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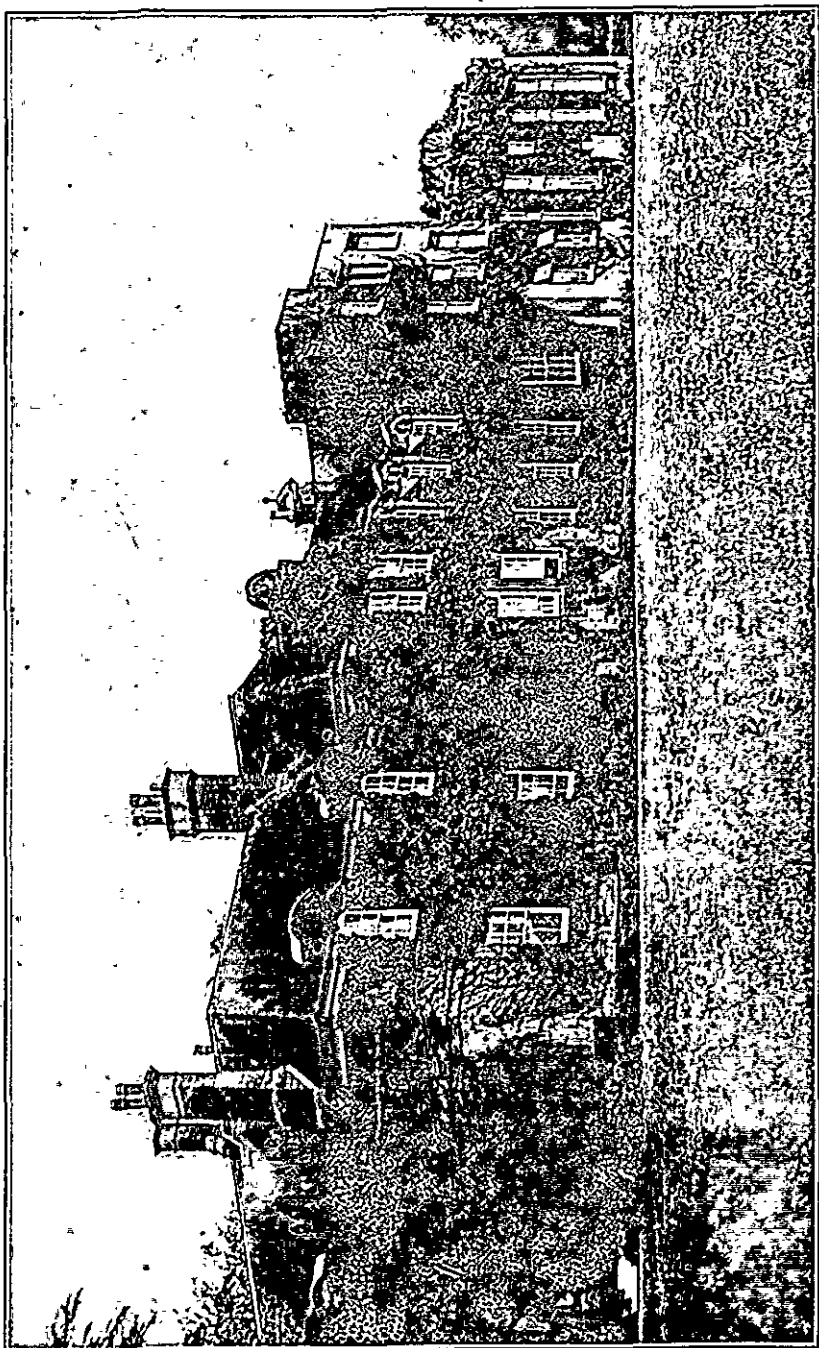

THE season of 1932 proved quite a successful one, far more so than was generally anticipated at the beginning of the term. The Masters' XI. were again unbeaten, and the first and second elevens did very well, especially when playing against opposing schools. The weakness of our cricket at the moment lies in our "Under 14" XI. For the past two or three seasons the juniors have disappointed their coaches, and few of them possess that aptitude for the game which many of their fathers possessed. Let us hope this is only a passing phase, and that in the future we shall see a better reward for the many hours spent in coaching them.

