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EDITORIAL.

IN many of our recent magazines we have started the Editorial Notes with those depressing words: "We very much regret to record" etc. In this number we can start on a more cheerful note.

We are very glad to record—

- (a) A summer term free from illness and doctor's bills.
- (b) An autumn which has provided us with some delightful sunshine.
- (c) An 85% list of Cambridge Examination successes as compared with 65% for the whole country.
- (d) An entry of 32 new boys this term. This has only once been exceeded in the history of the school.
- (e) A record number of recruits (43) joining the Cadet Corps.
- (f) A most enjoyable and successful cricket season.
- (g) An auspicious start to the football season by a team which shews every promise of becoming one of the best elevens we have ever had.

So much for the past and present. What about the future?

Thanks to the valued efforts of our School Governors and to the financial help accorded to them by the Dorset County Education Committee, we are able to look forward to the time when we shall have a Physics Laboratory and two more classrooms. These additions will enable us to extend the present small library into one capable of holding all our books of reference and fiction, and provide us with a boarders' sitting-room. The badly situated and sunless Form III. classroom will

become a store-room and cloak-room in accordance with the Board of Education's recent recommendations.

With these financial responsibilities to shoulder, the Governors are quite unable to help with the modernisation and improvement of the outside buildings, such as the pavilion and changing rooms. These are becoming old and too small for our needs. The day-boys' changing-room holds 50 to 60 comfortably but 110 boys have to use it. The facilities for washing are totally inadequate and something must be done to improve them.

With this end in view, Mr. Minchin is making an earnest appeal to the inhabitants of Shaftesbury and district, to parents, to Old Boys and to present boys, to help him raise a fund sufficiently large to provide a spacious pavilion with changing rooms attached. We sincerely hope that one and all will give something, however small it may be, to help in this effort.

Since 1878; fifteen hundred and thirty-two boys have passed through the school. An appeal has been sent to all those whose addresses are known, but we do ask them to send something, whether they have received an official letter or not.

We are delighted to hear that Col. The Hon. Sir George Herbert, Bt., has been elected to the Governing Body of the School, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. A. R. White, of Charnage.

Our congratulations to the Sixth and Upper Fifth Forms on their performances in the Cambridge Examinations last July. They were particularly good.

To G. R. Rousell we offer our sincerest thanks for the fine "Football Cup" which he has presented to the School.

We are sorry to record the departure from our midst of the Rev. N. S. Lawrie, who is now living in retirement near Beaulieu. He was Rector of Cann for thirty years, and was well known to many boys, Old Boys and parents. A frequent visitor to the school during the summer terms, he always enjoyed watching our home cricket matches, and took the greatest interest in the school dramatic productions.

We miss him very much, but we are delighted to know that he intends to remain on our Board of Governors and to visit the school when opportunities to do so occur. We wish him a long and happy rest from his labours.

The annual Prize Distribution will be held at 3 p.m. on Thursday, November 25th, when we hope to welcome a large company of parents and friends. Col. The Hon. Sir George Herbert, Bt., of Knoyle House, has very kindly promised to present the prizes.

The School breaks up for the Christmas holidays on Friday, December 17th. The Christmas Entertainment will be given on the evenings of Wednesday and Thursday, Dec. 15th and 16th.

CRICKET.

SUCCESS attended the efforts of the School Elevens in the majority of the games played during the summer of 1937. However, that was not the only pleasing feature, for the atmosphere of our cricket was brightened by the general keenness of all the boys and their unfailing cheerfulness. In addition, they compensated their coaches by showing that the instruction given them at the nets had not been unavailing.

First XI.—F. J. Green, who had gained invaluable experience in his previous year's captaincy, had three old colours in C. G. St. D. Jeffries, M. A. Tory and W. Hardy. The first, although his bowling had lost its effectiveness, made ample amends with some very sound batting displays. In fact, such was his progress in the batsman's art that he was awarded the Batting Cup. M. A. Tory proved the best all-rounder in the side. He gained the Bowling Cup, and had to be seriously considered for both the Batting and Fielding Cups. W. Hardy did not produce his 1936 batting form, but this was probably due to the fact that he had to give some effort to the position of wicket-keeper, a position which he did not thoroughly enjoy but for which it was impossible to find an adequate substitute.

W. J. Miles was the first of the new-comers to win his colours for some excellent bowling in the early matches. He is a bowler of such promise that great things should be heard of him in the future. K. Tuffin, C. R. J. Mitchell, J. R. Domoney and G. W. Glaze were awarded their colours later in the season; Tuffin and Domoney on the strength of some useful scores, Glaze for excellent fielding, and Mitchell for some fair bowling and batting. H. G. Pearson and J. K. Miles were the other serious candidates for colours. The former was in the first place selected for his spin bowling but he was never needed, and so, although he played in every match, was unable to establish a strong claim by any meritorious performances. J. K. Miles came into the side rather late in the term, and showed such form in batting that he is certain to be a colours man next year. P. G. Nutbeem had a trial behind the wickets, but did not do just well enough, and J. R. Richardson in his few games gave the impression that with determined effort he would make a fine batsman.

