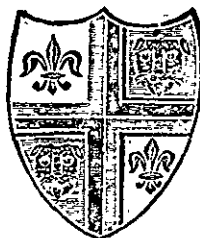

Cricket.

THE Cricket Season of 1924, as far as the weather was concerned, needs no description here, and may be written down in meteorological language as a long series of primary and secondary depressions with further outlooks invariably unsettled. The persistent rains in May seriously interfered with net practice, and even when play was possible, dull skies and cold winds were the rule rather than the exception. In spite of this, however, we must consider ourselves fortunate in being able to play as much cricket as we actually did. Of the thirty matches on the fixture list, two only had to be "scratched," and one of these we were able to re-arrange later in the season. The soft wickets were not conducive to very high scoring, but we must offer our heartiest congratulations to Dr. Tovey on his brilliant century against Bulford Garrison—a fine performance when the question of "anno domini" is taken into consideration.

Lack of practice in the early stages of the term caused the 1st XI. to start their season somewhat shakily, but, when once they had settled down, they improved very rapidly and developed into a good School XI. Nine matches were played, five of which were won, one drawn, and three lost. Bournemouth was the only School to lower our colours. The strength of the team undoubtedly lay in the batting, which, if not brilliant, was certainly reasonably consistent. A. G. Egremont and C. W. Coaker were perhaps the best batsmen, but L. D. D.

Brett was a tower of strength to his side, his stolid defence on many occasions proving invaluable. In A. J. Combes we have a very promising cricketer, who should make lots of runs next year. He has all the strokes and a free action, but has still a lot to learn of the finer points of the game. F. N. Windebank, J. S. Windebank, E. B. Brice and F. Hoddinott made useful scores on occasions, but were often dismissed very much too cheaply.

The bowling was not quite up to the standard of recent years, but even this was better than we anticipated at the beginning of the season. A. G. Egremont gave one especially fine bowling performance at Bulford, but J. S. Windebank was undoubtedly the better bowler. The latter's length was always dependable, even if, like all the others, his bowling lacked that bit of "devil," without which wickets can rarely be taken very cheaply. F. Hoddinott and C. W. Coaker were fair change bowlers, while G. J. B. Brice's slow off-breaks were good enough to get him his place in the team. F. N. Windebank and E. B. Brice each took a few wickets, but their "length" left much to be desired.

The fielding was, unfortunately, not good, and was, perhaps, the worst feature of the team. We must admit, however, that circumstances were rarely conducive to brilliance in this important branch of the game. Rain severely curtailed the time given to fielding practice, and the ball was often "greasy" and the hands cold. Brett was, of course, a notable exception, his wicket-keeping being excellent in nearly every match. E. B. Brice, C. W. Coaker, A. G. Egremont and J. S. Windebank were perhaps the "best of the bunch," but even they had their "off" days.

The Second XI. were good enough to win two of their five matches, but they were very far from being a good side. Here, again, the bowling was the worst feature, and the fielding was unreliable. The team certainly contained some batting, even if it were not all of an orthodox type, and this would have been undoubtedly stronger if there had been better bowlers in the school to practise against. At the present moment we are exceedingly short of promising bowlers in the Upper School, and unless we can discover some hidden talent early next season, we are not going to dismiss other teams very cheaply.

The "Under 14" XI. was an unbeaten side, whose successes were due more to all-round efficiency than to the efforts of any particular member of the team. The batting, bowling and fielding were all above the average, and several of its members should do well for the School in a few years time. J. P. Cross, D. H. Tovey and W. E. Loney were, perhaps, the

most promising batsmen on the side, but several of the others have plenty of cricket in them. In J. P. Waters and H. G. Gray the team possessed two very useful bowlers, who were usually good enough to dismiss their opponents quite cheaply. C. D. Hazell, D. H. Tovey and H. M. Gale are also bowlers in the making. The fielding was quite good, and compared more than favourably with the two senior elevens.

The Masters' XI., as usual, had a very enjoyable season, and won as many matches as they lost. As a team, they did not always do themselves justice, and were often dismissed for smaller totals than they were really worth. Mr. Streather, Mr. Watts and Mr. Minchin did the bulk of the bowling, and Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin were the chief run-getters.

