23. School fielded very well, and Mr. Watts took two nice catches at third man, off Mr. Streather. H. F. B. Brown and J. Icke opened our innings, and scored 28 without loss. Then, however, misfortune arrived, Mr. Minchin, J. E. R. Dean and Mr. Streather all being dismissed for "ducks." Dr. Tovey, however, by very careful cricket, pulled the game out of the fire, and was not out with 62 to his credit, out of our total of 116 for 8 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Fifehead Magdalen, home, June 6th, Won.—

R. A. Hitch and J. Icke gave the School a good start by putting on 56 for the first wicket. Coaker also batted well for his 37. The scoring, however, was very slow, far too many half-volleys and long-hops being allowed to go unpunished. Dean declared the innings closed at 136 for 8 wickets, and Hitch and Icke then proceeded to dismiss their opponents for the small total of 21. Hitch bowled extremely well, his figures reading—5 overs, 2 maidens, 3 runs, 5 wickets. Fifehead followed on and secured 78 for 4 wickets. School had little fielding to do, but what there was was well done.

S.G.S. v. Warminster Town, home, June 9th, Lost.—School, with the exception of R. A. Hitch, batted very feebly, and were dismissed for 90. The innings was a very monotonous one to watch, and it was hard to understand why half-volleys and long-hops should have been treated with such caution and respect. Warminster replied with 114 for 9 wickets. School fielded well, especially Brice at extra-cover.

S.G.S. v. Shaftesbury Town, home, June 13th, Won.—Although the Town Cricket Club had decided not to run a regular team for the season, we were glad that they were able, with a little outside help, to bring a team against our 1st XI. School batted first, and thanks to a few small double-figured scores, reached a total of 96. The Town replied with 48, many of their batsmen shewing that they were evidently out of practice. A second effort produced 60, of which G. Atkinson made 32. School's fielding was good, especially J. Dean's catch at mid-off.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, away, June 13th, Won.—The chief feature of our batting was an admirable first-innings display by R. B. Brown, who carried his bat through the innings for 42. In the second innings, R. H. Hitch and J. S. Windebank batted well. Our fielding was good, and three capital catches were made by R. B. Brown, H. Young and E. H. Stickland. The bowling was good and had alternately; all our bowlers spoilt their efforts by bowling too much on the leg side.

S.G.S. v. St. Boniface College, Warminster, home, June 16th, Drawn.—The chief feature of our batting was an excellent innings of 75 by C. W. Coaker. J. E. R. Dean, Brice and Icke, also batted well, and enabled us to declare with the excellent total of 214 for 5 wickets. For our opponents, A. Bolland batted very well for 55, and B. Gale, whose innings of 9 runs in more than an hour was not nearly as "breezy" as his name would suggest, played out time with the score at 85 for 8 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School, away, June 20th, Won.—School batted first, Icke and R. A. Hitch opening the innings. The former did not long survive, for after scoring 5 he chopped a wide full-pitch into third-man's hands. Hitch, however, batted very well, his score of 53 including some nice off-drives and an excellent smack for six. Geyton and Hesse also hit out lustily, and enabled us to reach a total of 174. Wimborne started well, but Hitch was in good form with the ball; and they were eventually dismissed for 61. Our fielding was quite good; Icke and Geyton each securing

good catches. Hitch took 8 wickets for 28 runs. For Wimborne, Lucas made an admirable catch at square-leg at the expense of Brice's wicket.

