To present boys we would say: "Take an active interest in the War and do your bit on the Home Front. Above all, keep yourself fit so that, should you be called in later years to take your part in the defence of your country, you will be ready and able to do so."

We are glad to report that the number of new boys at the beginning of the current term is easily a record. No less than 45 entered. Such a large entry made it necessary to create an extra Form, and by so doing, to add much extra work to an already busy staff.

We very much regret to record the death of Mrs. S. J. Keast, of 40, Bell Street, Shaftesbury. Mr. Keast, as senior clerk in the offices of Messrs. Burridge, Kent & Arkell, has been in close contact with this school for a great number of years, and has done, in his own quiet and efficient way, an immense amount of work on its behalf. To him and all members of his family we offer our deepest sympathy in the great loss he and they have sustained.

We congratulate H. G. Pearson and F. T. Jennings on being selected to play cricket for the Dorset Grammar Schools against Bryanston School last term. R. B. Burrows and J. K. Miles were selected to play against Weymouth College at Dorchester, but bad weather prevented a ball being bowled.

Mr. Bennett G. Young, the 1938-39 President of the Old Shastonian Club, has very kindly sent Mr. Minchin two photographs of the late Mr. James William Macklin, who died on Sept. 6th, 1884. In a will dated March 3rd, 1884, Mr. Macklin wrote: "I give and bequeath to the Governors for the time being of the Endowed Schools, Shaftesbury, the sum of one hundred pounds to be invested by them, and the income arising therefrom to be given yearly in prizes to the scholars for the encouragement of good Writing and Composition." These prizes have been awarded each year for the past 55 years, and we feel very grateful for such a practical and lasting means of helping forward the cause of education.

However, he shows signs of developing into a good player when he gets experience of better tennis.

AN APPRECIATION.

At the end of the Summer Term we had to say farewell to Mr. W. Ramshaw who, having reached the retiring age, now enters upon a period of rest which we hope will be as long as it is deserved.

Mr. Ramshaw came to Shaftesbury in September, 1903, after two years' service in Brecon County School. He has therefore devoted practically his whole career to this School, and we all know how much the School owes him for the big part he has played in its expansion. It is now more than four times the size it was in 1903, both from the point of view of bricks and mortar and numbers. No less than 1,250 boys have passed through the school during the 36 years of Mr. Ramshaw's mastership, and they will all recollect the help and encouragement given to them by him.

Mr. Ramshaw's interests were not confined by the four walls of the chemical laboratory or a classroom. In his earlier days he regularly played cricket and football, and excelled as a full-back at the latter game, while at the former he invariably made runs when others failed.

We remember, too, the big part he played in the numerous entertainments given by the masters and boys, especially those which preceded the Christmas holidays each year. Without exception these entertainments have been most successful and have afforded full testimony to Mr. Ramshaw's skill as a producer. His love of drama and a keen sense of humour enabled him to get every ounce of amusement out of his productions and a high standard of performance from an often inexperienced cast.

In this work he was most ably assisted by Mrs. Ramshaw, whose skill in camouflaging Rugger forwards as leading ladies was equally pronounced.

In 1915, Mr. Ramshaw was mainly instrumental in the formation of the School Cadet Corps, and has been its Commanding Officer ever since. Surely this is a record for any Commanding Officer.

It is impossible to express in words just how much the Corps is indebted to him for the great amount of voluntary work he did on its behalf, both during bi-weekly routine parades and during the times when a Shaftesbury contingent attended the P.S.S.C.A.'s camp in the summer holidays. It must be a source of considerable satisfaction to him to know

that at least two of his original cadets are now Majors in the Regular Army, and a third a Commander in His Majesty's Navy.

For 30 years Mr. and Mrs. Ramshaw lived at "Oakleigh," where they boarded a number of boys, all of whom remember with gratitude the home-from-home atmosphere provided for them there, and the many acts of kindness accorded them. They will be glad to know that Mr. and Mrs. Ramshaw have decided to stay in Shaftesbury, where we hope they will remain for many years to enjoy the leisure they so richly deserve.

A glance at the tabulated results introducing these notes will reveal much of the story of last term's School Cricket.

1st XI.—The many drawn games which the 1st XI. played, suggest the lack of penetrating bowlers and forcing batsmen, but in spite of this lack it proved itself the best we have had for several years. J. K. Miles was the most consistent batsman, and his innings of 50 not out against King Edward's, Southampton, was a memorable effort, which enabled G. W. Glaze to declare at 124 for 5, just on the tea interval. The improvement in batting of L. O. Barrett and D. E. Spencer was another pleasing feature of the season. Both reached the half century on one occasion, as did H. G. Pearson, but he made his best scores in the earlier matches and failed badly in the others. A. J. Sharman was second to Miles in consistency, and his innings of 46 not out at Crewkerne saved the Eleven from defeat, as his runs raised the score to a total that was 33 too many for our opponents. The other batsmen all did something at various times, but nothing sufficiently conspicuous to merit comment.