At the present moment we have in the school two distinct types of cricketer. Neither type is the ideal. We have the player who plays very correctly, his bat is straight and his footwork quite good, but he makes very few runs even if he stays in for half-an-hour; he cannot be persuaded to attack the bowling. On the other hand we have the hard-hitting unorthodox batsman, very useful at times, but generally quite harmless when he meets an experienced bowler. Why cannot we find boys who combine scoring strokes with defence, who can hit hard with a straight bat, who can use the "glide" and "cut" even when on the defensive? We have a few, but their number is very limited, and we look forward to seeing it increased next season.

1st XI.—R. S. Balhatchet had three old colours to help him build up the 1932 eleven—R. A. Jeeves, M. Wakefield and A. P. B. Brown. Six of the remaining seven places were comparatively easy to fill, but the seventh beat him completely, and it was decided not to fill it. C. B. Cartledge, R. Heaton, H. H. Moore and G. R. Cole were all of them possible candidates and were given trials, but an award to any one of them could equally well have been given to one of the remaining three. All four had cricket in them, but they failed to produce their best form in the trial games.

The team started the season extremely well, winning three of the first four matches played. Their best performance was at Bournemouth, where they won easily by six wickets, R. S. Balhatchet and R. A. Jeeves scoring over a hundred in the best partnership of the season. The defeat of Taunton's School, Southampton, on their own ground, was also a pleasant surprise. The fourth match was a disastrous affair, Sherborne School 2nd XI. inflicting a crushing defeat. The less said about our batting in this match, the better; it was simply unaccountably bad.

The batting throughout the team was not good, but it had many redeeming features. R. S. Balhatchet and R. A. Jeeves met with considerable success, the former excelling in sound defence, and the latter at his best when he was attacking the bowling. A. W. Harding and B. D. Aylwin showed much improved form. Harding played a very good innings at Dorchester, and Aylwin was one of the best all-rounders in the team.

The bowlers, with the exception of M. Wakefield, were not a formidable crowd, but their length was quite good. Wakefield had quite a good season with the ball, and, with increased height and experience, he should capture lots of wickets. Burrows and Bull, especially the former, possessed considerable accuracy, but lacked guile. Peter Brown, with his slow breaks, bowled well in one match, but did not quite fulfil expectations.

The fielding was good and many excellent catches were held. Some were dropped, of course, but taking the season through, it was quite up to standard. R. S. Balhatchet on his good days, B. D. Aylwin, P. W. Bull, A. P. B. Brown and C. H. Burrows were the pick. G. R. Rousell kept wicket very pluckily and allowed very few extras. His catching was not too good, but it improved towards the end of the season.

2nd XI.—Under the captaincy of M. F. Gricks, the 2nd XI. did well to win five of their seven matches. The batting had the merit of being vigorous, but could not be described as essentially sound. G. R. Cole and J. E. Russell showed good form, and made runs. C. B. Cartledge and R. E. Hunt impressed the eye, but could not get going in matches. M. F. Gricks, E. S. Mitchell, R. A. Welch and others used more unorthodox methods, which often proved most successful.

H. H. Moore, though his length was uncertain, often bowled well, while E. S. Mitchell, R. E. Hunt, R. A. Welch and B. F. V. Bennett formed a quartette of change bowlers. C. B. Cartledge had also some idea of keeping a length.

The fielding was somewhat patchy, but many of the patches were bright ones. R. P. Jesse fielded extremely well, and caught many excellent catches. G. W. Buckland kept wicket very well in one match, but in others he allowed rather too many extras. It is only fair to him to state that the bowlers were not always blameless in the matter.

