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EDITORIAL.

It is with the deepest regret that we record the death, in January last, of Col. Sir George Herbert of Knoyle House. Sir George represented the Wiltshire County Council on the Board of Governors and, although his many public duties prevented his attendance at all meetings, his support and interest were much valued.

His loss to the district and especially to East Knoyle is irreparable for he was loved by rich and poor alike and was the type of gentleman who, in spite of the magnitude of his public work, found time to listen to other people's problems and to give his help where and when possible.

To his mother, the Dowager Lady Pembroke, and to all members of his distinguished family we offer our deepest sympathy in the great loss they have sustained.

The School and the Town have also lost another friend by the passing away of Mr. Benjamin Strange at the age of 87. He was a Governor of the School until the time of his death but had retired from the Town Council on account of failing health. He was elected as a Councillor in 1904 and was Mayor in 1913.

Mr. Strange took a very great interest in the School and was a regular subscriber to the Magazine. His son, the Rev. Harold G. Strange, was at school here from 1893 to 1898.

To the Misses Strange we offer our deepest sympathy in their bereavement.

We also deeply regret to record the death of Dr. J. R. West, the County Education Officer for Dorset. He was a victim of the tragic accident near Warminster when the pilot of a Spitfire mistook his target.

His loss to education in general, and to Dorset schools in particular, is a very great one. He was always so courteous and helpful and possessed a charm of character which endeared him to members of the Education Committee, to head and assistant masters and to his own staff.

During the last war he was wounded twice and won the Military Cross. On its inception he joined the Home Guard and was a keen and prominent officer in the Dorchester contingent. It is indeed sad that such an accident should have robbed us of a gentleman whose efficiency and tact, combined with a keen sense of humour, brought to him the respect and friendship of all those with whom he had business or personal contacts.

His last visit to this school was in November 1941 when he distributed the prizes and spoke to the boys about their individual efforts to make a success of life and to be of service to the community. How well he practised what he preached; few have given greater service and few were more suited to the important position he held.

200 Years Ago.

In the *Western Gazette* dated June 5th is the following interesting notice, taken from the paper's files of 1742 :—

"The gentlemen educated at Shaston School, in order to renew old friendships, are desired to dine together at the George Inn, in Shaston, on Monday, 5th July next."

(*Editorial Note* : I have made enquiries about the original site of the George Inn and, according to information received from Mr. Tom Imber who is an authority on Old Shaston, it stood where Messrs. Hine & Parsons' outfitters' shop now stands. Any further information on this bit of the school's ancient history will be gladly received and acknowledged.)

With 210 boys in the school many of the forms are very full and the changing room accommodation taxed to its utmost. Of the 81 boarders 64 sleep in the School House, 5 in Mr. Veale's House, 6 in Mr. Russell Taylor's House in the High Street and 6 at Cann Lodge.

The cricket XI. has made a good start this term and there are signs that, given good weather, many runs will be made before the end of July. Unfortunately, owing to the petrol restrictions, few inter-school matches will be played, but, in spite of this, the fixture card is full.

The School Cadet Corps is flourishing and the marching has reached a standard which reflects the greatest credit on its officers and N.C.O.s. The results of the Certificate A. Examination, held last term, were also extremely gratifying.

The School had a very busy time during War Weapons Week and is to be congratulated on reaching its target of £1000. In addition to this amount it raised £75 by means of a concert, run by Mr. Scalbert, a boxing and wrestling contest, organised by the boys, and a bridge and whist drive, arranged by Mr. and Mrs. Minchin.

To all our friends and especially to those Old Boys serving their King and Country, on land, on the sea and in the air, the School sends its warmest greetings. Good luck to you all.

FOOTBALL.

The First XI proved one of the best for many seasons and except for one match, was superior to other school elevens met during the term. In the games against army sides, the weight and lengthy kicking of our opponents was the deciding factor against us, but the side, inspiringly led by A. J. Sharman, learned so well the lesson of their failures that the last army match gave us victory.