In conclusion, we offer our sincere thanks to all those masters and boys who helped to make the season such an enjoyable one. The weather was often very trying, but even that could not detract from the general atmosphere of geniality and good sportsmanship which characterised our School cricket. In L. D. D. Brett we had a "skipper" who was popular with everybody. He took his cricket very seriously, was the essence of unselfishness, took advice and gave it, and became a sound judge of the game. Our best wishes go with him to his new sphere of life, and we shall look forward to seeing him keep wicket for the "Thespids" in the very near future!

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. Fifehead Magdalen, May 14th, home, Lost.—This match was played on a very soft wicket, and consequently runs were scored slowly. A. G. Egremont and C. W. Coaker gave the School a fair start by putting on 38 runs for the first wicket. Of the remainder, J. L. Cole was the only one to reach double figures, and the side were all out for 80. Thanks to some hard hitting by C. Barnes (38) and the Rev. J. Vincent (24), our opponents reached a total of 105, Egremont being the most successful bowler with 3 wickets for 10 runs.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Hinton St. Mary, May 17th, home, Won.—Dr. Tovey (38), Mr. Minchin (40) and C. W. Coaker (35 not out) all batted well, and enabled us to declare with the score at 155 for 4 wickets. Our opponents, who were far from being at full strength, fared very badly against the bowling of Mr. Minchin (3 for 0) and Mr. Streather (4 for 6), and were all dismissed for 29 runs.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Bulford Garrison, May 28th, away, Won.—School batted first, but gave a very moderate display, and had 8 wickets down for 79. A. J. Combes (28) then played a

good innings, and with L. D. D. Brett and J. S. Windebank as partners, enabled us to reach a total of 119. Bulford looked like winning easily, 96 being scored for 4 wickets. A. G. Egremont then went on to bowl, and performed the greatest feat of the season by dismissing the last six batsmen for 16 runs. Unfortunately for Bulford, one of their batsmen was absent, a fact which enabled us to win by one run. Captain Harriott played an excellent innings and carried his bat for 63 runs.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Warminster School (Under 14), May 31st, home, Won.—Our score of 79 was due chiefly to the efforts of J. P. Cross, D. H. Tovey, W. E. Loney and H. M. Gale, all of whom batted well on a very wet wicket. Warminster fared disastrously against the bowling of J. P. Waters and H. G. Gray, and were dismissed for the small total of 12 runs. Waters secured 6 wickets for 4 runs, and Gray 4 for 7. The School fielded well, several good catches being made.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. South Wilts, June 7th, away, Lost.—We have rarely done ourselves justice on the Bemerton ground, and this year proved no exception. Dr. Tovey and Mr. Minchin put on 40 runs for the second wicket, but the next seven wickets added only 27 runs. Brett and Cole then improved matters by putting on 23 for the last wicket, Cole being 16 (not out). Our final total was 91. South Wilts started badly by losing C. E. Pearce in Egremont's first over, but an excellent stand was made by F. G. Strand and J. Davison, who added 73 for the second wicket. Their final score was 95 for 4 wickets. Mr. Minchin was our most successful bowler with 2 wickets for 12 runs, and Brett kept wicket admirably. The weather, however, was typical of the season.

S.G.S. ("A" team) v. Milton Abbas School, June 11th, away, Won.—A very slow-scoring match, which we eventually won by six runs. N. Cornthwaite (16) was the only member of the team to reach double figures, and we were all dismissed for 66 runs. In spite of several mistakes in the field, Milton Abbas could only reach a total of 60, K. G. Mitchell and F. Hoddinott being the most successful bowlers. Mitchell bowled 18 overs and had only 18 runs scored off him, while Hoddinott's three wickets cost him 9 runs.

S.G.S. v. Kilmington & Stourton C.C., June 14th, home, Won.—School batted first, and, with the exception of A. G. Egremont (23), fared very badly against the opposing bowlers. J. S. Windebank was the only other batsman to give Egremont any assistance, the pair scoring 33 out of our

very small total of 47. Much to our surprise, our opponents were unable to reach this score, and were dismissed for 36, A. G. Egremont and J. S. Windebank taking 4 wickets each.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Mr. C. H. Francis' XI., June 16th, home, Lost.—Mr. Francis brought a good side against us, but it was bad batting which lost us the match. Dr. Tovey and L. D. D. Brett reached double figures, but the others did little, and we were dismissed for 68. Our opponents lost five wickets before passing our total, and were eventually dismissed for 122. Mr. Streather (5 for 40) and Mr. Watts (4 for 38) were our most successful bowlers.

