EDITORIAL

"Education does not mean teaching people only what they do not know. It means teaching them to behave. It does not mean teaching youth the shape of letters and the trick of numbers, and then leaving them to turn their arithmetic to roguery and their literature to lust. It means, on the contrary, training them into the perfect exercise and kingly continence of their bodies and souls. It is a painful, continual and difficult work to be done by kindness, by watching, by warning, by precept, and by praise, but above all—by example."

Though this passage was written almost a hundred years ago, most of us would agree in general with its content. Particularly would we agree with the importance of "example." Children copy parents; small boys copy big boys; most boys copy their masters; everyone is influenced by the example of someone, and a school society takes its cue largely from the staff, the prefects and tradition.

This tradition has, of course, been handed down to us by generations of Old Boys and is of the greatest importance. Where a school community is alive and progressive, all that is good in tradition is jealously preserved because it inspires, and it is carefully built up because each generation is responsible to the next for the maintenance of its standards.

And so, when we of the present generation read of the success of Old Boys and witness the symbols of their loyalty to the School—their gatherings in London, in Brook in the summer, in Shaftesbury, and—more important still—at the School itself, we are ourselves inspired, and we begin to realise too that when our turn comes to leave school we carry away with us that same opportunity and that same traditional responsibility—to inspire by example.

Our congratulations—belated but sincere—to Mr. and Mrs. Hopton on the birth of their son Nicholas, and to Mr. and Mrs. Cameron on the birth of their daughter, Sheila.

We extend a warm welcome to Mr. Peter Davy who comes to us from the Carnegie College to take Mr. Brooke's place, and to Mr. John Cole from the University of Wales, who comes as a temporary but very valuable addition to our staff—no "carrying Coles to Shaftesbury here!"

On our return in September, we were delighted to find that almost the whole of the School side had been decorated, that the cricket pavilion had been completely renovated and that the school corridors had been cleared and lightened. 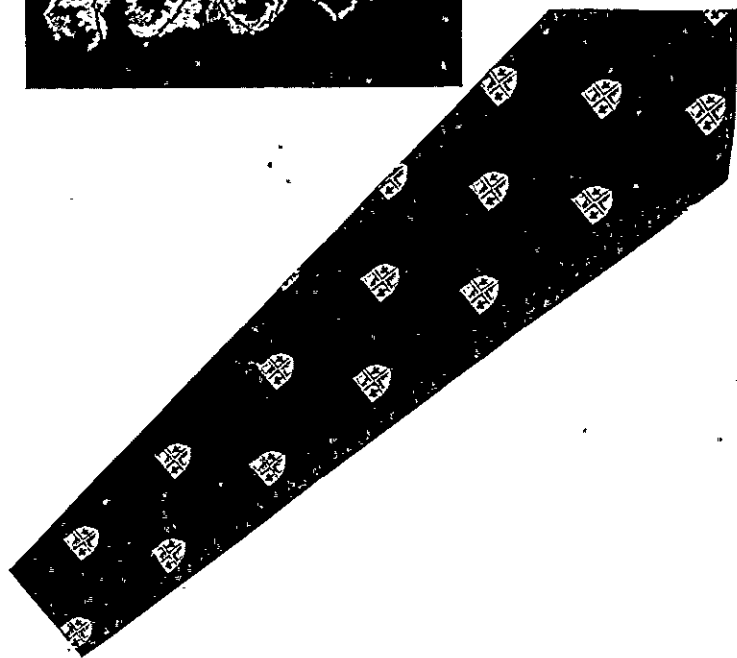
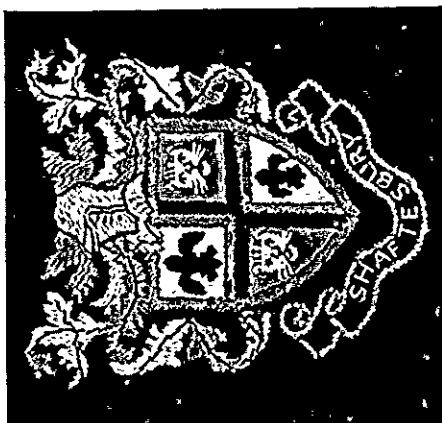