Any XI. is made or marred by its half-back line and we were fortunate in having three outstanding half-backs in T. M. Corson, A. J. Sharman and T. F. Brooks, and a capable reserve in I. Tait. All three had the great merit of being tireless in their efforts, but it was not only in this direction that their worth lay. They had individual values which in their variety made a complete and accomplished line both in attack and defence. Corson always remained within striking distance of his opponent, tackled soundly and, when beaten by a dribble or a pass, turned quickly and went after the man with the ball, never giving him comfortable time to get rid of it with profit. Sharman tended to play the third back game, tackled strongly and relieved pressure with long passes to either wing. He could kick half the length of the field with either foot and when opportunity offered came right up the field to support his forwards in attack and to take shots at goal. Brooks was good at the slide tackle and the speed with which he rose to his feet again to take the ball on was remarkable. His passing was good and he often changed the angle of attack by swinging the ball to the opposite wing. I. Tait was not so polished as the regular three halves, but he compensated by his readiness and success in making a tackle.

The half-backs were helped by the confidence they had in the men behind them. The backs E. A. Coles and I. E. M. Newton were only a little less complementary to each other than the halves in their department. Coles usually played well in front of his partner, went quickly into a tackle, and, when beaten, speedily recovered and set himself once more between his immediate opponent and the goal. His kicking lacked length, but in this he was covered by Newton who, although he appeared less agile, was always in the right spot at the right time. He did not rush into a tackle but manoeuvred his opponent towards the touch line, and timed his tackle for the moment when the winger or inside forward attempted to pass to the centre. Rarely did he fail, and when he gained possession of the ball, he was able to make many yards of ground and gain time to pass it to his forwards with a well-directed kick. Behind them they had G. R. Hiscock who had a safe pair of hands for high or low shots and often took the ball from the forwards' feet. Courage marked everything he did.

The forwards were a problem in the early part of the season. At first there seemed no possibility of forming a line that would have combination as well as shooting ability. However, a solution was found. A. F. A. Watts was promoted from the "Under 14" XI to play on the left wing, A. G. James was moved to the right wing from the inside position, and Roberts, who had always played as a back, proved a success at inside right. These, with D. F. Simpson at inside left and D. H. Hayter at centre, made a line that moved with some smoothness and penetration. Watts played with a will and was ever on the alert for a shot at goal; Simpson moved fast with the ball, shot with accuracy but was somewhat lax in dropping back in support of the defence; Hayter was the most skilful dribbler in the side and shot equally well with either foot; Roberts' great qualification was his neat and well-considered passing and his positioning for a shot at goal; James, a temperamental player, made many sturdy runs on the wing but missed chances of more by poor positional play.

The XI individually and as a whole were so competent that there was no hesitation in awarding them all their colours.

DETAILED RESULTS.

v. R.A.M.C. Military Hospital. Wed., Sept. 24th, home. Lost 0-4.

The R.A.M.C. proved masters of the game from the start. D. Jones, a former Welsh International, played at left half and dictated the run of the play. The School XI were too often caught on the wrong foot or running the wrong way. H. G. Pearson, in goal, made some grand saves.

v. Foster's School. Sat., 27th Sept., away. Won 2-1.

Having lost the toss, the School had to play against wind and slope. Our opponents' speed rather took us by surprise and soon they had scored. This put us on our mettle but we did not equalise until the second half and then added the second goal to win the match. Hayter scored this after a fine dribble in which he beat several opponents.

Brooks and Corson played well but there was too great a tendency among the forwards to dally with the ball in the penalty area.

v. Wimborne Grammar School. Sat., Oct. 4th, away. Lost 4-6.

Play started at a fast pace and within a few minutes J. Trevis had scored for the School. Wimborne soon replied with a good goal by their centre, and goals were then scored at regular intervals throughout. Hayter and James were our other scorers.

The backs were poor at covering each other and the inside forwards never dropped back to help the defence. Corson and Brooks played well.

v. 5th Surrey Regiment. Wed., Oct. 8th, home. Lost 0-3.

The game was very fast and the superior skill and speed of our opponents kept the ball in our half most of the time. Consequently our defence was over worked but they struck gallantly to their task. Hayter was unlucky with a shot that hit the cross-bar and Simpson kicked the rebound into the arms of the goal-keeper.

v. R.N.F. Sat. Oct. 11th, away. Lost 1-8.

The game was not so one-sided as the score suggests. Our opponents were slower but their greater weight gave them the advantage in tackling, and the small pitch nullified our superiority in speed.