S.G.S. v. Bournemouth School, June 18th, away, Lost.—This was the First XI.'s worst performance of the season, and it is impossible to account for the poor display of cricket which they gave. The wicket was perfect, and quite fast enough for quick scoring. Egremont and Brett gave us a very good start by putting on 43 for the first wicket, but many of the others were out to really bad strokes. Bournemouth had little difficulty in passing our total of 105, and had scored 110 for 3 wickets when stumps were drawn. Our bowling was even poorer than our batting, Egremont especially being off form. The fielding was only fair, but a special word of commendation is due to Stirling for his excellent left-handed catch at mid-on.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Mr. W. G. Tovey's XI., June 19th, home, Lost.—Fine weather favoured us in this match, which is always one of our most enjoyable cricket fixtures. School batted first, but gave a very moderate display, the total being 65 only, Mr. Watts being top scorer with 20 to his credit. Mr. Wilson Tovey's XI. scored 272; J. S. Lawson batting splendidly for his 89, was well supported by F. J. Hitch (60). Mr. Minchin was our most successful bowler, taking 5 wickets for 66 runs.

S.G.S. v. Warminster Town, June 21st, home, Drawn.—Warminster batted first, and soon lost 4 wickets for 41. The fifth wicket, however, took the score to 117, and the sixth to 206. These two long partnerships were chiefly due to the fine batting of K. Smith, whose excellent innings of 116 (not out) contained no less than 18 "fours." Warminster declared at 222 for 6 wickets. School started their batting in a disastrous way, two wickets falling before a run had been scored. Brett and Coaker then improved matters, and their example helped Combes to carry on with considerable success. His score of 39 contained some nice shots, and he looked good for a large score when he was unfortunately run out. School had scored 94 for the loss of 4 wickets, when stumps were drawn.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Warminster School (Under 14), June 21st, away, Won.—Our total of 114 was obtained by consistent—if not brilliant—batting, the highest score being E. A. Foot's 17. The Warminster boys found Gray's bowling much too good for them, and could only muster 36. Gray bowled exceptionally well for a youngster, his 7 wickets costing 13 runs only.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. West Hants C.C., June 25th, away, Won.—The home fixture with this Club, arranged for May 21st, was unavoidably scratched owing to the inclemency of the weather. The day for the return match, however, was gloriously fine, and we thoroughly enjoyed our visit to Damerham. West Hants batted first, and scored 157 for 8 wickets, and declared; G. Hall scoring 74 by excellent cricket. School lost Mr. Watts' wicket before scoring, but Mr. Minchin and Dr. Tovey put on 92 for the second wicket. Mr. Minchin continued to bat freely, enabling us to pass our opponents' total for the loss of five wickets, within a few minutes of drawing stumps. Egremont and Brett both batted well, and were unbeaten at the close.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Bulford Garrison, June 28th, home, Drawn.—Dr. Tovey and Mr. W. G. Tovey opened our innings, and by excellent cricket put on no less than 126 for the first wicket. The latter was dismissed when he had scored 59, but Dr. Tovey went on to score a brilliant century, and was unbeaten when the innings was declared. Mr. Watts also batted very well for his 26 not out. With the exception of Lieut. Cave (61), Bulford fared badly against the bowling of Mr. Streather and Mr. Watts, but were able to stave off defeat, when 9 wickets had fallen for 146 runs.

School ("A" team) v. Warminster School, June 30th, home, Lost.—School gave a very moderate display of batting, and were all out for 71. Of these, J. L. Cole claimed 21, and Mr. Extras was the next highest scorer with 16. We opened the attack with K. G. Mitchell and F. Hoddinott, the former taking a wicket in his first over. Runs came steadily, however, and in spite of a change of bowling our opponents beat us by 32 runs. R. H. Hitch was the most successful bowler, taking 5 wickets for 18 runs. A second innings produced 49 for 2 wickets, F. Hoddinott scoring 27.

School v. King Edward's School, Southampton, July 2nd, home, Won.—Southampton batted first, but so well did J. S. Windebank and A. G. Egremont bowl, that they were all dismissed for the very small total of 29. They were certainly worth more runs, but a few early disasters seemed to make them think the bowling was more difficult than it really was.

