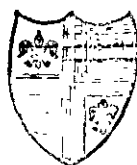

IF we omit the poor results obtained by the "Under 14" XI., the season of 1929 can be recorded as a very successful one. At the end of last season we prophesied a better 1st XI. for this year, and we were not disappointed. We have certainly had teams that played better cricket, but we have rarely had a team that shewed such a good fighting spirit when things were going wrong.

Their success was all the more pleasing because one of the four old colours—W. H. F. T. Gauntlett—was prevented through illness from taking any part in the season's cricket. The loss of such a good left-hand bowler was a great disappointment, and the team are to be congratulated on the good performances they accomplished without his help. Only once did they shew really bad form, and that was in the match at Southampton. It really was a desperate display, and not a bit in keeping with the rest of the season's work.

The three old colours, D. H. Tovey, J. Fancott and F. D. Hollick were responsible for many of the runs, and G. C. Mitchell could generally be relied on when things were going badly. D. Young did well enough on occasions to make his failures all the more disappointing, while R. S. Balhatchett and L. A. Dennis shewed great promise. These two players are both young, and their scores are not quite a true reflection of their real form. The former should one day make lots of runs, and we still hope that the same may be true of the latter. At present, however, he gets out far too cheaply.

In bowling we missed the services of Gauntlett, who did so well in 1928. Douglas Tovey, however, bowled his "slows" to such good effect that few boy opponents faced him with any confidence, and a few of those that did, found their confidence misplaced. His 50 wickets for 402 runs was a really fine performance, especially when one takes into consideration the absence of "sticky" wickets.

G. C. Mitchell kept a very good length and used his head well, while D. Young, although keeping a very fair length, was always a bit too mechanical in his methods. He never seemed able to spot a batsman's weakness and bowl accordingly. F. C. Imber was our nearest approach to a fast bowler; he bowled very well at Southampton, but in some of the other matches his length was often at fault.

The fielding of the team, on the whole, was good. Catches were dropped, of course, and at times rather too frequently, but some really fine ones were held. Douglas Tovey's ground fielding was excellent, while that of Dennis, Hollick, Imber, Mitchell and Balchin was good. Dennis deserves a special word of praise for his fielding at "short-leg," two of the catches he caught there being real "snorters."

J. Fancott kept wicket very well indeed, but he did not quite reach his 1928 standard. He often missed catches off the medium bowlers through using his pads instead of his hands. However, he had a good season, and allowed very few byes to be registered against him.

The 2nd XI. won three out of their four matches, but it would require a supreme optimist to call them a good side. They were certainly good in the field, and a very great deal of credit is due to the 2nd Club captains (F. W. Coates and F. J. P. Snook) for the excellent example they set in this respect. B. G. Gyles, B. Hoddinott, C. Galindo and A. E. Mayhew look like making runs some day, and there are bowling possibilities about R. J. Gray, W. G. Holloway, C. Galindo, B. G. Gyles and P. Law.

The "Under 14" XI. was a poor side. Their batting, bowling and fielding did not reach the standard of previous years. R. S. Balhatchet alone shewed ability to make runs, but he could only play in one match. B. Hoddinott again disappointed. Of the others, C. B. Cartledge, L. O. Snazelle, G. Buckland and A. W. Harding showed some promise, but their methods were altogether too timid. M. Wakefield bowled fairly well without much luck, and L. O. Snazelle and R. Heaton are promising bowlers; the latter may develop into a useful leg-break bowler if he can only learn to keep a length. Except for the wicket-keeping of B. Hoddinott, the fielding—both ground fielding and catching—was distinctly poor.

The Masters' XI. had an extraordinarily pleasant and successful season, and were only beaten once. This was in the first match of the season, played in a dense fog. Two of the drawn games ended very much in our favour—both, incidentally, being 12-a-side matches with only the eleventh wicket to fall. The other two were in a "fifty-fifty" state when stumps were drawn.

In all departments of the game the team was strong. We had plenty of batting, and runs nearly always came at a brisk pace. The bowling had more variety than usual, and the fielding and wicket-keeping often reached a very high standard.

In all respects a very delightful season, full of incident and enthusiasm.

In conclusion, we offer our very hearty congratulations to Douglas Tovey, the school captain. In his usual quiet, unobtrusive manner, he "skipped" the side very well indeed, and found the experience gained last season a very great help to him. He managed his bowling really well, and showed a sound knowledge of all those hundred-and-one little points which help to make cricket such a fascinating game. His 108 (not out) against Major Wynne Willson's XI. was a very fine effort.

We also extend our grateful thanks to those masters who spent hours at the nets trying to instil the first principles of good batsmanship into the rising generation. Also to F. W. Coates and his band of wire-pullers for the able manner in which they scored our runs. Finally, we must not forget the clerk of the weather, whose efforts throughout the summer entitled the season of 1929 to "a place in the sun."

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN

(in alphabetical order).

- V. S. BALCHIN.—A batsman with a fair defence, but with very few scoring strokes. Plays the forward stroke with a straight bat, but with little regard to footwork. A good ground field and a safe catch.
- R. S. BALHATCHET.—The youngest and most promising member of the team. Has a very good defence, but at present lacks scoring strokes in front of the wicket. When these arrive he should be a really good bat. Very fair slip field, but a bit slow in any other position.
- L. A. DENNIS.—A left-handed batsman with a good stance and style. Had a disappointing season, but should make lots of runs some day. In the earlier matches was often out l.b.w., but improved in this respect later. Good field, made several excellent catches.
- J. FANCOTT.—Just the cricketer for a tight corner. Has improved very much as a batsman, but does not develop his off-side play. Would make a lot more runs if he would give up the cross stroke to a straight ball. Kept wicket very well, but did not always get his hands down to the low ones. Quite useful field in any other position.
- W. H. F. T. GAUNTLETT.—Was away from school all the summer recovering from an illness. He is a good left-handed bowler with plenty of spin, and a consistent length. Will some day make runs, too. Fair field.

- F. D. HOLLICK.—Hardly made the advance we anticipated. Has a good defence, but lacks the necessary strength of wrist for an off-drive. His defensive play was often very useful, and on two occasions he saved the match for his side. Very good field, and has possibilities as a slow left-handed bowler.
- F. C. IMBER.—Although not a natural cricketer, he played with a straighter bat than he did last year. Hits a ball quite hard, but has very little defence. Moderate fast-medium bowler with an uncertain length. Very fair field.
- G. C. MITCHELL.—A very much improved player of the long, loose-limbed variety. Made several useful scores just when they were wanted. At present he makes too much use of his arms and not enough of his shoulders. A good bowler with an accurate length, and an ability to vary his pace. Very fair field.
- R. B. SHEPARD.—Had a very disappointing season, and rather lost confidence in himself. Is quite good on the leg-side, and can sometimes cut a ball nicely. Has a poor stance, and never gets across to the bowling. Very fair field, and a moderate change bowler.
- D. H. TOVEY, *Captain*.—A good forcing batsman with a beautiful pair of wrists. Drives and cuts very well indeed, but still has a very uncertain stroke to a ball on his leg-stump. Admirable field, with a good return. A good school bowler, with plenty of spin and an improved length. Knows the game thoroughly, and, in his own quite way, he made a very excellent captain.
- D. YOUNG.—Must learn to stand up to fast bowling, and will then be a better batsman. At present he never gets over a ball, and drops his left shoulder when playing forward. Good medium-paced bowler with a good delivery, but does not spot a batsman's weakness. A fair field.