"Under 14" XI.—J. E. Russell, the captain, was by far the best cricketer on the side. He should make a lot of runs some day, and in addition he shows signs of becoming a very useful school wicket-keeper. M. A. Tory is a real cricketer in the making, but he must learn to stand up to his work. His fielding was often excellent. A. Dufosse will some day make runs, and the same remark applies to M. F. Murphy. The latter is a possible bowler, but his length at present is far from good. F. J. Green possesses some defence, but his style is very poor. R. J. Gray, H. T. Imber, R. J. and H. G. Friend show promise, but they have a lot to learn, and their performances in matches were a bit disappointing. C. Mitchell, C. G. Jeffries and H. T. Imber tried hard to improve as bowlers. They are all young, so we hope their efforts will result in some measure of success in the future.

Masters' XI.—The past season proved a very successful one in every way, and the team maintained its usual high standard. No team succeeded in beating us, so we have now played 36 consecutive matches without defeat. Rather a remarkable record!

The team was certainly a well balanced one. The bowling reached a high standard and possessed variety, a great asset to any side. Mr. Cole, Mr. Williams, Mr. Minchin and Mr. Scalbert bore the brunt of the attack, and their efforts were admirably supported by the excellent wicket-keeping of Mr. Hey. He is certainly a first class wicket-keeper, and we hope that those boys in the school who have aims (please forgive the pun!) at becoming Strudwicks or Duckworths will watch him carefully, and, by so doing, become efficient.

The batting was equal to all occasions. Mr. Minchin, Mr. Cole and Gordon Tovey made several very good scores, and when they failed, Mr. Williams, Ronald Brown, Mr. Veale, Dr. Tovey, or R. A. Jeeves came to the rescue.

Mr. Minchin made a century in the home match against Blandford, and Gordon Tovey 88 (not out) against the same club in the away match.

No account of our 1932 Cricket season would be complete without paying a well-deserved tribute to Raymond Balhatchet, the school captain. His task was no sinecure, but his sound judgment enabled him to overcome his difficulties, especially those connected with his change bowlers, and he has the satisfaction of knowing that his team exceeded even our most optimistic anticipations. His genial disposition and his unswerving loyalty to his school made it a pleasure to work with him, and we thank him heartily for his efforts on behalf of the school cricket. May he have an equally successful football season as Captain of the 1st XI., a position he now holds for the second time.

Our thanks are also due to J. D. R. Hewer for all the work he did as scorer, and in writing out the score-sheets for the magazine. We are very grateful to him for his services, as we are to that staunch trio responsible for manipulating the score-board.

CHARACTERS OF THE TEAM

(in alphabetical order).

- B. D. AYLWIN.**—A very much improved player in all departments of the game. Has a good stance and style, but is rather apt to over-reach when playing forward. An excellent field, and has some idea of bowling moderately fast.
- R. S. BALHATCHET.**—A much better bat than he was last year. He often held the team together. On his day an excellent slip catch. Knows the game thoroughly, and is always an optimist. Made an admirable captain, both on and off the field.
- A. P. B. BROWN.**—Had rather a disappointing season both with bat and ball. Looks a batsman, but is very stiff in his forward play and is often out through poor footwork. Makes a ball turn quite a lot, but his deliveries are a bit too slow to be effective. Very good field, especially at short-leg.
- P. W. BULL.**—A very useful bowler, but would be well advised to vary his pace a bit more. Hits hard, but has no defence. Excellent field with a very safe pair of hands.
- C. H. BURROWS.**—A good school bowler with a very dependable length, but rather inclined to bowl too straight. Has very few scoring strokes, but possesses some defence. Good field and a safe catch.
- A. W. HARDING.**—A very much improved bat, but is rather too unenterprising. Treats a half-volley with far too much respect, and must learn to cut. A useful field and a fair change bowler.