The forwards failed to combine and the backs hesitated too long before tackling.

v. R.A.M.C. Military Hospital. Wed., Oct. 14th, Lost 1-5.

Soon after the start Simpson scored with a good shot into the left corner of the net. At half-time the score was one all. It was not until near the end of the game that the Hospital succeeded in penetrating our defence once more but as soon as they had done so they added another three goals very quickly.

The whole side combined much better than in any previous match. Coles and Newton positioned themselves well and the halves played strongly. Watts played an excellent game on the left wing.

v. 5th Surrey Regiment. Wed., Oct. 22nd, home. Lost 2-5.

The improvement which had been apparent in the previous match was maintained in this. The forwards combined well and made the ball do the work for them: Watts opened the scoring for us and Brooks kicked a fine goal, the ball entering the net high in the corner and well out of the goal-keeper's reach. Hiscock saved many times by diving at the forwards' feet.

v. Foster's School. Wed., Oct. 29th, away. Won 5-2.

There was a strong cross-wind throughout the game and thus the ball was difficult to control. Our forwards played well and kept the ball moving. When the final whistle blew D. G. Hayter had scored two, D. F. Simpson, A. G. James and J. A. Roberts, one each.

v. Wimborne Grammar School. Sat., Nov. 8th, home. Won 2-1.

D. H. Hayter drew first blood for the School after an excellent dribble down the centre. Not long afterwards A. F. Watts scored our second. Hiscock played well in goal and showed improvement in kicking a dead ball. Roberts and James combined well on the right wing.

v. Blandford Grammar School. Nov. 11th, home. Won 5-0.

We were much superior to Blandford in all departments and the ball was in their half most of the game. Hiscock had to handle the ball only three times. Newton scored a fine goal from the half-way line and Watts found the net three times; Simpson also scored.

Blandford's defence played pluckily but they were hopelessly outweighed.

v. Gillingham Grammar School. Sat., Nov. 15th, away. Won 3-1.

The passing of our forwards was excellent and if their shooting had been as good we should have won by a larger margin. Simpson played a fine game and Newton saved several dangerous situations. Goals were scored by Simpson, Roberts and Hayter.

v. Blandford Grammar School. Thurs., Nov. 20th, away. Won 5-0.

The first half was very even, play moving from goal to goal at a fast pace. Hayter scored just before half-time.

After the change of ends, we took control of the game and our forwards continuously attacked a staunch Blandford defence. Roberts scored a fine goal from a centre and Hayter sent in a shot that beat the goalkeeper all the way to find the corner of the net. Sharman scored from a free-kick and later added another with a long shot.

v. Gillingham Grammar School. Nov. 22, home. Won 3-1.

This was one of the best games of the season. Gillingham were superior during the first half and changed over leading by one goal to nil. Our forwards did not find their form until the second half when goals were scored by Hayter, Roberts and Sharman.

Brooks and Corson played well and the two wings James and Watts made better use of their half-backs when they found themselves unable to make ground.

v. R.A.S.C. Nov. 29th, home. Won 3-0.

During the first half the whole side played good football: the passing was well judged and accurate, but after the interval the game became ragged. Newton and Coles were sound in defence and Hiscock was at the top of his form. Hayter scored once and Roberts twice.

v. J. Phillips' XI. Sat., Dec. 6th, home. Lost 2-4.

Playing with the wind, we changed ends with the score one nil in our favour. Afterwards our opponents were able to score four goals because of poor marking by our side. They scored one goal straight from a kick-off without one of our men touching the ball. Roberts and Hayter were the scorers.

v. An Old Shastonian XI. Sat., Dec. 13th, home. Won 4-2.

During the game rain fell heavily and the ball was difficult to control. In the first half the Old Boys played strongly and we were hard put to gain a one goal lead. After the change-over the forwards swung the ball about and took the Old Boys by surprise. Hayter scored three goals and A. F. Watts one.

The Second XI played three matches : Home and away against Wimborne Grammar School 2nd XI, and home against Lord Weymouth's Grammar School, Warminster. The home match against Wimborne was won 4-2, and the away game lost by the same margin. Against Lord Weymouth's the score was 4-1 in our favour.