R. B. Burrows had to bear the burden of our attack. He was frequently successful with his good length right-arm bowling, which was faster than is normally expected from one of his physique. Yet there were times when he spoiled his efforts by trying to bowl too fast. J. G. Pearson had to act as stock bowler and, although his bowling looked harmless except for an occasional swerve or off-break, he took two or three wickets in every match. H. G. Pearson, with his slow off-breaks, was either extremely dangerous or expensive. He had the excellent analysis of 5 for 4 and 4 for 7 against Bournemouth School and Crewkerne respectively, but his figures in other matches are best ignored. D. E. Spencer was tried occasionally as a fast bowler, and was gradually showing excellent promise.

The fielding of the Eleven deserves the highest commendation, for rarely were catches missed or runs thrown away, and no batsman could risk a short run without seeing his wicket shattered before he reached his crease. F. T. Jennings

was particularly good at cover, J. K. Miles took his catches like a veteran, G. W. Glaze was a safe point, and A. J. Sharman returned the ball with speed and accuracy from third man, and the out-field.

There were several episodes during the season which deserve particular mention. The first occurred in the initial match against Bournemouth, away. The School XI. was dismissed for the low total of 71, and it seemed that Bournemouth would win easily; but they found runs even more difficult to get, and were out for 58. The time was only 5.10 p.m. and it was decided to carry on until the pre-arranged time of 6.30 for drawing stumps. The School XI. went like sheep to the slaughter—were out for 17 runs in 20 minutes actual batting time, and allowed Bournemouth to turn their defeat into a victory.

The return match at Shaftesbury was also a stirring affair. Our opponents batted first and none too well, but their captain had the initiative to declare at 124 for 9, a quarter of an hour before tea, and he was well rewarded when we lost three wickets for no runs before the tea bell stopped the rot. After tea, L. O. Barrett (17), J. G. Pearson (16), A. A. Higgins (13 not out) and R. B. Burrows (10) batted long enough to make it a drawn game.

Sherborne School 2nd XI. gave us the best batting display seen on our ground for a decade. They scored 280 for 4 in a little over two hours, and showed all the text book strokes. Our bowlers were powerless, for the good balls were treated with as scant courtesy as the bad.

In the match away, against King Edward's, Southampton, in addition to the good batting of J. K. Miles and D. E. Spencer, the purple patch was the bowling of R. B. Burrows, who started so aggressively that it appeared that our opponents must lose all their wickets in less than an hour, but later batsmen managed to play out time.

2nd XI.—Of the three matches played, one was a tie and the other two were won. The game at Dorchester was exciting, but should have been won quite easily. Dorchester 2nd XI. lost 9 wickets for 42 runs owing to the hostile bowling of T. W. Upjohn, but the last pair were allowed to raise the score to 88. When we batted, the score rose to 80 for 7, then 86 for 8, but at this point the excitement led to a silly run-out, and we just managed to tie. However, we won the return game easily, thanks to the slow left-arm bowling of J. A. Roberts (5 for 21) and the fast slingers of T. W. Upjohn (5 for 32). We ended the season with an easy victory over a weak Old Boys' side.

"Under 14."—This eleven had a successful season, losing only one game, and that by the narrowest of margins. The success of the side was due chiefly to the batting and fielding of the captain, T. M. Corson, and to the slow left-arm bowling of J. A. Roberts. Corson made three half-centuries and had an average of over thirty runs an innings. The chief merits of his batting were a sound defence and an amazing concentration. As he grows older, his already wide range of strokes will become much more fluent. D. F. Simpson, P. H. Hunt, W. J. Jesse and D. G. Hayter were the other chief run-getters, the last also scoring a half century. Roberts took 24 wickets at an average of less than eight runs apiece. He kept a good length even against forceful hitting. At times he would have been devastating with more help from the fieldsmen. Simpson and Corson also bowled well in several games. The fielding of the side was not always as lively and as antagonistic as could be wished; but usually most the catches were held, although runs were lost by poor ground fielding. The XI. lacked a wicket-keeper, and of those tried, viz., P. H. Hunt, J. Trevis and E. B. Sims, the last showed most promise. T. Y. Wormald, R. W. Williamson and B. H. Frowd all played their parts in the success of the side.

Masters' XI.—Was as consistent as it has been for several years. The season was not an arduous one, only six games being played to a finish, and one being abandoned owing to rain. The weather, too, caused the cancellation of the other matches on the fixture list. The batting of the side as a whole was quite satisfactory, and the bowling, although circumscribed, strong enough to dismiss our opponents for low totals.

JUST HERE AND THERE.