R. A. JEEVES.—Hardly made the runs he was worth. Is a poor starter, especially when the bowling is on the wicket, but, when once set, he scores very quickly. Possesses an excellent shot behind point, and a very powerful pull. A bit slow in the field, but a safe catch. As a bowler he seems to have lost his length and pace.

G. R. ROUSELL.—Hardly fulfilled expectations as a batsman, but possesses some defence. Put up a good show behind the stumps, but often seemed a bit pessimistic about his mistakes. Stopped the fast bowling very well, and stumped quite a number of batsmen towards the end of the season.

M. WAKEFIELD.—A really good left-hand bowler with pace from the pitch. Should take a lot of wickets if he can play cricket regularly. Has a good style with the bat, but seems to have cultivated a poor shot to leg. A bit slow in the field, but a safe catch.

R. A. WELCH.—A keen cricketer, but with little idea of the finer points of the game. His batting is far from good, but his bowling shews promise. Good field, with a safe pair of hands.

Whidborne, though both unorthodox in style, proved to be useful batsmen to the side. Harding and Fowles were also responsible for most of our opponents' wickets, and the former should be a great asset to our cricket in the future.

Our Tennis results were very gratifying indeed. In the senior we won all three matches, and very great credit is due to Jeeves, who dominated all the games with his powerful scoring strokes. TROJANS.

ROMANS.

During the past year, as Dr. Tovey said when presenting the House Shield to the Corinthians, "The Romans flattered to deceive." PRESENTATION
OF THE
FREEDOM OF THE BOROUGH
TO
DR. C. H. TOVEY.

THE Guildhall, on July 4th, was the scene of an important event in the history of the School, when the Freedom of the Borough of Shaftesbury was conferred on Dr. Tovey.

There was a full attendance of the Town Council, presided over by the Mayor of Shaftesbury (Councillor E. E. Browning), and many burgesses and personal friends of Dr. Tovey were present.

In opening the proceedings, the Mayor said that Dr. Tovey would be the fourth person on whom the honorary Freedom of the Borough had been conferred. The former Freemen were Mr. E. Doran Webb, for excavations on the site of Shaftesbury Abbey; Dr. J. Alfred Sharpe, the president of the Wesleyan Conference and a native of Shaftesbury; and Sir Thomas Horder, the famous physician and native of the borough,—the latter being the only surviving holder of the privilege. Continuing, the Mayor said that, as far as he had been able to ascertain, it was an honour that had not often fallen to the lot of a schoolmaster, though the Director of Education for Dorset had informed him that the Headmaster of the Secondary School at Dover was about to have the same honour conferred upon him. He did not know whether the fact that few schoolmasters were so honoured revealed a failure on the part of civic bodies to appreciate the enormously valuable work which was being done by the teaching profession, but at any rate he was glad that Shaftesbury had broken the tradition of silence. What was more they could not have offered the honour to anyone more entitled to it.

The Mayor proceeded to speak of the personal qualities of Dr. Tovey, of the admiration for his work, the affection which present and old boys had for him, and the confidence of parents in his ability. The Mayor gave figures to show how the school had grown to four times the size it was when Dr. Tovey came there, a growth which had carried with it a corresponding increase in buildings. Particular reference was made

to the War Memorial Hall, which in itself was a tribute to Dr. Tovey's vision, courage and determination. The Mayor made a warm allusion to the work of Mrs. Tovey and to the great assistance she had been to her husband, and to the activities of Dr. Tovey in town and church organisations. In conclusion he said that Shaftesbury Grammar School was losing a headmaster whose foresight, good generalship, determination, all-round skill, and above all attractive personality, had few equals. The Mayor also congratulated Mr. R. B. Minchin, Dr. Tovey's brother-in-law, on his appointment as Dr. Tovey's successor, and wished him and the school every success in the future.

The Town Clerk (Mr. W. Farley Rutter) read the certificate of Freedom, which had been designed, coloured and completely carried out by one of Dr. Tovey's old boys, Harry Dalton.