School opened with Coaker and Egremont, but the latter left when one run only had been scored. F. N. Windebank then helped Coaker to add 72 runs for the second wicket; both players playing sound cricket. The former, especially, hit very freely, his 54 including one "six" and six "fours." E. B. Brice (40) and F. Hoddinott (44) were both not out at the close, and gave their best batting displays of the season. Our final score was 202 for 6 wickets.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, July 2nd, away, Won.—Four of our wickets fell very cheaply, but H. M. Gale (14), E. A. Foot (23) and T. House (13) improved matters to such an extent that we reached the respectable total of 86. The batting was of a somewhat mixed character, good shots alternating with some very bad ones. With 57 on the board for the loss of 4 wickets, the Choristers looked good enough to win, but the last few wickets fell very cheaply, and we were enabled to win by 10 runs. For School, Hazell, was the most inexpensive bowler, his three wickets costing 7 runs only.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Sherborne Town, July 5th, away, Lost.—Sherborne, who had quite a strong side in the field, batted first, and compiled 145 on a wicket that was far from being a good one. Mr. Watts and Mr. Streather shared the bowling honours, each taking 4 wickets for 56 runs. School fielding was not good. We found runs very difficult to get, and were dismissed for 61, Mr. Minchin (18) being the only one to reach double figures.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Dr. C. A. Ensor's XI., July 7th, home, Won.—This whole-day match has always been one of the most pleasant features of our School cricket, and good weather generally favours us. This year proved no exception to the rule, and a most enjoyable match resulted in a win for S.G.S. by a narrow margin. Col. Douglas (47) and General Poore (53 not out) were the most prolific run-getters for Dr. Ensor's side, and it was a great treat to us to watch the play of two such well-known cricketers. The final score was 176. Mr. Minchin (5 wickets for 55) was our most successful bowler. Combes was responsible for a good catch in the slips. Mr. Minchin (43), A. G. Egremont (39) and C. W. Coaker (33) all batted well, and their efforts were well supported by L. D. D. Brett (17 not out). When stumps were drawn we had scored 189 for 8 wickets.

S.G.S. v. Wimborne Grammar School, July 9th, home, Won.—This match was originally fixed for June 4th, but it had to be postponed owing to the bad weather. School batted first, and scored 160 for 7 wickets and declared. L. D. D. Brett

batted very well for his 53 not out—his highest score of the season, and his efforts were very ably seconded by J. S. Windebank (31), A. G. Egremont (23) and C. W. Coaker (21). The scoring in this match was anything but rapid, there being as many as 89 singles in our score of 160. Wimborne scored 38 for their first wicket, but the "rot" then set in, the last wicket falling with 72 on the score board. Egremont (5 wickets for 37) was our best bowler.

S.G.S. ("A" team) v. Warminster School, July 9th, away, Lost.

—The Warminster bowling again proved too good for our "A" team, but it cannot be said that our batting reached a very high level. G. J. Brice, E. A. Manton and N. Cornthwaite all reached double figures, but the remainder did little towards our total of 65. Warminster also found runs difficult to get, and lost 8 wickets before passing our total. K. G. Mitchell, with 5 wickets for 27, bowled well, but got little support from the other end.

S.G.S. (Masters) v. Sherborne Town, July 12th, home, Drawn.

—Sherborne batted first, and thanks to an excellent innings of 72 by M. B. Elderton, reached a total of 162. Brett kept wicket admirably, no bye being scored against him. Mr. Watts and Mr. Streather shared the bowling honours with four wickets each. On going in to bat, School fared disastrously, Dr. Tovey, Mr. Minchin and Brett being dismissed for 10 runs only. Egremont (23) and Coaker (25) improved matters by taking the score to 44, and the good work was carried on by Mr. Watts (29). When stumps were drawn we had scored 99 for 7 wickets.

S.G.S. ("A" team) v. Milton Abbas, July 19th, home, Won.

A well-contested match, which we won by the narrow margin of 9 runs. Our opponents batted first against the bowling of K. G. Mitchell and R. H. Hitch. The former soon met with success, but the latter shortly gave way to G. J. Brice. Brice's slow off-breaks were most effective, and the last five wickets fell for the addition of 5 runs only. R. H. M. Stirling (32) was our best performer with the bat. G. J. Brice hit lustily at the end and obtained his 12 in three hits.