S.G.S. v. Kilmington & Stourton, home, June 23rd, Drawn.—

Our visitors arrived late, with the result that we were unable to finish the game. Dean lost the toss, and School was sent in first. We started badly by losing two good wickets for 7 runs. Coaker (62) and Egremont (42), however, batted admirably, and put on no less than 114 for the third wicket. In reply to our total of 143 for 6 wickets, our visitors scored 88 for 6, the game being left drawn. Hitch bowled quite well, but Icke was not in his best form; and Brett was not quite at his best behind the stumps. Geyton and Egremont each secured excellent catches, the former a "skier" at mid-on, and the latter a right-handed one at cover.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Milton Abbas School, home, June 27th, Won.—

We batted first, but R. B. Brown and F. Hoddinott were the only batsmen to face the bowling with any confidence. Runs came very slowly, and the running between the wickets was extremely poor, several easy runs being lost through disinclination to run, and hesitation. Our total of 57, though small, was large enough to give us an easy victory, our opponents scoring 24 only. J. S. Windebank and J. L. Cole bowled quite well, the former bowling 9 overs, seven of which were maidens, and securing 4 wickets for 7 runs. The fielding and catching were quite good, and Stirling kept wicket very creditably.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., home, June 28th, Lost.—

This popular all-day match was played in glorious weather on the first typical cricket day of the season. School started badly by losing H. F. B. Brown and J. Icke for 14 runs. R. A. Hitch and Mr. Minchin then improved matters by carrying the score to 55, before lunch, Mr. Minchin then being l.b.w. After lunch, Hitch continued to bat nicely, and he was ably supported by Coaker and Dr. Tovey. Five wickets were down for 101, and then a collapse ensued and we were all out for 110. Mr. Tovey's XI. started well, Messrs. Robson & Mills scoring 48, when the former was bowled by Mr. Streather. Our total was passed before the fourth wicket fell, and the last wicket went down for 190, Mr. F. W. Mills being first in and last out for a well-played innings of 75. School fielding was quite good at times, J. Icke being responsible for a fine catch at point.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Bulford Garrison, home, June 30th, Drawn.—

Bulford brought a strong batting side, and gave us an admirable exhibition of forceful cricket. Capt. Harriot (85)

and Capt. Corke (59) were the chief contributors to their excellent total of 204 for 5 wickets. School made a bad start by losing 3 wickets for 19 runs: Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey, however, batted well and added 60 runs for the fourth wkt., the former obtaining 57, and the latter 23. Mr. Watts (28 not out) was also in excellent form, and with Hesse's very useful contribution of 13 (not out), enabled us to play out time with our score at 155 for 8 wickets.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Dr. C. A. Ensor's XI., home, July 2nd, Won.

—This enjoyable match, which has been one of our chief fixtures since 1909, was played in gloriously warm weather, and resulted in a win for us by the comparatively small margin of 18 runs. The batting of our first few batsmen was quite poor, and it was mainly due to J. E. R. Dean (29 not out) and E. L. Hesse (26)—our 9th and 10th wickets respectively—that we were enabled to score a total of 144. Our opponents also found runs difficult to get, but A. G. Ensor (46) and A. G. Egremont (27) made an excellent attempt to win the match. Egremont played the fast bowling very well, and made several nice shots on the on-side. Brett, our wicket-keeper, unfortunately hurt his hand and was unable to finish the game. Mr. Streather (4 for 33) and R. A. Hitch (4 for 30) were our most successful bowlers.

S.G.S. v. King Edward VI's School, Southampton, away, July 4th, Lost.