CADET CORPS

The most important item to report since the last notes were written is the fact that we have a second officer in the Corps. Mr. Johnstone has taken over the control of the shooting; but it was in camp that we felt the greatest benefit from his presence. Conferences were kept to a minimum, but even so there were times when one officer was called off for some special duty and then the other was on hand for internal administration.

Camp this year at Windmill Hill was a great success, mainly due to the work put in by the sponsor unit, the 1st Beds. and Herts.; our grateful thanks to them for their efforts on our behalf. The food was excellent; the training areas were rather a long way off but good when one arrived, and the facilities for both bore shooting were particularly good. The weather was quite ideal—only one thing of which we had too much—dust!

A number of cadets, who wanted to get their Cert. A early, went to camp to get the necessary extra training and, as a result, when a special exam. was held on 24th October, the examiner reported that "Candidates' knowledge was above average owing to the fact that all candidates had attended camp."

On November 6th, the Corps was invited to take part in the British Legion Parade; the Corps buglers sounded Last Post and Reveille and Lt. Johnstone placed a wreath on behalf of the Shaftesbury C.C.F. Our buglers also sounded at Cann in the morning and at Motcombe in the evening.

The new store is at last finished so that all training aids are now stored in one place instead of having some in one place and some in another; it should make training much easier and more efficient.

One innovation in 1955 was a Life Saving Class. Nine boys entered for the Bronze Medallion of the Royal Life Saving Society and eight were successful; N. R. M. Dorning, B. J. W. Pingree, B. D. Cole, R. A. G. Strickett, T. C. H. R. Otton, C. W. Wyndham, A. J. Cornwell and G. Davis.

In the Swimming Sports, held in July, Trojans won the Relay race and the Diving and so became the first holders of the new Hallett Cup for House Swimming.

SPEECH DAY

Though Speech Day was held this year on Thursday, September 22nd, it is proposed to combine it with Old Boys Day next year, on Saturday, July 21st. For many Old Boys who would like to attend both functions it is impossible to get away on more than one occasion and we hope that the new arrangement may prove to be a happy solution.

This year the Chairman of Governors, The Rt. Rev. Maurice Key, the Bishop of Sherborne, presided, and Mrs. Key kindly presented the prizes.

In his report, the Headmaster declared that the policy of the School was not only to produce scholars but to produce Christian leaders—the world's greatest need today. He said "Any university, or any body dealing with young men in whose hands the future of our country rests will tell you the nation wants leaders as it has never wanted them before. 'There is plenty of scholarship,' they say, 'but precious little leadership.'"

Mr. Brett said that in the mad rush to produce a confusing collection of different kinds of schools, people tended to forget the difference between knowledge and wisdom, and to push scholarship at the expense of wisdom which was the hall mark of a leader.

It was the duty of schools—especially one such as ours—to do all they could to bring out and to develop those qualities which go to make leaders—self control, sense of high purpose and unselfish duty, a

broad outlook and a sense of responsibility. He besought parents not to regard education as something exclusive to the form room, but to encourage their sons to join in every school activity which distance and other difficulties permitted, for it was in living in a community such as ours that the seeds of wisdom were sown and could most readily grow.

Referring to academic achievement, the Headmaster said 46 boys had taken 243 subjects in the G.C.E. and the number who passed in two or three at scholarship or advanced level, and five, six or seven subjects at ordinary level, was really very good. Only one boy had been awarded a County Major Scholarship and he was going to study medicine at London University, but three others had done extremely well at the Advanced Level and two of them were also going on to Universities. Mr. Brett said: "Neither has been awarded a county major scholarship despite the fact that one of them, after getting eight 'O' level subjects, got three 'A' level subjects this year, and is thoroughly suited in every way for university life. These boys do not come from Dorset or Wiltshire, but I am profoundly relieved we have no more boys from their particular county, because present sixth formers might be saying, 'It's quite useless trying to get to a university because my parents can't afford it, and even if I get three 'A' level subjects and have a place ready, I should still not get a county major scholarship.'"