The Mayor handed the framed certificate to Dr. Tovey amid prolonged applause.

Dr. Tovey in reply, described that occasion as the proudest moment of his life, and in expressing his appreciation of the high honour they had conferred upon him, said he was deeply conscious of the greatness of the gift which was all the greater because the certificate of the Freedom had been done by one of the boys he had trained himself. He thanked the Corporation for the great honour they had done to his profession, and said he felt, like the Mayor, that schoolmasters did not get their fair share of public honours. It was nice to think that Shaftesbury had helped to redress the balance by giving him more than he deserved. ("No, no.")

"Whatever I have been able to do for the school has been indeed a labour of love," continued Dr. Tovey. "I make no pretension to being a great schoolmaster, but I have loved my work and I yield to no one in my affection for young life. I have always felt that education does not consist merely in the absorption of book lore. I have tried to stress the development of character, initiative and personality."

After a high tribute to the work of his masters, Dr. Tovey said that reference had been made to the many changes during his 26 years' headmastership, and he wished to speak of what to him was the most interesting change of all, the difference between the pre-war and the post-war boy. In many ways they were very much alike. They both did some work; they both might have done more. They were both generally very charming, and sometimes very annoying. In

other respects they were totally different, and to the student of psychology it was a very interesting study. He thought the pre-war boy was more reserved and was perhaps more difficult to understand. The post-war boy was more open and much more understanding. The pre-war boy was capable of greater prolonged individual effort. The post-war boy was rather more inclined to find someone else to do it for him. Perhaps he might put it in another way, and say that the post-war boy was more human. The post-war boy, if he might say it without offence, was a little more of the mother's darling. But if the pre-war boy had rather more initiative and possibly more grit, the post-war boy had a greater genius for friendship and was more sociable. He was making no complaints. They were both the products of their environment. He was proud to have known both of them, and if wisely handled they were capable of making splendid citizens of the Empire.

Continuing, Dr. Tovey said there was a real danger of making education too stereotyped, of cutting all schools out according to the same pattern. Mass production might be an excellent thing in business, but it would never work in educational matters. His experience in Dorset was that the danger was far less there than in many other counties. The secondary schools of Dorset were encouraged to work along their own lines, and they at Shaftesbury had worked along theirs. Another thing they wanted in education was a greater interest taken in it by the average citizen, and the solution would be for a school and its town to get along together as they did in Shaftesbury. As headmaster there, he had had many advantages, and the only thing in favour of himself was that he had been able to take advantage of them. He had had an excellent governing body, the friendship of the people of Shaftesbury, and the tremendous assistance of his wife on the boarding side, which made the school as much like home as possible, and lastly the glorious situation and the health and surroundings of the town. There was an old proverb which said "See Naples and die." His proverb was "See Shaftesbury and live." They all had a love for their home town, but there was a grace and a charm about the old town of Shaftesbury which was very difficult to find elsewhere. The town of which he had the honour to be a Freeman was small, but its history was very illustrious. The honour of being a Freeman was a great one, and was enhanced by the names of the men who had been so honoured, and all that he could say was that he would do his utmost to do nothing to disgrace their record. His prayer would always be that Shaftesbury and its school would continue to flourish as long as the British name endured.

Alderman R. W. Borley, chairman of the governing body of the school, heartily supported the tributes which had been paid to Dr. Tovey, and said that the townspeople wished to show in some tangible form the appreciation of all that Dr. and Mrs. Tovey had done for the town. On behalf of the Governors and all the subscribers he asked Dr. & Mrs. Tovey to accept a cheque for £50 with their best wishes that they would be spared many years to enjoy their retirement.

Dr. Tovey, expressing the thanks of Mrs. Tovey and himself, remarked on the hearty friendship which had always existed between them and the townspeople.

The Mayoress (Mrs. Browning) presented Mrs. Tovey with a handsome bouquet of carnations, and said the women of Shaftesbury felt that Mrs. Tovey had shared to the full the honour which had been conferred on her husband. They wished her the happiness and reward of duty well done.