There seems to be no connection, at first sight between a leper and a library, or a poodle and a puddle. The unhappy leper is covered with scales—Greek *lepes*. From the same root comes *liber*, the scaly bark of a tree, formerly used to write on, and every schoolboy knows *liber* is the Latin for book. Again, the beech was commonly used, and “book” comes from “beech.” A library is a collection of books; and so leper, book and library are closely associated. “Poodle” comes from the German for “waddle” or “splash,” and “puddle” has the same origin.

Those popular words, tea and coffee, are respectively Chinese and Abyssinian. Cocoa, really a mis-spelling of “cacao,” is Mexican, and so is chocolate. Do not confuse “cocoa” with “coco” the palm that coco-nuts grow on. “Bread” is good old English, but “butter” has been a bone of contention among philologists. An obvious derivation is from two Greek words meaning “ox-cheese.” But there is a South Russian word, just “butter.”

“Bosh!” you say. This is Turkish for vain, empty. And if we eat humble pie, this is made from the entrails, the umbles, of the deer, which fell to the share of the meanest servants. The humble ass gets the name donkey from the colour, dun—a double diminutive. To some folks a donkey looks an idiot. This last word meant in Greece a private individual, one who took no part in public affairs, so one with something peculiar about him. “Peculiar” meant originally independent, from the Latin “pecus,” a herd of cattle, recalling times when all wealth took that form.

Nowadays we reckon our wealth in money, from Moneta, the Admonisher, one of Juno’s many titles. Coin used to be *minted* in the temple at Rome. We calculate our wealth, but not in the old way of counting with *calculi*, pebbles, like some savages with cowrie-shells to-day.

The origin of many quite common words is unknown. Here are a few: “Pig,” “key,” “kipper,” “toy,” “row” (meaning a din), “match” (to strike for a light). They have puzzled (another mystery word) all the scholars of Oxford and Cambridge. The last, by the way, does not owe its name to having a bridge over the Cam. The town was called Cambridge long before the Granta was called the Cam. The name is contracted from “Grantabrygge.”

So much for words in disguise, but words are the dress of thought, and to-day many people’s thoughts concern the

liberty which the totalitarian states are threatening. An old Scottish poet well expresses our attitude in—

" Ah! freedom is a noble thing!
 Freedom gives man joy in living!
 Freedom all comfort to man gives:
 He lives at ease that freely lives!
 A noble heart may have no ease,
 Nor a thing else that may him please
 If freedom fails: for free choice
 Is sought by every voice
 And he, that aye has lived free
 Knows nothing of the evil property
 Of anger, nor the wretched doom
 That is coupled with foul serfdom.
 But if he had to essay it
 Then thoroughly would he weigh it,
 And consider freedom a greater prize
 Than all the gold that in the world is."

Your thoughts concerning the black-out may be many and varied, but are probably not expressed with the same polish as in these lines from Alexander Pope's "Dunciad":—

" Nor public flame, nor private, dares to shine;
 Nor human light is left, nor glimpse divine!
 Lo! thy dread Empire, chaos, is restored;
 Light dies before thine uncreating word:
 Thy hand, great Anarch, lets the curtain fall;
 And universal darkness buries all."

OLD SHASTONIAN CRICKET TOUR, 1939.

After a lapse of five years, an O.S. Cricket tour was arranged this year, and was a great success.

We started at Ringwood, and after getting our opponents out for 100, thanks to L. J. Cole who took 5 for 29, and F. T. Gauntlett with 4 for 25, we were skittled out for 45, only two players making double figures. In spite of the weather—it was drizzling much of the time—it was an enjoyable game, but our batting was very poor on a fairly easy wicket.

After the game we went off to the White Horse Hotel at Haslemere, our headquarters for the next three days, and there spent quite an exhilarating evening. And so finally to bed.

The next day saw us at Dunsfold, a charming village with a very pleasant ground, and here we made up for the previous day's disaster. We played three non-Shastonians in this match, one of whom, Inspector Andrews, took 6 wickets for 25; G. C. Mitchell took 3 for 16, and so we had Mr. Kent's XI. out for 82 by lunch-time. After lunch our opening bats, G. Scalbert and Insp. Andrews, knocked off the runs before the former was out—stumped at 87. This was a very careful, patient stand, but soon the game brightened up when M. A. Tory decided to try and hit the cover off the ball. He scored 56 including two grand 6's and seven 4's. Then F. T. Gauntlett had a turn and managed to outdrive Tory with three huge 6's in his score of 52 not out. In all we scored 241 for 7 before returning to Haslemere.