RUGBY.

It was unfortunate that the weather and other conditions prevented the 1st XV playing many matches, for it was one of the most competent sides we have ever had. Often before there has been a good pack of forwards and one or two good backs, but never before have we had all the backs rivalling the forwards for superiority. There was a whole-heartedness about those who aspired to the 1st XV that could well be imitated by others in the school.

A. J. Sharman brought to rugby the same joy in effort that he had shewn in cricket and soccer. He was determined to learn all he could about the game and to encourage others to do the same. In this respect he had the ready support of the majority who played in the matches.

The forwards who staked an unchallenged claim to a place in the side were : D. F. Simpson, M. J. Hillier, J. Trevis, H. R. Jowett, O. C. Normandale, A. G. James and I. E. M. Newton. Newton was perhaps the most accomplished forward, particularly in the open where he made many sturdy runs. He never neglected his threes for, whenever there was a good opportunity, he passed the ball back from the lineout. He marked and tackled well, too. Jowett and Normandale made a fine second row, pushing hard and doing their best to keep a tightly bound scrum. R. P. C. Slade, G. J. Marshall, D. C. Fear, and D. Pike, were adequate in their interpretation of forward play.

P. Hunter Watts was scrum half and A. F. A. Watts played outside him. There is not much of Hunter Watts but what there is is made of plucky and intelligent stuff. He never hesitated in mixing it with opponents twice his size, gave a good service from the base of the scrum and often tackled the opposing half in possession. His outside half ran strongly and straight, keeping a keen eye open for gaps in the opposite defence.

There was nobody to rival T. F. Brooks and I. Tait as centres. Brooks ran straight with knees well up and was a difficult man to tackle. Rarely did he fail to make less than twenty yards when we was given a clean pass. Tait was another strong runner but his chief merit was as a tackler. He was too prone to holding the ball tucked under his arm and this meant that he could never get it free to pass it to his wing when he himself was tackled.

T. V. Hill was the fastest and most proficient of the wings, but R. J. White and G. N. Chown showed promise.

The strong point of the side was at back where A. J. Sharman played. His positional play was excellent, his tackling powerful and shattering and his kicking to touch, with either foot, of the highest standard.

The first match was played against the Military Hospital on February 14th, at home. The day was perfect for rugby and the game was much more even than the score of 6-28 suggests. The School had the much lighter pack and therefore were beaten for possession in the scrums. In the open the forwards fairly held their own and were up with the ball all the time. The threes rarely had a chance to operate but, when they did, moved easily and well. Hill received the ball from a loose scrum and beat the opposition to score an unconverted try. Towards the end of the game Jowett kicked a good penalty goal.

Over a month passed before the 1st XV had another match. This was against Wimborne Grammar School, March 21st, at home. The School was much too good for the opposition in every department and we were easy winners by 31-5. Our success was due to the fact that we handled the ball extremely well. Whenever possible the forwards heeled the ball and P. H. Watts gave a good service to his fly half who set the threes going. They all played well, with Brooks putting up a particularly good performance.

The last match was against Clayesmore School on March 28th, away. This was lost by 31-3. Our defeat was due to Clayesmore's vastly superior knowledge of the game. They were quicker to seize opportunities and their three-quarter line was very fast. Only a few of our forwards kept up with the ball, the others seeming to have lost heart because they were being out-played. The binding in the scrum was bad and the tight Clayesmore pack usually pushed us off the ball.

An "Under 16" side played a Clayesmore "Under 16" at home and did very well in holding them to 6-3. In fact we were the better XV during the first half. The ball was given plenty of air and the threes made several sparkling runs. The halves, P. H. Watts and A. F. A. Watts, played a sound game, the former giving a good service from the base of the scrum and the latter making tricky runs straight through the centre. After the change-over we reverted to soccer tactics and they did not pay against a side which knew that wild kicking ahead does not give any advantage to the kicker but a free ball and a free run to the opposition. Hillier, Normandale and Jowett were the best of the forwards and R. J. White, who scored our try, the best of the threes.

SPORTS.

This year the Annual Athletic Sports were held in the Summer Term instead of as previously in the Easter Term and the better weather made a very considerable difference to the training, the entries and the results.