Mrs. Tovey briefly expressed her thanks, and the ceremony concluded, after which many of the gathering were the guests of the Mayor at tea.

PRESENTATION TO DR. & MRS. TOVEY

ON Wednesday, July 20th, more than 400 Old Shastonians and friends assembled at the School to witness the O.S. Club's presentation and to wish "God Speed" to Dr. and Mrs. Tovey. In spite of the sad thought of their impending departure from S.G.S., the gathering was a very happy one, and the occasion proved to be the means of renewing many old friendships. The Shaftesbury Town Band played selections of music during the afternoon, and at five o'clock the presentation took place on Dr. Tovey's lawn.

More than 300 members contributed to the gifts, their donations amounting to no less than £116. The presentation took the form of a revolving mahogany bookcase and a handsome pedestal, together with a cheque for £85; also a morocco leather bound album containing the names of all subscribers.

In making the presentation, Mr. J. W. W. K. Miles (president of the Old Shastonian Club) wished Dr. and Mrs. Tovey God-speed and good luck in their new home, and said they all knew as much as he did how much they had been respected during the time they had been in Shaftesbury. Old Boys knew what Dr. and Mrs. Tovey had done for them. They had only to look at the difference in the School and the playing fields to see what Dr. Tovey's headmastership had done for the School, which had risen in numbers from 40 when he came there to about 160 at the present time. He (the speaker) was fortunate to have been a boy at the School when Dr. Tovey first came, and no-one was more surprised than he was, during the first week, to see the Doctor come out and play football with them on the fields, a thing which very few headmasters would find the time or have the inclination to do. His two brothers were more fortunate than himself in having been boarders at the School, but they all knew what Mrs. Tovey had meant to the boarders. How she had found time to look after the boys who had been through the school during those 25 years he did not know. Mr. Miles said they could hardly let that occasion pass without wishing Dr. Tovey's successor, Mr. Minchin, good luck. The Old Boys could not have wished for anyone to take the Doctor's place more than Mr. Minchin, and they knew that he would do his best, with

the help of the Old Boys, to carry on the School that Dr. Tovey had built up. In the name of the Old Shastonian Club he asked Dr. and Mrs. Tovey to accept those gifts as a mark of their appreciation and esteem.

Dr. and Mrs. Tovey were greeted with prolonged cheering, and Dr. Tovey, in acknowledging the gifts, said he had many times in the past stood up in front of the Old Boys and the present boys, and he thought that he had been able to say to them just what he wanted to. That afternoon, however, he felt absolutely incapable of expressing the feelings of himself and Mrs. Tovey for the magnificent gifts which had been handed to them. He reminded the present boys that next term they would be in the same position as "Joe" Miles was when he came to Shaftesbury. They would link one generation with another in headmasters, and he hoped they would be as good a friend to the new headmaster as they had been to him and the School. The cheque they had so generously given him would furnish his new home with a few comforts which they would otherwise not have been able to afford, and the bookcase would always be near him and be a continual reminder of the friendship and the fellowship which had always existed between him and his Old Boys. It would contain just the few books he valued most. One would be that lovely album, and the other would be Wisden. He specially thanked the Secretary and the Committee of the Club for the hard work they must have put in in securing such a gathering of Old Boys and such a testimonial. He had been told that it was a labour of love. All he could say was that it was the sort of love that one could have too much of.