S.G.S. v. Bournemouth School, July 21st, home, Won.

—School gave a far better display in this match than they did in the one at Bournemouth, and won comfortably by 67 runs and 6 wickets. Bournemouth batted first and lost a wicket to J. S. Windebank before scoring, and another to the same bowler a few minutes later. Wickets continued to fall cheaply, and eight were down for 51 runs; the last pair, however, improved matters, and took the score to 90. Brett managed his bowling admirably, no less than seven bowlers

being tried during the innings. His wicket-keeping, too, was excellent, and the whole team gave a very much better display of fielding. Egremont and Coaker opened the innings for us, and batted so well that the 100 was hoisted without loss, the former scoring 55 and the latter 49. G. J. Brice then hit out lustily, and had scored 23 when stumps were drawn. Final score, 157 for 4 wickets.

S.G.S. (Under 14) v. Choristers' School, Salisbury, July 23rd, home, Won.—Our visitors batted first, but so well did J. P. Waters and H. G. Gray bowl, that they were all out for 21, six batsmen failing to score. An unusual feature of the innings was that, with the exception of one run out, the stumps were hit on every occasion. J. P. Waters took 7 wickets for 9 runs—a very good performance for a youngster. School found run-getting anything but a simple task, and could only reach a total of 37, no batsman reaching double figures.

S.G.S. v. Major Wynne Willson's XI., July 24th, home, Won.—This match had been postponed from May 24th on account of the bad weather. We batted first, and again shewed evidence of a great improvement in this branch of the game. C. W. Coaker (40), A. G. Egremont (32) and F. N. Windebank (31) all batted well, but the best innings of the match was that of A. J. Combes (63). L. D. D. Brett (42) also played a fine innings in his own inimitable style, and helped Combes to add 90 for the fifth wicket. Brice (5 wkts. for 30 runs) was easily the most successful bowler in the team, and thoroughly justified his selection as 11th colour. Throughout the O.S. innings of 185, Brett kept wicket wonderfully well, stumping two men and giving away one bye only. With the exception of A. G. Egremont, who scored 66 by very sound cricket, our batting was not of a very high order, and we were all out for 136.

S.G.S. (2nd XI.) v. Old Shastonians (2nd XI.), July 30th, home, Lost.—A masterly innings of 47 by R. N. Tayler (the O.S. captain), and good scores by J. E. Melsome (33), R. H. Baker (26) and E. G. Taylor (22 not out), enabled the Old Boys to reach the very fair total of 157. The 2nd XI. bowling was very moderate, but R. H. Hitch distinguished himself by taking 4 wickets for 15 runs, which included the "hat trick." The O.S. bowling proved too strong to enable us to reach their total, and we were dismissed for 65 runs in the first innings, and for 115 in the second. J. P. Cross, who is only 13 years of age, batted very well in both innings, securing 21 and 42.

CHARACTERS.

(The names are given in the final order of merit).

- L. D. D. BRETT, *Captain*.—A very much-improved cricketer, who was invaluable to his side. Has few scoring strokes, but is very difficult to get out. Kept wicket admirably, and shewed himself a sounder captain in every match he played.
- C. W. COAKER.—A good batsman with a fault which robs him of many runs. Must try and make better use of his left leg and shoulder. Good field, and a very fair change bowler.
- A. G. EGREMONT.—A much better bat than he was last year. Has at last cultivated the drive and cut, and consequently makes runs very much more quickly. Useful medium-paced bowler of somewhat uncertain length. Good ground field, and usually a safe catch.
- E. B. BRICE.—A very disappointing batsman, who seems unable to decide when to play back or forward. Can hit a half-volley hard, but expects every ball to be one. A fair change bowler, good ground field, and has a safe pair of hands.

F. N. WINDEBANK.—Hardly made the progress we anticipated, but occasionally made runs well. Scores freely when once set, but has a poor defence. A most disappointing bowler of erratic length. Very fair field, and a keen cricketer.

A. J. COMBES.—The most promising batsman on the side; drives with very free shoulders, but his defence is not yet sound. Must try and recognise the good length ball and play it more carefully. Slow in the field, but can usually hold a catch.

