OUR first act in this number must be to congratulate last term's V. Form on the results of the School Certificate Exam. Out of a form of 24 boys, 22 passed (four with Honours); there were three distinctions in mathematics and two in history, while eight candidates obtained sufficient "credits" to be excused the London Matric. Exam. These results exceeded our most optimistic expectations, and both in quality and quantity are the best we have ever had. Well done, masters and boys! May 1932 follow suit.

WITH seven old colours remaining from 1930, we expected to have a successful cricket season; and a glance at the above figures will show that our expectations were fulfilled. One cannot, however, describe it as being an enjoyable one, because of the abnormally bad weather which prevailed practically throughout the term. Net practice was seriously interfered with, and the junior boys, especially, suffered in consequence.

1st XI.—Except for poor performances against the two Southampton Schools, our 1st XI. did very well. The batting was perhaps the weakest point, but the wet wickets can, to a large extent, be blamed for this. Strokes which in a dry season would have sent the ball to the boundary often resulted in a single, with the result that the more orthodox batsmen, such as L. A. T. Dennis, R. S. Balhatchet, and E. Combes made considerably less runs than they were worth. R. A. Jeeves and W. H. F. T. Gauntlett made the majority of the runs, scoring at a very rapid rate when the occasion demanded it. They each possess strong wrists and a good reach, and were particularly severe on the short ones and half-volleys. D. R. Young was disappointing and never approached his 1930 form. Of the new colours, M. Wakefield and A. P. B. Brown shewed much promise, but B. G. Gyles and W. Garne have still a few faults which will have to be eliminated before they can hope to make large scores.

The bowling was distinctly good, and had variety. Gauntlett bowled splendidly, and was the mainstay of the attack. His aggregate of 60 wickets constitutes a record for the school, and in addition he obtained 23 wickets for the Masters' XI., so that, had there been no matches scratched, he would undoubtedly have secured his 100 wickets for the season. In the match against Shaftesbury Town he had the extraordinary analysis of 7 wickets for 1 run. D. R. Young kept quite a good length, but he lacked guile, and obtained very little help from the consistently wet wickets. R. A. Jeeves and W. G. S. Holloway could generally be relied on to take a wicket when required, but their length was often at fault. The former can

command a very substantial off-break at a fair pace, while the latter occasionally bowled an exceptionally good "swinger," which came off the pitch very quickly. Peter Brown improved very much as a slow leg-break bowler, and should take lots of wickets next season.

Nothing but praise can be bestowed on the fielding of the team. The ground-work was invariably clean, and some excellent catches were taken. Gauntlett was the pick of a very good bunch, his work at cover reaching a very high standard. Dennis kept wicket very well indeed, allowing very few balls to pass him, and claiming many victims who allowed themselves to be tempted by the slow bowling of Gauntlett and Brown.

2nd XI.—The 2nd XI. had a very good season, which they brought to a close with an overwhelming defeat of the Old Boys' second team. It was a stronger XI. than usual, and contained several promising cricketers. It also had others who adopted rather more rustic methods, but such methods often proved successful on the very wet wickets. R. Heaton, B. D. Aylwin, G. R. Rousell and L. O. Snazelle are all cricketers in the making, and should do well in the future. They possess more defence than C. H. Burrows, R. Y. Maclurkin, P. W. Bull and H. H. Moore, all of whom adopted more Jessopian methods with considerable success.

L. O. Snazelle and C. H. Burrows were the pick of a moderate bowling side, and were generally good enough for their opposition. They both kept a good length, and the former also possessed a natural swerve. B. D. Aylwin and R. Heaton look like making bowlers in the future, but they are a bit too short in stature to get much life into their attack.

The fielding was really good, and Peter Law, as skipper, set an excellent example of keenness and anticipation. Few catches were dropped, and the groundwork with few exceptions was clean. G. R. Rousell showed every promise of becoming a very good wicket-keeper; he allowed very few balls to get by him, and used all parts of his exuberant robustness to prevent their doing so.

"Under 14" XI.—Under such difficult and depressing weather conditions, it was not surprising that the colts made very little progress. During the month of May, the net wickets were a quagmire, and it was more than difficult to inculcate the necessity of playing with a straight bat. To make matters worse, the bowling at the junior nets has never been so bad, many of the deliveries either failing to reach the batsman or missing the net completely. The batting was anything but

good, but there are promising features about the play of F. J. Austin, J. Russell, J. Harding, R. H. Tarrant, E. J. Pulman and A. Dufosse. Harding and Pulman were the best of a desperately poor crowd of bowlers, but even their length was below the average of previous years. The fielding was keen, and most of the catches were held; and in J. Russell the team possessed a promising little wicket-keeper.

Masters' XI.—During the last three seasons the Masters' XI. have met with defeat on one occasion only, and that was at the hands of Breamore in the first game of 1929. It is certainly a record to be proud of, but we are beginning to feel that a sound defeat would do us good, and there is little doubt that we shall not have very long to wait. Our batting was anything but sound, but we had a good bowling side, and never had to face a total that seemed out of reach. The Bournemouth Club nearly lowered our colours, while Sherborne, in the last match of the season, had a very strong side against us, and would undoubtedly have given us a very hard task had not rain interfered. Mr. Cole found the slow wickets suited his batting better than his bowling, and in scoring 106 (not out) against Downton, made the only century of the season. Mr. Williams, Mr. Minchin and W. H. F. T. Gauntlett all bowled well, and Mr. Veale was in good form behind the stumps.