Mr. Brett understood that the introduction of those scholarships was specifically aimed at preventing that state of affairs, and he said that the lack of a common policy in the different counties was deplorable.

The school had had a most successful year on the sports field, and the various societies were continuing to do good work.

As a "Voluntary Aided" school we had to initiate planning and building at the school by contributing at least one quarter of the total cost ourselves. It was far from easy, but we liked it that way because we felt the danger, inherent in a welfare state, of "easy come, easy go." "We take a pride in the fact that we have raised over £600 this year entirely by our own efforts," he said. By next speech day it was hoped to have two new classrooms, new changing rooms, and extra washing accommodation in the boarding house, and also the centralisation of the boarding house in Cann Rectory. Mr. Brett closed by thanking the staff and the Governors for their great assistance throughout the year.

Mrs. Key, the Bishop's wife, who presented the prizes, said parents could best help their children by having real peace, confidence and serenity in the home. "We must also believe in the school we send our children to, so that the children know we have confidence in it and then they will too," she said.

Mr. W. Farley Rutter proposed a vote of thanks to Mrs. Key.

RUGBY FOOTBALL, 1955

1955, a year full of promise and progress, brought with it an important change of policy in school games. Rugby Football was for many years played on pasture land by senior boys only. It is now well established in the School, and, as a result of a decision by the Games Committee, it is now played in the Christmas Term when snow, frost and generally unpleasant conditions are unlikely. Rugby posts adorn

the School playing field, and through the untiring efforts of the Headmaster, the field known as "Wincombe" is leased to the School. Thanks to Mr. Hopton, who persuaded his father to send a gift of scaffold poles from Bristol, to Morris (V.A.) who personally felled and trimmed four trees in the Ashmore woods and to Mr. Bayliss who, in his Morris 10 transported the Ashmore trees, the school now possesses five sets of posts and five pitches. Five Clubs are therefore able to play simultaneously, and with the great enthusiasm of the Staff—one or two masters are being responsible for each Club which has its own pitch—every boy who is fit has excellent facilities for learning the game.

Much of this is due to Watkins, the captain, to the interest and enthusiasm of the Headmaster and Staff, and to the new-found facilities which the School possesses. These latter include the highly original 'Shaston tackling apparatus.' Much, too, has been learned from visits by parties of fifty boys to the Somerset v Cornwall game at Bridgwater, to the outstanding match at Bournemouth, Hampshire v Middlesex, and also from the Oxford v Cambridge match which was seen on T.V. by the 1st XV and a few others who could squeeze themselves into the Headmaster's lounge. Moreover, the prospective team had a good send-off early in the season when some nine masters of varying age and ability, aided by six boys, nobly took the field, to win a great game by a narrow margin. Three of the staff had black eyes, one, damaged ribs and another, a knee injury, but it had all been well worth while.

On paper the results do not look impressive, but, except for the match at home against the very strong R.A.F. side from Hullavington, and the game against the club side at Wimborne, with a little luck most of the games could have been won. The successes against Poole Grammar School and Hardye's were well-deserved, but the most noteworthy game was against Bishop Wordsworth, in which much that is best in Rugby Football was on view. Against a strong Old Boys side the XV did well. The most interesting and enjoyable match was the return against the R.A.F. station, Hullavington, who put into the field their 1st XV outsiders and 2nd XV pack. This latter included an old Llanelly forward weighing 18 stone 10. Brought down by a magnificent tackle to save a certain try, he was the first to come up at half-time to congratulate Jeremy Smith. Tackles such as this, sound captaincy and elusive running by Watkins, the fighting spirit of R. A. Jones, good kicking by Cox, sound hardwork in the pack by Walmsley, good scrummaging and backing-up by Deacon Smith and P. Burden, and real zest for Rugby Football as shown by Crocker have all been most encouraging features of the game.