—School batted first on a very fast wicket, and obtained 134. R. A. Hitch (56) batted excellently, and J. E. R. Dean (35) also showed that the bowling was not difficult. The rest of the team gave a very poor display, and the last four wickets fell for 9 runs only. Our opponents were not a good batting side, but for some reason or other our bowling was extremely weak. Hitch, towards the end, bowled with the worst of luck, but both he and Icke at times bowled nothing but half-volleys, and seemed to think that the only way of getting a batsman out was by bowling straight at the wicket. Eight wickets fell for 97, and the last two batsmen were allowed to score 52 between them. We must point out that these runs were nearly all made on the leg side, and yet we fielded an extra-cover throughout the whole match. The fielding also was quite poor, F. N. Windebank missing two "sitters" and two difficult ones in the country, any one of which, had it been caught, would have won the game for us. Geyton, too, also missed a chance at a critical moment. A word of praise is due to N. Rufferr for winning the match for Southampton. Going in 10th when 52 runs were required to win, he hit out at anything overpitched, and was unbeaten at the end with 37 to his credit.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Warminster Grammar School (Under 14), home, July 4th, Won.—School batted first and gave ample proof of their being a good batting side. Thanks to good scores by J. S. Windebank (36 not out), E. List (18), Manton (18), Hoddinott (16), Brown (15) and Hitch (15), we reached a total of 136. This proved far too great for our opponents, who were dismissed for 34, Hoddinott, W. List and Young being the bowlers. School fielding was good, and many excellent catches were made.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Sherborne Town, home, July 7th, Won.—Sherborne batted first, and their score of 108 was almost entirely due to an excellent innings of 62 by R. S. Thompson. Mr. Watts (4 for 31) and Mr. Streather (3 for 23) were our most successful bowlers. H. F. B. Brown (30) and R. A. Hitch (20) gave the School an excellent start, and their efforts were supplemented by those of Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin. When stumps were drawn we had scored 143 for 5 wickets.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Milton Abbas School, away, July 9th, Lost.—This match provided us with the worst performance of the season, and the less we say about it the better. Our bowling was quite ordinary, and the fielding was very weak, Hoddinott and K. G. Mitchell dropping two simple catches. Windebank (4 for 37) was the better bowler, but Hitch (6 for 31) was more destructive. To our opponents total of 92 we replied with 58 only, A. J. Combes being the only one to reach double figures. Considering that we had previously beaten them on our own ground, it was indeed a bad performance.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, home, July 11th, Won.—R. H. Hitch, J. S. Windebank and R. B. Brown, all batted well for the School, and made runs at a good pace, and Henry Young showed promise. The visiting team found our wicket too fast for them, and succumbed to the bowling of R. H. Hitch, who took 7 wickets for 19 runs; J. S. Windebank kept the better length, and took the other 3 for 14 runs. Our fielding was good.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. South Wilts C.C., home, July 14th, Lost.—South Wilts batted first, and scored 182 for 5 wkts., Captain Clarke batting well for 78 not out. H. F. B. Brown was the best of our bowlers with 3 wickets for 40, his first five overs being all maidens. Our reply was very weak, as Mr. Minchin, Mr. Watts and H. F. B. Brown were the only ones to reach double figures. Mr. Watts (22 not out) seemed to be in good form, but he could get no-one to stay with him, and we were all out for 96.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Pyt House School, home, July 19th, Drawn.—Rain prevented an early start. A good innings of 38 by J. Healing enabled our opponents to declare at 104 for 9 wkts. Windebank and Hitch were our most successful bowlers, but they were not well supported in the field. Brown and Combes opened the batting for us; and scored '20 before Combes was caught. Hitch then scored freely, and when stumps were drawn we had scored 54 for 3 wickets.

S.G.S. v. The Masters, home, July 15th, Won.—School batted first, and compiled 186—Hitch (39), Brice (28) and Mr. Extras (30) being the chief scorers. The batting throughout the team was quite consistent; and several excellent shots were made on the off side. The Masters were unable to reach this total, although Mr. Minchin hit out vigorously and secured 54—including 1 six and 9 fours. The last wicket fell to Dean's bowling with the score at 140. The School fielding was much better than usual, F. N. Windebank securing quite a good catch at third man.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Sherborne C.C., away, July 21st, Lost.—After having beaten our opponents on our own ground, we gave a very poor exhibition of batting at Sherborne. Dr. Tovey (37 not out) was the only one to offer any resistance, and we were all dismissed for the small total of 64. A word of praise is due to Brett, who, going in last, helped Dr. Tovey to add 20 for the last wicket, his own contribution being a most valuable single! Our batting was undoubtedly poor, but the wicket had been watered, and the ball was doing quite unexpected tricks. Later in the day it became much easier, and our opponents easily beat us with a total of 170 for 6 wickets. J. Dean took an excellent catch at mid-on.