We cannot close a review of the past cricket season without paying a well deserved tribute to the School Captain—W. H. F. T. Gauntlett. What Gauntlett does not know about cricket and cricketers is hardly worth knowing, and he instilled into his team an enthusiasm which only the weather could damp. He obtained his colours in 1928, and, except for one season's absence through illness, he has been a most useful member of the team in all branches of the game. He may with justifiable pride look back on his two years captaincy, during which his teams won no less than 16 out of the 20 completed matches. We thank him most heartily for all that he has done for the school cricket, and sincerely hope he will get every opportunity of playing in representative cricket in Surrey. He is far too good a cricketer to lose himself midst the divots and bunkers of those picturesque Surrey hills.

We also take this opportunity of thanking H. F. Friend and his happy band of wire pullers. Friend put in a lot of time copying out score sheets, and we are very grateful for his services.

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN

(in alphabetical order).

- R. S. BALHATCHET.—Had rather a disappointing season, and did not quite live up to expectations. Is a better bat on faster wickets, but he does not develop strokes on the off. Runs extremely well between the wickets and is a sound judge of a short run. Good slip field and a very keen cricketer.
- A. P. B. BROWN.—One of the most improved cricketers in the school. Bowls slow leg-breaks with good judgment and a creditable length, but they are a trifle too slow to be dangerous against experienced batsmen. Is making good progress with the bat, and is a fair field.
- E. COMBES.—Did not make the runs we hoped for, chiefly because he relied too much on the forward stroke. This stroke is more of a "push" than a "drive," and was often fatal on the slow wickets. Has a fine stance, but must improve his back play. Fielded very well at mid-off, but is a slow mover in any other position. Good catch.
- L. A. T. DENNIS.—Although his aggregate for the season was not large, he played several invaluable innings of a defensive nature. Watches the ball very carefully, but loses his soundness when he begins to attack the bowling. Kept wicket really well, and is a good field anywhere. Has possibilities as a change bowler.
- W. GARNE.—A batsman with a good defence and a straight bat, but he possesses a deplorable stroke to a ball on his leg stump. Improved very much in the field, and could always be relied on to hold a catch.
- W. H. F. T. GAUNTLETT (Captain).—Excellent left-hand leg-break bowler with a high delivery and a good control over length. Much improved as a batsman, and is at his best when he attacks the bowling. His defence is unorthodox and unimpressive, but he has an admirable straight drive and a most useful pull-shot to a short one. Splendid field at cover, and a safe catch. Enthusiastic cricketer and a good captain.
- B. G. GYLES.—A fair batsman, but will play across a ball pitched on the wicket. This was often disastrous and always unnecessary. Very keen and enthusiastic in the field, where he saved many runs by his speed, clean pick-up and accurate return.
- W. G. S. HOLLOWAY.—A temperamental bowler who occasionally bowls an extremely good ball, but his length is not sound. Owing to the success of the opening pair he was

not often called upon, and he unfortunately required a few experimental overs before striking his best form. Improved very much in the field. Poor bat.

R. A. JEEVES.—Scored more runs than any other member of the team, and scored them very quickly. He is not a stylist, but he possesses a good eye and the necessary height and strength to punish the loose ball. Has a very weak stroke to a straight good-length ball on his off stump. Good field. Caught some excellent catches in the deep. Useful medium paced off-break bowler.

M. WAKEFIELD.—The youngest member of the team, and full of promise. Keeps a perfectly straight bat, and his footwork is good. Is especially good on the leg side, and should make a first rate bat. Has improved as a bowler, but his fielding was not up to the standard of the rest of the team.

D. R. YOUNG.—Had a poor season, and never looked like making runs. This was chiefly due to bad footwork and to a disinclination to keeping his eye on the ball. Bowled very well, but obtained little help from the wet wickets. Good field and a keen cricketer.

In the Officer's shoot, Lieut. Veale came out first with a score of 96 out of 100.

The fielding throughout all the matches was fairly good, and great keenness was shown by all members of the team.

Our Junior team most ably followed the example set them by their seniors, and won all their matches. The batting was quite promising, R. F. Isgar and J. E. Russell were the best of the orthodox type, while hitters who shone were G. W. Buckland, H. B. Ryall and A. Crocker. The two best bowlers were R. F. Isgar and A. Crocker, while the fielding was quite up to the average.

In the Lawn Tennis, as last year, our Senior pair, F. T. Gauntlett and E. Combes, were successful in all their three matches. Both played brilliantly, and with their skilful combination experienced little difficulty in any of their matches. Our Junior pair, although by no means great tennis players, managed to win two of their matches, thus securing a point for us towards the Shield.

Although our swimming results were not as good as those of last year, by tying with the Romans for second place in the Senior, and obtaining a clear second in the Junior, we were able to secure two points towards the Shield.