The Colts played seven and won only the match against Poole, but under Mr. Payne's guidance they have made a good start. They have been almost invariably out-weighted, and in the games against Bishop Wordsworth's and Wimborne two or three very powerful runners in the opposition found it easy to bullock their way through smaller boys. Yet, there is real hope, for the Colts have proved and will prove in the future a useful nursery for the 1st XV. Indeed, M. Johnson has

played for the 1st XV this season when not required for the Colts, and boys like Jordan, Wyndham, Noyes and Middlemas have plenty of ability and enthusiasm.

It is a pity that more boys have not the time or the inclination to join us, for chess is certainly one of the most interesting and valuable of all games. If only they would take the plunge they would soon learn sufficient to make them enthusiasts too.

The Club will hold its meetings throughout the Lent Term and we hope that our membership will soon increase. All new members will be very welcome.

THE DEBATING SOCIETY

In the last magazine, we could report only one debate held by the revived Debating Society. This year we have held eight and the Society has not only increased in membership but also in the strength and liveliness of the debates.

Twenty-five boys have spoken as principal speakers and more boys have been making maiden speeches from the floor of the House.

B. G. Johnson, our first chairman, and his committee, A. J. Newman (vice-chairman), J. B. M. Evans (Secretary) and R. A. Jones (Treasurer), worked well together to lay the foundations of a successful society.

At the annual general meeting J. B. M. Evans was elected chairman, G. D. Johnson vice-chairman, R. A. Jones secretary and A. J. Lawrence treasurer. These members have been consolidating the initial good work.

The subjects debated have been whether or not town life is preferable to country life (defeated); capital punishment should be abolished (defeated); routine is the graveyard of the soul (defeated); automation will bring more harm than good to Great Britain (defeated); the Press is abusing its freedom and steps should be taken to protect the individual against this abuse (carried); men's costume is in need of radical reform (carried); Rugby football is a better game than Association (carried).

The most important debate was the one with the Girls' High School on the motion that "The uncertainty of the first Elizabethan Age would be preferable to the security of the Welfare State." Adrienne Lawrence and Ruth Jones spoke against the motion; G. D. Johnson and A. J. Lawrence in favour. The result was Ayes 7, Nays 59, Abstentions 17; an overwhelming victory to the High School; but we shall meet again.

ENGINEERING AND SCIENTIFIC SOCIETY

This society consists, for the most part, of day boys, the actual figures being 23 day boys and 6 boarders, and the secretary is again E. R. Cox. Activities include 5-minute lectures on unprepared subjects, which are very popular except with the lecturers, and a programme of films has been arranged for the coming year. At the School Fete, in June, a model railway system set up in the Woodwork room, attracted many spectators and much admiration.

DRAMATIC SOCIETY

On Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuesday evening, December 16th, 17th, 19th, and 20th, Shaftesbury Grammar School presented its Christmas Play "The Happiest Days of Your Life." The Memorial Hall was packed to capacity with highly appreciative audiences on each evening.

The author, John Dighton has written a lively, fast moving farce around the basic idea that a girls' school, St. Swithin's, is mistakenly evacuated to a boys' school, Hilary Hall. Not only do farcical situations arise in profusion from the clash between the Heads and Staffs and pupils of the two Schools concerned, but also there is a great deal of subtle and witty dialogue to reinforce the broader comedy.

Mr. Norman Wescott, the Producer, is to be congratulated. His production showed two great qualities—a fast pace and excellent timing. He got the very best performances out of his actors.

Mr. B. Bayliss was excellent as Rupert Billings, the crusty old bachelor with the biting sarcasmic tongue (especially on the subject of girls.)

