In his younger days he was a very keen cricketer, and on one occasion last term he spent a considerable time on the school fields watching the club cricket.

To Mrs. White and to all members of his family we offer our sincerest sympathy in the great loss they have sustained. He will be sadly missed here, for he was one who took a very keen interest in anything pertaining to the welfare of the school.

CRICKET.

THE improvement shown in the cricket of the 1935 elevens was definitely maintained this year. In addition there was that glorious uncertainty which so many cricketers claim as one of the charms of the game. Certain victories resolved themselves into surprising defeats, and expected defeats proved joyful victories. To the former belongs the victory gained by Wimborne Grammar School, who are to be congratulated on breaking a long succession of defeats; to the latter the School win against Sherborne 2nd XI., a long-awaited success that has at last materialised. Further cause for rejoicing were the centuries made by members of the 1st, 2nd, and Masters' Elevens.

First XI.—There were five old colours to form the nucleus of a good side under the captaincy of F. J. Green. Of these, F. J. Green, G. S. Gibbings and M. A. Tory were batsmen, H. T. Imber an all-rounder, and C. G. St. D. Jeffries a bowler. The other places were soon secured by F. D. Barrett, M. G. Watton, W. Hardy and A. R. N. Tanner as batsmen, E. S. W. Dyke for his bowling and fielding, and D. H. Ryall as wicket keeper. Others who were given trials were C. R. J. Mitchell, K. Tuffin, J. R. Domoney and C. Coats. The first three are still at school and have only to show some slight improvement to be sure of their places next year.

The whole side gave the impression that they could bat down to number eleven, and proved themselves capable of making runs, but on several occasions failures early in the innings had an unsettling effect upon the side in which nerves were possibly the greatest cause of weakness. With more confidence they would have resisted the efforts of any side to take their wickets. Most of the eleven showed a pleasing aptitude in the handling of a bat. They had a variety of strokes but missed many runs to square or fine leg, and only one or two claimed to exercise the rights of being hitters only.

The bowling was steady but lacked guile, though no great fault can be found with this for a steady length is the foundation of all good bowling. C. G. Jeffries was the most consistent bowler, taking more wickets than H. T. Imber whose excellent bowling in some matches gave him a better average. E. S. W. Dyke was the change bowler. He bowls left arm, and had an occasional leg break that took a wicket, but his length was too erratic.

In fielding the Eleven reached a high standard and all deserve praise, particularly Dyke who was excellent at third man.

Second XI.—The first match of a fairly successful season was against Dorchester at Shaftesbury. Batting first we were dismissed for 76 runs of which Hardy, who batted well, scored 33 and Palmer 10. There were 23 extras. Eight of the team scored between them exactly three runs. This was followed by slack fielding and we lost a close game by 3 runs. The experience gained in this game, however, enabled us to win when we played the return match at Dorchester. W. Hardy and J. R. Domoney scored in good style and N. H. Foot hit very hard, so we made the fair total of 103 runs. We then dismissed them for 42, H. G. Pearson bowling really well. In this game there was a marked improvement in batting, bowling and fielding. In the last game, against Wimborne, K. Tuffin, playing in place of Domoney, celebrated the occasion by scoring 102 not out before we declared at 201 for 5. Wimborne had scored 43. H. G. Pearson bowled well and L. O. Barrett and A. J. Palmer shared the honours with him.

G. R. Tucker made a good captain and handled his side well. D. H. Ryall kept wicket so well that he finished by being awarded his XI. colours. J. R. Richardson, although disappointing in the first two games, is a very stylish bat and should do well next season.

The "Under 14" won all three matches played. Heavy rains unfortunately caused the cancelling of return games with Clayesmore and Wimborne. Success was due to steady bowling backed up by very good fielding, and to the ability of most of the team for collecting runs when really needed. J. K. Miles, as captain, steadied his team by an example of good, sound cricket. D. E. Coward and K. J. R. Fawcett alone showed real freedom in stroke play. C. W. Rooks promises to become a good, hard-hitting bat. The bowling of J. K. Miles, R. B. Burrows, D. E. Coward and J. G. Pearson was always of good length. Of eleven good fieldsmen A. J. Sharman was outstanding. T. M. Corson, although too small and young, profited greatly by his well-earned inclusion and has the makings of a grand bat. Of those who failed to obtain a place in the team, R. L. Wareham showed much promise as a left-arm bowler.

The Master's XI. had a very pleasant and successful season. In all departments of the game there were some good performances, and the side ended the season with one of particular excellence. The opening batsmen made 186 and we were able to declare without the loss of a wicket. If anyone is interested in records perhaps he can tell whether this is one for the Masters' XI.

F. J. Green in his capacity as captain helped by his own example to imbue his team with a good spirit and keenness. He handled his few bowlers with fair judgment, but there were occasions when the placing of the field was open to criticism.

Many thanks to G. R. Tucker and W. G. King who acted as scorers and to the score-board mechanics who seemed to have less trouble with the wires this year.

CHARACTERS OF THE TEAM

- F. D. BARRETT.—Fairly sound in defence but has few scoring strokes; should develop his off-side play; fair field.
- E. S. W. DYKE.—Has many good strokes as a batsman but lacks power; tries to get too many balls past point; useful left-arm bowler; excellent field.
- G. S. GIBBINGS.—A much improved batsman with a stronger defence; excellent field at point.
- F. J. GREEN.—His batting has further improved; has more strokes and makes runs more quickly; maintained his reputation as a very good slip field.
- W. HARDY.—Good batsman with many strokes; his defence needs strengthening; keen field.
- H. T. IMBER.—Can make many runs; slow starter; must strengthen his off-side play avoiding the snick to slips; a steady accurate medium paced bowler; fielding much improved.
- C. G. St. D. JEFFRIES.—Much more successful this year with his swing bowling; varied the flight and pitch of the ball; looks a good batsman with some hard strokes but lacks confidence; fielding improved.
- D. H. RYALL.—Improved greatly as a wicket-keeper; did many smart things; batting slow, but a useful man to keep an end up.
- A. R. M. TANNER.—Too impetuous; wants to hit every ball for six, result too often a cross-bat and disaster; a little steadiness would improve; keen field.
- M. A. TORY.—Has shown improvement but still over-anxious to force the pace; has many strokes; one of the hardest hitters in the Eleven; fielding weakened by injury to his shoulder.
- M. G. WATTON.—Fair batsman in attack and defence; too often caught in two minds; running between the wickets could be improved; fair field.

When I arrived at his home, Mr. Bird was engaged in sowing seed in his delightful garden. His wife was sitting in a deck chair directing him, while the little Birds were to be seen amid the branches of the nearby apple trees.