S.G.S. v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., home, July 23rd, Drawn.—The weather was very unkind to us, and cricket was only possible for two hours. Hitch, Icke and Coaker, all batted well, the first two especially playing bright and attractive cricket. We declared at 131 for two wickets, but shortly after our opponents had started their innings the rain again started, and the match had to be abandoned. During our innings an unfortunate accident occurred, the opposing wicket-keeper being struck in the face by a rising ball which, unluckily, fractured his nose.

S.G.S. v. Old Shastonians, home, July 25th, Won.—The Old Boys batted first, and runs came at a good rate; G. E. Bowléy (51), E. J. Shepard (30 not out) and R. J. - J. E. R. DEAN, *Captain*.—A batsman with few scoring strokes on the off side. Plays forward well on a fast wicket, but still lacks confidence in his back play. Very fair medium-paced bowler. Good field. Made a good captain.
- J. ICKE.—A good all-round cricketer. Cuts very well, but has one very weak stroke which often costs him his wicket. Good bowler, with an easy action, but soon tires. Good field.
- L. D. D. BRETT.—A very good wicket-keeper and a keen cricketer. Has no scoring strokes, but is often difficult to get out. On several occasions kept up his wicket when things were going badly. Is usually a sound judge of a run.
- R. A. HITCH.—The best all-round cricketer in the team. Has plenty of defence, and has now cultivated a good off-drive. Can hit very hard, but if he wishes to make high scores he must cultivate more patience. Good bowler, with an excellent length. Very fair field.
- E. L. HESSE.—Very fair left-handed batsman, but did not live up to expectations. Cuts in rather an unorthodox manner, and does not get his right leg in the correct position for scoring. On his day is a good field with a powerful return.
- C. W. COAKER.—Has developed into a very sound batsman. Watches the ball very carefully and is rarely tempted to make a silly shot. Must learn to get his left shoulder and foot in their correct positions, and will then make lots of runs. Rather slow in the field.

A. G. EGREMONT.—Started the season well, and was soon awarded his colours. Not a stylish batsman, but is difficult to get out. Makes all his runs on the leg side. Must learn to drive and cut. Good field.

E. B. BRICE.—A disappointing batsman. Treats long-hops with the greatest respect, and consequently makes few runs. Has plenty of cricket in him, but at present lacks confidence. Good field, especially in the covers.

F. N. WINDEBANK.—Did not make the progress we anticipated, but finished the season in a very promising manner. A very fair change-bowler with a slight swing from leg. Fair ground field, but a most uncertain catch.

R. GEYTON.—Hits very hard, but has little defence. Rarely looked comfortable against good bowling. Very fair field and a keen cricketer.

The Old Shastonian Club Tour.

THE weather was considerably less favourable on the occasion of the 1923 Cricket Tour than in the previous year, and Jupiter Pluvius was perhaps the most formidable opponent we had to contend with; but though his attentions handicapped us on the cricket field, they failed to detract in any degree from the enjoyment of the tour, which was as complete a success as any of those previously undertaken. Rain necessitated one match of the two arranged against Ryde being cancelled, and caused that against Ventnor to be abandoned early in the afternoon, when victory seemed practically assured. Of the remaining three games, we won two with considerable ease, while the third was left a draw with defeat out of the question.

The programme, this year, was limited entirely to matches in the Isle of Wight, and our headquarters were installed at Sandown, which not only proved a very convenient centre, but was eminently satisfactory from the point of view of hotel accommodation and the general amenities of a seaside resort.

We left Shaftesbury on Thursday, July 26th, and reached our destination *via* Southampton and Ryde.