F. J. Green carried out his duties as captain very well, and is to be congratulated on winning the Fielding Cup for really excellent work at slip. He appeared extremely popular with his fellow team members who willingly carried out his instructions. His batting is an example of the fact that conscientious perseverance will turn moderate into sound ability.

Second XI.—Of the three matches played, the 2nd XI. won the two School games, and put up quite a good show against the Old Shastonians.

J. K. Miles, W. C. Sutcliffe, J. G. Pearson and C. W. Rooks were the most successful bats and played very good cricket. Their style was very pleasing, and J. K. Miles deservedly won promotion to the 1st XI. The rest of the side did not bat as well as was expected.

In bowling, J. K. Miles was the most consistent. He kept a good length and was purposeful in all he did. E. G. Sessions took several wickets in the first game with his leg breaks, but failed to find a length in the other games. J. G. Pearson bowled much better than would appear from his analyses, but he enjoyed better fortune against the Old Shastonians.

The fielding was keen without reaching a high standard. The usual fault of junior sides was much in evidence—failure to keep in position. The wicket-keeping of P. Nutbeem, after a shaky start, improved, and was well up to the normal 2nd XI. standard.

"Under 14" XI.—The "Under 14" XI. won all their games. The general play of the whole team reached a high standard. The bowling of J. G. Pearson (the captain) and R. B. Burrows was consistently good. Pearson mixed off breaks and out swingers well and kept a good length. As a pace bowler Burrows showed more than average ability. Each took more than thirty wickets. D. E. Coward also bowled well. The batting was not so steady, but as each member of the team was capable of scoring runs, there was never any fear of a complete collapse. Pearson, A. J. Sharman and Burrows each scored a hundred runs, and they were well supported by Coward, W. J. Trim, I. E. M. Newton and K. Milverton. The fielding of the side was sound, but never intimidating, T. M. Corson and R. L. Wareham being outstanding. P. Brooks improved in every game as wicket-keeper, and was always eager to practise. J. W. Wormald had few opportunities to bowl, but he is a promising cricketer. R. J. Ford and N. L. Streeter each played one game. Of the younger members of the side, Corson is still handicapped by his size, but he should make many runs next season. T. Y. Wormald, also very keen, shows much promise for the future.

Masters' XI.—Many of the Masters' games recalled memories of that record-breaking period of a few years ago. Two games were lost, and however worthless excuses in general are, the following are going to be advanced for the failures. The first was lost because there had been no opportunity for any practise, and the other because the wicket had crumbled before the Masters, who had second knock, went in.

The batting was more dependable than for several seasons past; the bowling had variety and length, and the fielding was kept on every occasion. Mr. Scalbert, Mr. Renton and Mr. Cayle were the chief run-getters, and C. G. Jeffries, Mr. Smart and Mr. Minchin made a number of scores above twenty. Mr. Cole and Mr. Renton usually opened the attack and bore the brunt of the bowling, and if they failed, Mr. Minchin could often break a partnership with his off spinners.

No record of the cricket season would be complete without reference to the good work of the scorers, the operators of the telegraph, and those boys who so willingly undertook the invidious task of umpiring the Masters' matches. To them we offer our sincerest thanks.

CHARACTERS OF THE COLOURS

(in alphabetical order).

J. R. DOMONEY.—A neat stroke player, but his shots have no power behind them except on the leg side. A fair field, but often too casual.

G. W. GLAZE.—Has a sound sense of the batsman's office, but too slow-footed and diffident; will probably make a good bat when his assurance develops. First class field at point.

F. J. GREEN.—Proved a consistently good batsman. Stance still extraordinary, but has developed strokes all round the wicket. In the top class as a slip field.

W. HARDY.—Has a fair idea of stroke play, but had lost confidence in himself, with the result that he never hit the ball with any force. A fair wicket-keeper.

C. G. St. D. JEFFRIES.—Shone more as a batsman than a bowler; his batting had vigour and science; his bowling lacked sting and guile, but the ability is there. Fielding improved.

W. J. MILES.—His easy action as a bowler betrays batsmen into over-confidence. Never failed to break a long partnership. Makes the ball swing and break both ways. His batting lacks strength.

C. R. J. MITCHELL.—Somewhat unenterprising as a batsman. Prefers to keep the ball from his wicket to scoring runs. Occasionally hit out, but rather crudely. A steady off-spin bowler who knows how to keep the runs down.

M. A. TORY.—As forcing a bat as ever, but still has little regard for defence; weak to a ball on his leg stump. A very agile cover-point. His bowling has improved in speed and accuracy.

K. TUFFIN.—Gives the impression of being a neat and sound bat; played several good innings, but is too often caught in two minds; prefers the off-drive. Good field.