The next morning it rained continuously. In fact at Haslemere it rained all day, but at Witley, where we were due to play, the luck which followed us on the whole tour favoured us and let us play. King Edward's School turned out a mixed side of masters and boys and, batting first, made 103, thanks to a very fine innings by a boy, J. Souden, who, after being badly hurt by a ball thrown in from the boundary which hit him full pitch on the head, returned and made 26 not out—a very plucky effort. Insp. Andrews played for us again and scored 22. Play was interrupted by rain, and it looked as though the game would be washed out. As a result we had the startling spectacle of G. Scalbert scoring 52 in half an hour, before being out to a ball which bounced three times. We scored 155 for 7; and so back to Haslemere again.

On Sunday we visited Godalming. This time, E. R. Kent, our rival at Dunsfold, and N. B. Toll, who played against us at Witley, played for us, and C. Andrews against us. On a difficult wicket we were put out for 67, and it looked as though we were in for a repetition of the Ringwood match. But after tea our bowling and fielding were so hostile that we dismissed Godalming for 45, G. C. Mitchell taking 5 wickets for 16, N. B. Toll 4 for 16, and R. B. Minchin 2 for 12. This was the most exciting match of the tour.

Early the following day we drove down to Bournemouth to play the Sports Club. In this match, for the first time we played eleven Old Boys. For the Sports Club, G. G. L. Hebdon was very steady and batted well until bowled by L. J. Cole for 26. A. F. Murray-Johnson batted brilliantly, hitting very hard, and scored 34 before being splendidly caught and bowled by G. C. Mitchell. However, the rest failed, and they were all out for 87. F. T. Gauntlett took 5 for 22, G. C. Mitchell 3 for 36, and L. J. Cole 2 for 22. In reply we scored 141. G. C. Mitchell followed up his bowling by scoring 32, and

L. J. Cole scored 24. In this game your scribe pulled a muscle and did not play again for the rest of the tour, much to his disgust. We also lost our wicket-keeper, A. R. Cave, who had to leave for Oxford. Although his batting *might* have been better, yet he had kept wicket very well, and would have been badly missed had not R. E. Hunt proved a very efficient substitute.

Our next game, against Wimborne, was rather dreary as the rain came down in torrents and the ground was really unfit for play. In the short time available between heavy showers we scored 97 (G. Edwards 30, R. B. Minchin 24), and Wimborne 50 for 6.

Our next stay was at the Royal Beach at Southsea, from where we sailed the next morning for the Isle of Wight to play against Ventnor. This was a charming ground, in shape like a saucer with a steep slope all round, and here we batted on the first fast wicket of the tour. Again we had two past opponents in our side—W. Reynolds and L. Wignall from Witley. In this game Tory had another very entertaining knock and scored 76. He hit everything within reach. R. B. Minchin recovered his old form with a delightful 55, at which we were all very pleased, and so we declared at 244 for 7. Ventnor started well, B. White scoring 45 and Dyer 30, until both were clean bowled by H. G. Friend. Ventnor scored 120. The other wickets were shared by G. C. Mitchell, M. A. Tory and R. B. Minchin.

It was very good in this game to see Dr. Tovey again on a cricket field; although we could not persuade him to play, he umpired while Mrs. Tovey watched from the boundary. Both Dr. and Mrs. Tovey came down to Southsea and over to Ventnor specially for this match, and we were delighted to see them again.

It rained again in torrents the next day when we were due at Knowle, and no-one expected the ground to be fit for play. Perhaps this explains the disastrous licking we received, for Knowle scored 204 for 4, including the only century of the tour, and in reply we made only 97, of which C. S. Balhatchet scored 29. And so another tour came to an end.

The task of summing up the whole tour is rather difficult. Immense credit must go to "Mike" for his energy and initiative in getting up the tour in face of great difficulties, and for the excellence of the arrangements he made. Everything ran without a hitch, and the hotels chosen were excellent. Everyone had a thoroughly good time and all voted it a marvellous success and hoped for a repetition next year.

We must also thank Joan, now Mrs. Gauntlett, for gracing us with her presence and for scoring so efficiently. Mike is a lucky fellow, and we wish them both every happiness in their married life.

We met crowds of good fellows. What an enthusiast the umpire was whom we met at Dunsfold and took over to Godalming to umpire for us there. To our sorrow we do not know his name, but none of us will forget his accusing finger and bellow of "Out." Woe betide any poor bowler making a frivolous appeal! The scorn in his voice could be heard a mile away. May we meet again in happier days when the next tour is arranged, as it surely will be.

So far as cricket is concerned, it is really difficult to single anyone out for special praise. G. C. Mitchell always bowled excellently, and scored runs when necessary. So did Gauntlett, so did Cole. R. B. Minchin's knock at Ventnor, when he found his old form, rejoiced our hearts; and his bowling was very useful (did he not get out Insp. Andrews?) G. Scalbert was fairly consistent in batting; Gauntlett and Tory both had splendid knocks. Hunt's catches at Godalming and Bourne-mouth will not soon be forgotten. And what enthusiasm the Miles' family showed, turning up whenever they were needed. In all a very good tour.