The first match, on the following day, was against Shanklin, the only team that succeeded in lowering our colours last year. On this occasion, however, we exacted an ample revenge. The home team batted first on an excellent wicket, and thanks to some really good bowling by Mr. Streather and C. E. Pearce, whose styles formed a capital contrast, were dismissed for a total of 84, these two bowlers sharing the wickets between them. In reply, we totalled 149, to which Mr. Wilson Tovey contributed an invaluable 56.

As already stated, the Saturday's match against Ryde had unfortunately to be abandoned owing to rain, but Monday dawned fine for the game against Newport. The Newport ground is the best on the island, and we repeated our victory of last year with even more emphasis. Winning the toss, we took first knock, and just topped the second hundred, largely owing to a 44 by Dr. Tovey and a 30 by Mr. Minchin, who put on between them just on 70 for the fourth-wicket. Mr. Streather and R. C. Wyatt were next highest scorers with 27 and 24 (not out) respectively. Our opponents could do very little with Pearce's bowling, as his figures of 7 wickets for 24 runs sufficiently indicate.

On Tuesday, the 31st, we met Ventnor, and the game produced some of the brightest cricket of the tour, though rain in the afternoon unhappily precluded a decision. We opened the batting, and Mr. Wilson Tovey and G. E. Bowley gave us an excellent start by putting on 65 for the first wicket. This total was more than doubled for the second wicket, when the first-named batsman was partnered by Mr. Minchin, and a hard-hit 36 by C. E. Pearce and a further 40 by F. C. Innocent "put us on velvet." However, with only two wickets down for 45 in our opponents' venture, a torrential downpour stopped cricket for the day and robbed us of a highly probable victory.

The final match took place on the following day against Ryde, and despite the previous day's rain, the wicket rolled out fairly well. The home team won the toss, but elected to field first. Our total of 221 was largely due to some hurricane hitting by Pearce, who collected 67 in as many minutes (including a big straight hit for 6), and a very fine 60 by Dr. Tovey, who started in more subdued fashion than his partner, but in the second half of his innings hit magnificently and scored at an even faster rate, his last 30 runs including 7 fours. With three of our opponents' wickets down for 5 runs, and four for 28, we looked to have the game "in our pockets;" but a good stand for the fifth and sixth wickets robbed us of victory, and the game had to be left drawn.

Our heartiest thanks are again due to Mr. Minchin (the Secretary of the Club) for all his efforts and energy in arranging fixtures, hotel accommodation, and the innumerable details which ensured the success of the tour.

Memorial Hall Opening.

TUESDAY, October 16th, will ever be memorable in the School's history, for on that day our new Hall was formally opened by the Earl of Shaftesbury. Punctually at three o'clock his lordship arrived, and a number of old boys who had served in the war, joined with the School Cadet Corps to form a guard of honour for him. He was met at the School gates by Mr. George Gordon and Mr. R. W. Borley (Chairman and Vice-Chairman, respectively, of the Governing Body), the Rev. N. S. Lawrie (Rector of Cann), the Rev. F. W. Aldous (Rector of Shaftesbury), and Dr. Tovey. The Hall was packed with parents and friends of the School, and on the platform, in addition to the Earl of Shaftesbury, were the Governors of the School, the Mayor (Mr. C. J. Stretch) and Corporation of Shaftesbury, the Masters and the Choir.

The service opened with the familiar hymn, "For all the Saints," sung to *Vaughan Williams's* fine tune, followed by prayers offered by the Rev. N. S. Lawrie, Psalm cxxvi., a Lesson from *Ecclesiasticus*: "Let us now praise famous men," and that best of all War hymns, "O Valiant Hearts." Dr. Tovey next read the names of the twenty-seven old boys in whose memory the Hall had been erected, and then Lord Shaftesbury removed the Union Jack from the beautifully-carved oak tablet which recorded their names. Above the names was seen the Borough Arms, and underneath the very appropriate words, "Their Sacrifice is our Example." When Lord Shaftesbury had returned to his place, the choir sang *Field's* beautiful anthem, "God shall wipe away all tears," after which the Rev. Aldous pronounced the Benediction.