Continuing, the Headmaster said that the many improvements to that School could not have been made without the help and unstinted efforts of many willing helpers. He wanted to thank Mr. and Mrs. Ramshaw for the help they had given to him. Mr. Ramshaw had been his second master and right hand man ever since he (Dr. Tovey) had been there. They had worked admirably together, and he thought that Mr. Ramshaw would agree that they had never had an angry word. The boys who had been to Mr. Ramshaw's house knew the care that Mrs. Ramshaw had taken of them all. In a few years' time Mr. Ramshaw would be feeling like himself, glad of a rest, and when that time came they would all agree that no rest was ever better earned. He (Dr. Tovey) had also had tremendous help and encouragement from the Club. It was a great help to feel that one had at one's elbow a loyal body of Old Boys willing to aid and abet anything he tried to do for the good of the School. Lastly, he took that opportunity of

paying a tribute to his domestic staff. They had servants who had been with them for a great number of years. Old Boys and present boys knew as much as he could tell them what a great friend of the School a man like Tom White had been to him. His greatest joy in life was to see the grounds looking a little better than they were last year, and his greatest worry was that the working day was not long enough.

Dr. Tovey said that next week he would be relegated to the top shelf, but he wished to say a word about the future, because that was important. He was sure that they would all re-echo the words of their President, that they were delighted to think that Mr. Minchin was to be his successor. He had already done magnificent work for the School, and, with the help which the Old Boys could give him, he would do still better work in the future. Some of them knew too well in some cases how difficult times were, and Mr. Minchin would be glad to have the help of every one of them in starting there. He asked them to use what influence they had in getting parents to send their boys there, for they would be doing a good turn to Mr. Minchin, to the School, and to the boys. Dr. Tovey concluded by asking the Old Boys to do himself and Mrs. Tovey a further kindness, and that was to call upon them at their new home at Eastbourne, where they would always find a very hearty welcome.

At the conclusion of this presentation there was an interesting little incident, the presentation to Dr. Tovey of a pipe from the "Visitors' Gallery" at the cricket matches on the field. The gift was handed to him by Messrs. W. Stacey and S. Taylor, on behalf of those townsmen who regularly attend the matches.

Dr. Tovey also received a case of pipes from the South Wilts Cricket Club, and a pipe from the Bournemouth Incogniti Club.

Mr. Ramshaw next asked Dr. and Mrs. Tovey to accept a silver coffee jug and electric table lamp from all connected with the School Staff. He spoke of the great esteem in which Dr. and Mrs. Tovey were held by all, and expressed his great personal sorrow at the break in their long association with himself.

Mr. Minchin thanked Dr. and Mrs. Tovey for the very generous way in which the comfort of resident masters had always been studied.

BY THE

CHURCH COUNCIL OF HOLY TRINITY CHURCH.
SHAFTESBURY.

Dr. and Mrs. Tovey attended the meeting of the Holy Trinity Church Council, at the Parish Hall, on Friday, July 1st, when the Rector (Rev. H. H. Coley), in the name of the Council, presented Dr. Tovey with a picture, and Mrs. Tovey with a crystal cut glass vase.

The Rector said that Dr. Tovey had had an experience which few men enjoyed, that of worshipping in the same church for 25 years. It had been a critical period of great stress and strain for the church. Great changes had taken place in the social life of the country, and in the religious conceptions of the people and especially with regard to the obligations of Sunday. The clergy had almost been driven to distraction during the post-war years in maintaining the parochial system, and it had been an enormous help to have a man of Dr. Tovey's sincere conviction and integrity during those difficult years. The Rector said he felt that he could speak for his predecessors at Holy Trinity, for Dr. Tovey had been the mainstay of successive rectors during his time at Shaftesbury. The Rector said he was surprised and bewildered to find when he came to Shaftesbury that he had to preach to so many boys who were always attended by their headmaster, but the association of the Parish and the School had always been most happy, and Dr. Tovey most helpful.

Dr. Tovey, acknowledging the gift, said he did not believe in the sort of churchmanship which did not involve some sort of sacrifice, and his years at Holy Trinity had been most happy. He had seen the church pass through many phases, and he felt that he could truly say that the church and parish had never been in such a flourishing condition as at present. Things were being done and the parish had got a move on. He would take away with him the happiest recollections of his association with the parish.

Mrs. Tovey also thanked the Council, and said it had been a pleasure to help in any way.
