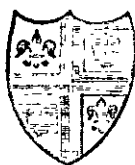

AFTER thirty-two years service in this school, Mr. F. L. Watmough retired at the end of last term, having served the school loyally and well under three Headmasters.

Before the school broke up for the summer holidays, he received appreciative recognition of his life's work and the congratulations and good wishes of the Governors, Masters, and Boys. Presentations were made, and Mr. Watmough's career as a schoolmaster came to an end.

A GLANCE at the above table of results will show that in the 1935 season our cricket teams did well, and that there was a decided improvement on the efforts of the previous season, and what is more pleasing, if results are any indication, there is promise of better material from the Second and "Under 14" elevens than has been produced for some time past. Probably the higher standard reached in 1935 was due more to excellence in fielding than to any merit of batting or bowling, although there were a few notable performances in those departments.

First XI.—J. M. Harding, who was captain for the second year in succession, was fortunate in having five old colours to form the nucleus of his team, but he did not find it a simple task to fill the remaining five places. Of the old colours, J. M. Harding, M. F. Murphy, J. E. Russell, F. J. Green and R. J. W. Edwards had claims to batsmanship, but the last named was never able to find his form. G. S. Gibbings and M. A. Tory gained their colours as batsmen and fielders, while H. T. Imber was introduced as an all-rounder who could send up a good medium paced delivery. No other colours were awarded, although A. R. M. Tanner and D. P. Darrington were finally considered more or less permanent members of the eleven. Other possible choices were R. H. Frearson and M. G. Watton.

The brunt of our attack fell upon the shoulders of M. F. Murphy, who had previously been considered a batsman rather than a bowler. He bowled consistently well throughout the season. C. G. Jeffries, from whom much was expected, failed to show his true form after the first two matches. J. M. Harding proved very successful against bowlers of the defensive type, and had a good season. H. T. Imber had a good delivery, and could occasionally turn the ball from the off, but his length was very poor. R. J. Edwards, M. A. Tory and A. R. M. Tanner were useful in taking an occasional wicket. On the whole, however, our bowling did not impress; they were all fair stock bowlers, but there was no-one who gave the suggestion that he had the speed, length, guile, or confidence that takes wickets.

The fielding of the side cannot be praised too highly. All did their part well, but special mention must be made of M. A. Tory at cover, F. J. Green at slip, and the wicket-keeping of J. E. Russell, whose presence behind the stumps made many batsmen, aware of his prowess, fall easy victims to our bowlers.

The chief memories that remain of a pleasant season are, the general keenness and team work of the eleven; that every member of the team, whether he made many runs or not, looked as if he could handle a bat, as a cricketer; that the bowlers, although they knew they lacked greatness, made up for it by whole-hearted persistency; and the high standard all set themselves in the field, where very few opportunities were missed.

His experience as captain the previous year, stood J. M. Harding in good stead during his second period of office, and he did his work quietly and well. His is a personality that does not seek publicity, but his worth is easily recognised in the respect given him by the members of the team.

Second XI.—Having won all four matches played, the second eleven can congratulate itself on having had a very successful season. Individually, the batting was rather uneven, as is to be expected in a 2nd XI., but someone always managed to make a score. Frearson, after a bad start, finished by being top scorer, getting 98 runs, most of them where he meant to. Watton also batted well. He was certainly consistent; he scored exactly 21 runs in each of three consecutive matches. Mottley had the luck which a determined hitter deserves, and scored the same number of runs as Watton—86. F. D. Barrett also batted well at times.

Mitchell, with his off-spinners, was the most successful bowler. He took 17 wickets for 116 runs. Dyke, bowling typical left-hander's stuff, was very steady and took 10 for 89.

The fielding was very fair. Catches were dropped of course, but some good ones were taken. Watton's wicket keeping, although not brilliant, was full of promise for the future.

"Under 14" XI.—The outstanding features of a successful season were the brilliant fielding and steady bowling of the whole team. Unfortunately, no boy of the previous year's team was available, and the team lacked leadership. As captain, F. T. Jennings failed to make full use of the bowling, but set a great example in the field. In this he was rivalled by A. J. Sharman. W. J. Miles developed into a good swing

bowler of more than medium pace. J. K. Miles and D. E. Coward kept a steady length and took good wickets. The batting was always determined but unenterprising. One free-hitter would perhaps have encouraged more forceful methods. The standard of cricket was high and full of enthusiasm.

Next season promises several good cricketers in J. K. Miles, D. E. Coward, J. G. Pearson, A. J. Sharman and R. B. Burrows.

Masters' XI.—There was a welcome return to something of the old form shown by the Masters' XI., and a pleasant season resulted. However, the batting again lacked consistency, and there were not many tall scores. Mr. Minchin and Mr. Cave were the chief run getters, and the bowling was usually shared by Mr. Minchin, Mr. Cole and Mr. Scalbert. In common with that of the other teams, the fielding was very good, and on one occasion was so brilliant that it drew from a reporter the praise of being equal to county standard.

No record is complete without mention of those who manipulate the score board, and our thanks are heartily accorded to W. F. Chapman and his helpers, not forgetting G. R. Tucker for his work as scorer and keeper of the sheets.

CHARACTERS OF THE TEAM

(in alphabetical order).

- R. J. W. EDWARDS.—With a better defence he would become a good batsman, and would be valuable to a team as an all-rounder; last season he showed no development; a quick and sure field.
- F. J. GREEN.—A much improved batsman; not so much the stonewaller of 1934; many good off-strokes, but must cure the fault of retreating to square leg; an excellent slip field.
- G. S. GIBBINGS.—A good attacking batsman with no defence and a fatal tendency to pull across a straight ball; a good field.
- J. M. HARDING.—A greatly improved batsman who has overcome his weakness for playing back to every ball; has many strokes in front of the wicket; fair field.
- H. T. IMBER.—A useful left-hander who should learn to play more off strokes; a steady medium-paced bowler; fair field.
- C. G. ST. D. JEFFRIES.—A swing bowler who will be more successful when he improves his length and bowls on the middle or off stump; his batting improved and showed promise.
- M. F. MURPHY.—Had the best cover shot of any player, but still weak on the leg side; bowled his medium-fast left-handers consistently well. Improved field.

J. E. RUSSELL.—An attacking batsman with many good strokes, but a weakness for playing across a straight half-volley; one of the best schoolboy wicket-keepers ever.

M. A. TORY.—Has all the promise of a fine forcing batsman, but too fond of cocking up a simple one early in his innings; must learn to play firm, defensive strokes; an excellent field.

Sharman (who was promoted from the juniors) was exceptionally good. The batting also was very good—the best for many years. H. T. Imber, F. J. Green, M. A. Tory and P.