When all were seated, the Earl of Shaftesbury gave an eloquent and inspiring address. He said that the Hall they were that day opening with so much goodwill and so much hope for the future of the School, signified primarily, perhaps, the intention of the Governors to lose no opportunity of furthering the interests of the School, and of keeping abreast its needs and of public school life generally. That hall would make a fine addition to the School, and he congratulated the Headmaster on that handsome extension of the School premises. But it had a deeper significance than that, because it marked surely the expression of their gratitude to their Heavenly Father for the lives surrendered in His service, lives cheerfully laid down for God, for King, and for country. That hall was their memorial to those 27 gallant men who died on service in the Great War. Of noble, uplifting, and immortal memory was the self-surrender of those who went forth to do battle, never, alas, to return. "And you, young men,"

proceeded his lordship, "let your thoughts dwell sometimes upon that great example, of which this hall is a reminder. Let your hearts and thoughts absorb some of the atmosphere of self-surrender enshrined within these walls, so that you may be caught up by the same spirit, ready at all times to respond to the call of King and country. Let your hearts, let your whole aspect of life, your whole outlook on life, be attuned with a like readiness to answer any call which your country may make upon you.

"Please God," continued his lordship, "we, in our generation, may never again see the tragedies and the devastation which we have been called upon to witness during those four terrible years of war. Some of you may have thought—I think I may include myself amongst them—in the years preceding the war, that if war had to come, if war was inevitable, then surely it would be a purging and purifying angel that would save the nations, our people included amongst them, from decadent influences, from corruption and from indolence, and would restore to us some of the finer qualities of human life and character. But now there can be no two opinions about the horrors and evils of war, which bring nothing but destruction and sorrow, devastation and ruin in its train. We have seen the whole forces of evil unloosed upon the world, forces which Christians and the civilised world are now engaged in endeavouring to compass and reduce once more to normal and controllable dimensions. We are finding it a task of almost superhuman difficulty. If you young men are not called upon to face the tragedies which those who went forth from this School were called upon to face, depend upon it, beyond all doubt, that opportunities will arise in your lives to follow their example and respond with a like readiness and cheerfulness to the call your country may make upon you to serve it as good citizens. Let it be your one desire to promote the good of the community in which you live; let it be your one aim and object to preserve the truth, to safeguard all that is pure and good and true, conscious always of that fine example of courage, of steadfastness, of endurance, set you by those who trod the precincts of the School before you." (Applause).

At the conclusion of his Lordship's address, the National Anthem was sung, and then from outside the building came the familiar strains of the Last Post, followed after a moment's pause by the Reveille. The buglers, who did their part splendidly, were Sergt. O. R. G. Phillipson and Corpl. G. R. Imber. A hearty vote of thanks to the Earl of Shaftesbury was next proposed by Mr. Gordon and seconded by Mr. Borley, and after Lord Shaftesbury had suitably replied, the visitors adjourned for tea.

Thus ended a most impressive and dignified ceremony, which lasted about fifty minutes, and was, we believe, thoroughly appreciated by all who were present. In the first place we must offer our cordial thanks to Lord Shaftesbury for so kindly coming to unveil our Memorial, and for giving us such a splendid address. We must also thank the School Choir for their admirable rendering of the musical items; they were augmented for the occasion by four of our old boy singers—G. E. Atkinson, A. J. Prince, H. A. Roles and W. J. N. Bolitho—and the admirable tempo, and the feeling they infused into the softer passages, were a joy to listen to. In conclusion, we would also thank the members of the Old Shastonian Club for the beautiful wreath they put at the foot of the tablet, bearing the words—"Our Sorrow and our Pride. From the Old Shastonian Club." Next morning this wreath was placed on the grave of T. N. Langford, the only one of the twenty-seven who was buried in Shaftesbury.
