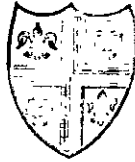

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EDITORIAL.

The members of the team were inexperienced, and many of them were lacking in weight; but they put up remarkably good performances against heavier and established teams. The game was very popular in the upper school, and the younger boys are beginning to see what an excellent game it is.

The weather during the latter part of last term was cold and unsettled, and training for the sports was less pleasant than usual. The rain and snow which fell on the morning of March 21st resulted in our annual sports being postponed to the following day. The latter was anything but ideal, the wet track making good performances impossible.

To R. H. Tarrant we offer our congratulations on winning the Spry Fives Cup. The standard of play was only moderate, but Tarrant thoroughly deserved his success.

The present term has opened with an optimistic outlook on the cricket season. Everywhere one sees keenness and an anxiety to improve, the effects of which have already made

their mark in all departments of the game. The 1st XI. is short of good bowlers, but the batting is sound, while the "Under 14" XI. is the best we have had for many years.

Unfortunately for our work and games, an epidemic of German measles of a mild type broke out a few days after the term began. At the time of going to press we are still getting fresh cases, but we hope to be free before too many of our summer activities are interfered with.

SCHOOL SPORTS.

WEATHER plays such an important part on Sports day, both for the comfort of the spectators and the competitors alike, that it seems only natural to begin an account of the sports with a few remarks on the state of the atmosphere. We are not often very lucky in choosing a fine day, but this year we could hardly have chosen a worse; for the first half of the term we had excellent school weather, but as soon as the Rugby stopped to allow training for athletics, then cold winds and rain started, but we managed to have the Cross Country Race during the fine spell. Owing to the fact that the track was changed, it is impossible to compare the times returned this year with those of previous years; even had it been possible, comparisons give little indication as to the ability of the respective winners—so many factors enter into such a race. In the seniors, C. H. C. Adams beat S. C. Francis by about twenty yards, with R. J. Friend ten yards behind, this order being maintained over the last mile. M. A. Tory won the under 14 race very easily, R. C. Emery being second.

For the Half Mile, on Tuesday, March 13th, not only was the track very heavy, but there was a strong wind so that a good time was not expected; but the state of the track, etc., can hardly be said to account for the time which this race took. Having seen such a slow Half Mile the Mile was no surprise, especially considering that it finished in a snow storm. The only point in connection with this event was the extraordinary first quarter of A. R. M. Tanner; of course he could not maintain it, but had he produced this in the Half Mile on the previous Tuesday he could have made a great difference to the result.

One very pleasing thing about this year's Sports was the phenomenal entry—it made the list of the heats which were run off on the Saturday a very large one, but it showed that as many as possible were taking an active interest, which is the first step to improvement.

The Sports Day was advertised for Wednesday, March 21st, but about 11 a.m. rain started and they had to be postponed until the following day. The Thursday morning was fine, but soon after the start rain set in and made the track very bad indeed, the hurdling suffering considerably; for instance, J. L. Tait won the under 14 event (84 yards) in 20 2-5 secs., last year he won the under 13 event (same height of hurdle and distance) in 17 secs. Certainly his hurdling has not deteriorated, though a comparison of the times seem to point to this; it only shows the futility of attempting measure improvement on the result of one event per year.

The best finish of the afternoon was seen in the Quarter Mile Open. E. J. Pulman obtained the lead at the start, and held it until about twenty yards from the post, when L. S. Burden came up with great power and won by two feet in 63 3-5 secs., which, considering the running conditions, was distinctly good. Another event which provided a very pleasing finish was the 220 yards Handicap (under 13). W. J. Jesse, the youngest boy in the School, proved that, with his handicap, he was too fast for anyone to catch him; K. Milverton did his best, but could not manage it. So frequently the boy with the highest handicap looks round to see where he is, but Jesse set his eyes on the tape and got to it first.

Though, as stated before, the entries were better than for many years, an exception must be made in the case of the High Jump (Under 12); only four entered for this, and when entries are poor it generally happens that the results are poor, too; had competition been keener, probably the winner could have done better. The standard of the junior Long Jumping is very poor; the winner, M. A. Tory, cleared 14ft. 8in., but the second was well over a foot behind this, while the majority were under 12ft. As far as the senior events were concerned, the worst result was that of the Throwing of the Cricket Ball; considering the amount of practice which is possible, 71 yards is a distance which should be improved upon.