J. S. WINDEBANK.—Bowled consistently well throughout the season; keeps a good length and bowls very few loose balls. Must try and instil a little more guile into his plan of campaign. Shews promise as a batsman, but improves very slowly. Safe catch, but a slow mover.

F. HODDINOTT.—A very useful all-round cricketer. As a batsman is not quite sound in his defence, and is often out to a very weak stroke. Very fair change bowler, and a useful field.

G. J. B. BRICE.—The only really slow bowler in the team. Can impart plenty of spin to the ball, but must try and "mix them up" occasionally. A batsman of "Jessopian" methods, with a tendency to the "on." Fair field.

J. L. COLE.—Will some day make runs, but is at present a bit lifeless. Keeps a straight bat, but has an awkward stance. A fair but slow field.

R. B. BROWN.—The "colt" of the team, with plenty of runs in store for him. Keeps his bat beautifully straight when playing forward, but is at present a bit cramped about the left shoulder. Very fair ground field, but rather an uncertain catch.

The Old Shastonian. Club Tour.

THE 1924 Cricket Tour was in all respects as great a success as its predecessors, while we were particularly fortunate with regard to the weather, inasmuch as the week of the tour was practically the only reasonably fine one during the whole of the summer vacation, and in no case was the cricket seriously interfered with by rain, a local shower or two being the worst we had to contend with. The number of fixtures was reduced to four owing to an unfortunate misunderstanding in the matter of dates, which necessitated the cancelling of the match against the Dudley Wayfarers, and of the four games, we won three, and lost one by the narrow margin of 8 runs—our opponents on this occasion being Shanklin, who are thus “one up” on us, and the only team to lower our colours during the last three tours.

Our hunting-ground was again the Isle of Wight, and our headquarters, as last year, were at Sandown. We fielded much the same team as on the previous tour, W. K. Sankey being on this occasion, however, conspicuous by his absence, and L. D. D. Brett making his first appearance for the O.S. Club.

We left Shaftesbury on July 31st, and played the first match of the tour against Shanklin on the following day, meeting thus early with our one and only defeat. Although the first wicket fell early, yet Mr. Wilson Tovey (35) and Bowley (40) made so effective a stand that 72 was on the board before they were separated. Subsequently, however, the innings developed into somewhat of a procession, and only a further 17 were added up to the fall of the last wicket. Shanklin lost seven wickets before they passed this total, and the last three wickets all fell at 107. Mr. Streather did best with the ball, and bowled really well for his 7 wickets, which he secured at a cost of only 35 runs.

On the following day we took first knock against Ryde, and set our opponents 183 to get to equalize, thanks mainly to an enterprising innings by Pearce and a steady 36 by H. F. Brown, while four other batsmen, including Bowley (29), reached double figures. This total, Ryde failed to reach by 57 runs, the four bowlers sharing the wickets fairly evenly.

On Monday, August 4th, we met St. Helens for the first time since we started to tour the island three years ago, and a hardly-contested and most enjoyable game resulted, in which we managed to secure the verdict, but only by a margin of 13 runs. The match was played on the village green, and if the

out-field left something to be desired, the wicket itself was as good as any on the island; and the cricket of the keenest and most sportsmanlike character. Dr. Tovey was top scorer with 24 (not out), and but for his timely effort which succeeded in holding up the "rot," the result might have been very different. As it was, the interest was sustained up to the very last, but some good bowling by Pearce, backed up by keen fielding—E. H. Simpson made a magnificent catch in the slips off Mr. Streather's bowling—managed to pull the game out of the fire.

Our final game was against Newport, and we were able to repeat our victory of preceding years with even more emphasis. Mr. Minchin batted extremely well for his 48, and both he and Dr. Tovey (33) were out only in trying to force the pace when they had put the side well beyond any danger of defeat. Newport were unfortunate to find Pearce on the top of his form with the ball, and his 7 wickets for 10 runs was a really fine effort.

An informal discussion as to whether the tour should be repeated next year, found everyone in favour of its continuance. Every participant realises the trouble and energy that go to arranging all the details of fixtures, accommodation, etc., and is correspondingly grateful to Mr. Minchin for his untiring efforts to secure the success which has unfailingly attended the tour hitherto, and will, without a doubt, be renewed next year.