More competitors turned out for the two cross country races than ever before. The course was hard and dry. Judging by the state in which the competitors finished this year there must have been great economy in soap. I. Tait, E. J. King and T. F. Brooks were together for most of the distance and finished in that order. The Junior event was won by C. E. Gibbs with F. R. Imber second.

There was a great improvement in the mile race, though the pace of the first lap was too slow, with the result that the final time was not quite what it should have been. E. J. King led throughout with I. Tait, E. A. Coles and T. F. Brooks close behind. The final order was E. J. King, E. A. Coles, T. F. Brooks and I Tait who all completed the distance inside 5 min. 30 sec., the winner's time being 5 min. 14³/₈ sec. In the Open Half-Mile, G. J. Munkenbeck set off at a good pace but could not maintain the same speed and T. F. Brooks won in 2 min. 21¹/₈ sec., E. J. King being just behind.

The majority of the events took place on Wednesday, May 20th., with the heats on Saturday, May 16th. The entries for the Hurdles Races—Senior and Junior—were so numerous that it was necessary to have semi-finals. In the Junior event, K. E. Sims and D. A. Vaughan had a good race in the final, the former winning by 2/5th second while E. I. M. Newton won the open event rather more easily from J. A. Roberts.

The number of entries for the various jumps necessitated preliminary rounds. In the Senior Long Jump preliminary contest T. V. The best in the preliminary round certainly won the final, but with a loss of some inches, R. P. West winning by three inches from E. B. Sims.

The 220 Yds. Handicap under 14 provided a chance for some 56 runners to show their worth. F. T. Green, the youngest competitor, certainly had an appreciable start but he managed to hold it to the winning post, J. H. Watts making a splendid if unsuccessful effort to overtake him.

The Quarter-Mile generally provides a good finish to the events and this year the final of the Open Quarter-Mile was won by D. F. Simpson with T. V. Hill fighting hard to beat him.

In the Junior Championships, C. E. Gibbs obtained 28 points by winning the Cross Country, the Quarter-Mile, the High Jump and second in the 100 Yds. A. J. Adams and R. P. West each obtained 12 points, a first and a second in each case. The Senior Championship went to T. F. Brooks with 27 points, obtained by winning the Half-Mile, the High Jump, being second in the Cricket Ball Throw and third in the Cross Country, Mile and Hurdle Race. E. I. M. Newton obtaining 18 points, first in the Hurdles, second in the 100 Yards and High Jump and third in the Cricket Ball.

After the sports the prizes were distributed by the Mayoress supported by the Mayor. The Mayoress expressed her pleasure

at being present and gave encouraging advice to those who did not manage to win.

Burgess was a comic maid to perfection.

Tribute must be paid to those boys and members of the staff who worked so unsparingly to make the concerts the successes they undoubtedly were, and were well-repaid by the appreciation of the audiences, and by the knowledge that the Christmas Entertainment resulted in a profit of £30 which was divided between the Missions to Seamen and the Pavilion Fund.

It is with the greatest regret that we have to record the death, on February 9th last, of H. E. C. Brickell, the Headmaster of Wareham Senior School.

He was at school here from September, 1905 to July, 1909, and obtained 2nd Class Honours in the Cambridge Senior Local Examination held in July, 1908, also passing the London Matriculation Examination in the following January. During his last two terms at school he was Head Prefect.

Henry Brickell was a man of many interests and attainments. For several years his pen-sketches have appeared in the Dorset Year Book and he found time to interest himself in Morris Dancing and Dramatics.

At the time of his death he was the O.C. of the Wareham section of the A.T.C., having previously been a prominent Scoutmaster during his headmastership of St. George's School, Portland. He was in charge of the Dorset Scouts at the World Jamboree at Arrove Park, Birkenhead, in 1929, and at the World Rover Moot in Switzerland in 1931. Two years later he accompanied the late Lord Baden Powell on a Baltic cruise when visits were paid to Scandinavian countries. During the last war he served with the Dorsets in France.

His end was a very tragic one for he was cycling from Wareham to Shaftesbury to attend his sister's funeral when he collapsed and died from heart failure.

To Mrs. Brickell we offer our deepest sympathy in the great loss she has sustained.