R. J. Friend won the Open Championship with 25 points, E. J. Pulman being second with 12. The winner obtained his total by coming first in the High Jump, the Hurdles, the Hundred Yards, together with second place in the Long Jump and third in the Cross Country; E. J. Pulman winning the Long Jump and coming second in the Hundred Yards and the Quarter Mile. M. A. Tory had an easy win in the Under 14 Championship, obtaining 32 points by winning the Junior Cross Country, the Hundred Yards, the Long Jump and the Quarter Mile; K. Tuffin was second with 14 points, winning the High Jump (after a tie with B. B. Moore), and coming second in the Long Jump.

After the Sports, Mr. Minchin thanked the donors of the many handsome prizes, and said how pleased he was to welcome the Mayor (Mrs. A. Norton) to the Sports. Following the prize distribution, the champion athlete called for three cheers for the Mayor, after which the visitors were entertained to tea by Mr. and Miss Minchin.

RUGBY.

THOSE concerned puzzled for many hours at the beginning of last term the problem of building up a side that would resemble a Rugby fifteen; but, as often happens in school life, boys who a term earlier seemed midgets, return after the holidays with some pretensions to size and an ability scarcely suspected in them. Added to this was the pleasant experience of finding over one hundred and twenty keen on learning all within their power of the art of playing Rugby. Still there was much hard work as most of these had to be taught again from the beginning; the forwards how to scrimmage, line out, feed their three-quarters, and be with the ball all the time; the halves and three-quarters where to stand, how to catch the ball and pass with reasonable accuracy; and finally the full backs had to be persuaded that they were not Soccer goalkeepers. Off-side was a nightmare to the boys and their coaches; patience all round was necessary for the application of those rules that preserve Rugby from becoming a mere rough and tumble.

After a couple of weeks' practice, Mr. Minchin kindly consented to take about thirty masters and boys to Bourne-mouth to see the Hampshire v. Gloucestershire County match. A splendid game encouraged the boys to persist in their efforts, and to try and apply some of the good points of play which they had witnessed.

A report on the School fifteen, and those who will possibly next year become members of it, may well begin with the full back. J. M. Harding soon learned to play creditably in this position, and had a fair kick to touch, but he must get into a position to tackle when necessary and not rely too much on fly kicking. D. M. Harrison, of the younger boys, has a splendid knowledge of positional play, and can tackle around the knees. He will have a rival in C. Coats.

E. J. Pulman, R. J. Edwards, E. M. Barrett or D. Knapton, and R. J. Friend usually formed the threequarter line, but they never worked as a line, their passing often breaking down, and when it succeeded they ran from touch line to touch line without the gain of a yard. They must learn to run straight and make an opening by a side step or swerve, not by running across their opponents. R. J. Edwards was the best tackler, but generally the true tackle around the knees was non-existent. Among the juniors, M. A. Tory and H. T. Imber, if they will persevere, will be very useful threequarters.

J. A. Cole, after a disappointing start, did extraordinarily well at outside half. He saved many tries by his keen tackling; he ran hard and had the best idea of an opening. J.

Russell, at inside half, would have done quite well could he have picked the ball up more quickly, and sent out a longer pass. Short passes from the base of the scrum make the out half either have to run to the blind side or across the field.

Among the forwards, R. P. Jesse did many good things, often getting the ball and making use of it. The rest of the pack did all they could to help him, with D. Knapton, J. M. Day and J. D. Hawkins (hooker), catching the eye most. The forwards' great weakness was failure to bind tightly in the scrums and to push with every ounce of their weight. There were many lapses, too, in the line out, from which, owing to poor marking, our opponents scored several tries. They must remember that if an opposing forward has a two stone advantage in weight, hanging round his neck will not hinder his progress. A giant killer is he who can tackle low. The weakness in "loving" an opponent was amply proved against Dorchester, when a huge forward with four of the School team clinging to him, walked over to score a try.

In the preceding remarks; perhaps there is more criticism than appreciation, but it is given with the best intent, for the happy memory of our second season of Rugby is the enthusiasm shown for a game that bristles with difficulties often unsuspected by the uninitiated. This enthusiasm goes a long way to compensate for the fact that we had no victories to our credit.

DETAILS OF MATCHES.

S.G.S. v. BOURNEMOUTH COLLEGIANS, home, Feb 10th. Lost 6-7.—The School, after several disappointments on account of scratched matches, had at last a test of their ability as a Rugby fifteen. For twenty minutes the School played with a vim that augured well for the result. During this period they scored an unconverted try. Then E. J. Pulman had to leave the field with an injury to the head, and with D. K. Knapton drawn from the pack to the threequarters, the remaining seven, in the second half, began to tire, and the larger experience of Bournemouth to tell. However, the School scored another unconverted try, but after that our opponents had matters much their own way. Their outside half smartly dropped a goal, and, spurred by this success, they hammered away near our line; our team fought desperately to keep them out; two minutes to go; Knapton found himself under a pile of players; his position was left undefended, and as the ball came loose the Bournemouth wing picked it up and had a clear run through but wide out. They failed to convert and the end came with the School losing by seven points to six.

S.G.S. v. WIMBORNE GRAMMAR SCHOOL, away, Feb. 27th. Lost 11-16.—In this match the School XV. put up a very good show against a heavier, faster and more experienced team. In the pack the forwards were particularly good, but were not so skilful in the loose, being inclined to hang back too much. Jesse was a tower of strength to the side, and he received excellent support from Cole and Buckland. Cole's tackling was particularly good, and on many occasions he was responsible for breaking up movements which appeared likely to result in tries. Buckland failed to convert on one occasion, but his penalty goal from a range of 45 yards was a particularly good effort. For a period of 20 minutes after the interval when the score stood at 6-3 against us, we appeared to have the game in hand. Two mistakes then occurred which decided the game against us. Tanner unfortunately was penalised for being offside, a goal being scored from the penalty kick, and a bad bit of marking in a line-out enabled a Wimborne forward to get over the line without opposition. The game was keenly contested throughout, and provided us with the means of obtaining that experience so necessary in the building up of a young team.

S.G.S. 1st XV. v. DORCHESTER GRAMMAR SCHOOL 1st XV. Played at Dorchester on Wednesday, 28th February. Lost 3-12.—Although defeated, the School XV. has every reason to be proud of its performance in this match. Dorchester were much heavier, particularly forward, but the School held them very well until half-time, when the score was two tries to one in favour of Dorchester. G. W. Buckland scored our try after a dribble, but the best football of this half was a very fine straight dash by J. A. Cole, who ran through half the opposing side before being brought down. The second half was only a few minutes old when J. A. Cole suffered an ankle injury and had to leave the field. R. P. Jesse left the forwards and filled Cole's place, but the remaining seven forwards were gradually worn down, and Dorchester scored twice in the closing minutes of the game. Dorchester deserved their win, but our own team deserve congratulation for the splendid fight they made. J. A. Cole was our outstanding outside, while J. M. Harding defended well. R. P. Jesse played a hard and untiring game forward, and was well supported by J. M. Day.

S.G.S. v. DORCHESTER, home, March 7th. Lost 0-22.—Owing to the injury sustained by J. A. Cole in the game at Dorchester, a strain suffered by J. D. Hawkins in the same match, and J. Day's breaking his wrist while training for the High Jump, the School had to call in the help of Mr. Williams at forward, and Mr. Guthrie at outside half. Mr. Thomas

balanced matters by playing for his School. The School played with the slope and wind during the first half, and were successful in holding their own against a much heavier pack which played with more skill and knowledge, and a three-quarter line that moved with speed and rhythm. For a while during the second half, the School still fought desperately, but after Dorchester had scored two tries which they converted, they exerted to the full their all-round superiority, and the final score was twenty-two points to nil against the School. R. P. Jesse worked hard in the scrum, and D. Knapton kept moving after the ball throughout the game, while J. M. Harding played a sound game; but the pack failed to mark their men in the line out, and two tries were the result of this failure.

FIVES.

SPRY CUP COMPETITION.

AS usual, there was a full entry for the competition for the Spry Cup, and some interesting games were witnessed, although the standard of play was the lowest for several years. Four players were seeded in the draw—Murphy, Tarrant, Hawkins and Buckland, and of these, Hawkins and Buckland were compelled to scratch before the end of the tournament, the former having strained himself at Rugby, and the latter leaving unexpectedly after reaching the semi-final. This robbed the tournament of some of its interest, but probably made no difference to the result. In the final, Tarrant beat Whidborne fairly easily—15-11, 15-8—and thus became the sixth holder of the trophy.

Very little Fives was played before half-term as the weather was very kind to us and Rugby took up everybody's time. This may explain the rather low standard of play. At the present time, few boys seem to be able to hit crisply or place their shots to the best effect. However, there are several young players who show good promise and plenty of keenness.

As the playing of both the House Fives and the Spry Cup Tournament always leads to an epidemic of bruised hands, it is possible that next year one or other of them will be played off at the beginning of the Summer term.