We also send our sympathies to S. J. Lawrence who has recently lost his wife.

F. W. Clarke and R. H. Harding have recently had serious accidents. The former's car was completely wrecked in a collision, while the latter's injuries were caused by his being thrown from his horse. We are glad to know that they have both made good recoveries.

We deeply regret to record the death, after a very serious illness, of R. G. Vining. He was at School here from September, 1934 to July, 1940 when he left to join the staff of Messrs. Stratton, Sons and Mead in the High Street. He was never a very robust boy but his attendance was invariable good and we were particularly sorry to hear that he had succumbed to the operation which was deemed necessary to save his life. Our deepest sympathy goes to his mother in her trouble.

As we go to press we hear with regret that William George Milner, of Mere, one of the first Old Boys to join the O.S. Club, has died at the age of 50. He was at school here from 1905 to 1906 when his father, Colour-Sergeant R. G. Milner, lived at The Armoury in Bell Street. Colour-Sergeant Milner died several years ago, but many of the older Old Boys will remember being drilled by him on the school fields.

Now his son has joined him and our deepest sympathy goes to Mrs. Milner in her sad loss.

To Mrs. Friend and to Hugh and Jack we offer our deepest sympathy in the great loss they have sustained by the death of Mr. J. G. Friend on December 26th last. Mr. Friend had innumerable friends and his loss is severely felt by them all.

Largely through the untiring efforts of F. W. Strange (1893-98), who is deeply interested in the preservation of old buildings, Waynefflate's Tower at Esher, sometimes known as Wolsey's Tower, has been saved from destruction. F. W. Strange is a prominent member of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and of the Surrey Archaeological Society. He paid a welcome visit to the school early in June.

One of our oldest Old Boys visited the school on June 13th. He was W. Mothersdale (1880-1888) of Paignton whose father was a former manager of the National Bank in Shaftesbury. At the age of 70 he was on a cycling tour, having cycled from Paignton and intending to go on to Bath, Bristol and Weston-super-Mare.

L. H. R. Simmons, having recently taken unto himself a wife, is now living in Hampstead. Being an architect, much of his work during the past two years has been concerned with air-raid damage in London.

Mr. Minchin has received a most interesting letter from Max Gardner (1914-20) who has been in New Zealand for many years. He works from 5 a.m. to 8.30 p.m. on his own farm and puts in one day a week with the Home Guard. He has two children, a boy aged three and a little daughter of eight months.

We offer our deepest sympathy to the brothers Farris on the death of their father, Mr. W. A. Farris ; also to A. J. Steele on the death of his father.

We are so sorry to hear of the serious accident to Dick Light's wife. She was very severely burned when she upset a bowl of boiling water.

Geoffrey Pearson is living a busy life at Christ's College, Cambridge. When he wrote he was working for his Certificate B in the University O.T.C. in addition to putting in many hours with the Home Guard. We congratulate him heartily on being elected to the Presidency of the Marguerites Club for the year 1942-43.

O. S. WAR NOTES.

It is with deep regret that we have to report that R. C. Cross is missing and presumed lost.

He was at school here from September 1931 to July 1935, passing his Cambridge School Certificate Examination in the latter month.

He joined the Mercantile Marine before the war and was 3rd Engineer Officer on a ship which was torpedoed in the Atlantic early last year. Since then no news of him has been received and it is feared that he has joined the heroes who have given their lives in the defence of their country and of everything Englishmen hold dear.

Bob Cross was a most popular boy at school. He had a keen sense of humour and took the greatest interest in anything mathematical or mechanical. He loved the sea and, having lived near it in Bournemouth all his life, he was an expert swimmer.

To his parents and brothers we offer our deepest sympathy in their great anxiety and grief.

Peter Hoskins was also missing after the fall of Hong Kong but we are glad to know that he is safe, though a prisoner of war in Japanese hands.

We have also heard that R. E. Dalzell's ship was sunk south of Crete but we are hoping to hear that he was one of the many survivors.

Sea Cadet S. V. Selfe is also missing and feared lost. He was here for a short time in 1935 and went on to Taunton School where he spent a few terms before joining the Sea Cadets. Earlier in the war his ship was torpedoed but he was picked up, a piece of good fortune which, unfortunately, was not repeated.