Sharing the honours equally with him were William Kaul, who was an outstandingly prim dragon of a Head-mistress, and John Evans as the outrageously funny character of Miss Gossage, the games mistress of St. Swithins.

The part of Dick Tassell was not so comic a role but David Johnson played the part well and got what laughs there were, while Paul Hastrop was a very convincing old curmudgeon as the School porter and groundsman, Rainbow.

The pompous and majestic Headmaster, Godfrey Pond, was played to the life by R. A. Jones. Colin Wyndham as the self made Northern businessman, Mr. Sowter, a parent of the one of boys, was vigorous and he sustained his accent well.

All the smaller parts were well characterised; Peter Burden as the parsonical Reverend Edward Peck; Colin Coward as Mrs. Peck; John Middlemas as Mrs. Sowter who ever managed only to say one word at a time; John Mayo as the attractive Joyce Harper; Wilson Porritt as the freckle-faced, long plaited school girl Barbara Cahoun; and Maurice Lillie as Hopcroft, the demon boy in the Lower Third.

The Stage Manager, Mr. Scalbert and his assistant James Brock, assisted by C. J. Allen; R. J. Dunley, N. E. Foot, M. A. C. Galindo, D. I. M. Simpson and E. R. Walmsley designed and erected an admirable set.

Lighting was by C. Green, B. Pingree and D. S. Halpin; Wardrobe by Mrs. Brett and Miss Stow; make-up by a team of members of the School Dramatic Society; interval music by C. J. Wells, A. J. S. Pratt and R. H. Orman. The call boy was L. J. Wyatt, the prompter D. J. Green, and behind the whole venture was the business manager, Mr. B. S. Bates.

Mr. J. Norman Wescott, the players and all who contributed in so many ways to the production are to be congratulated on a successful show and an evening's fine entertainment.

Other Activities

Apart from the annual production, the Dramatic Society has been busy in different groups. One group has been busy practising make-up once or twice a week, the stage gang building scenery, the electricians making spots and doing all kinds of jobs round the school such as mending fuses, rigging loud-speakers for Sports' Day and wiring the Fives Courts for electricity.

Last Spring Term we started production of a one act farce by Ian Hay, but in the end this had to be abandoned as there were too many things happening; so for the second year in succession, it was found impossible to put it on. This term a visit was arranged to see the Manchester Marionettes and this was greatly enjoyed.

The only other event of note took place on May 10th, when we were invited by the High School to visit them and hold a joint meeting with their Dramatic Society. After a lavish spread of tea and cakes we read Bernard Shaw's "You Never Can Tell" and the evening was both instructive and enjoyable.

FILMS

In the first and third terms of this year there have been regular film shows on every alternate Saturday, thanks to the efforts of C. Green, A. Newman and D. S. Halpin. These have included "Passport to Pimlico," "The Way Ahead," "It's Not Cricket," "Here Come the Huggets," "The Ghost Train" and a large number of instructive and enjoyable short films.

YOUNG FARMERS' CLUB

Scarcely a week passes without a meeting of the School Young Farmers' Club. As popular as ever and led by an enthusiastic Committee consisting of J. B. M. Evans—Club Leader, D. A. Caines—Secretary and R. J. R. Taylerson—Treasurer, it has increased its

membership noticeably this term. Mr. J. A. Brett again kindly consented to become President, and Mr. M. J. Cole is Club Chairman.

The programme, while retaining always a farming bias, is still quite varied: talks by experts on Pig Husbandry, Poultry-Keeping, and Dairy Farming; films and propaganda from Fordsons and Fergusons—they did not make a sale hard as they tried—and from Esso too, though they were more subtle in introducing Motor-racing; and finally, visits to places of interest; the Cow and Gate factory at Wincanton, the Dorset Farm Institute at Kingston Maurwood—to be revisited this year if the efforts of our hard-working Secretary are rewarded. We also hope to visit the National Stud at Gillingham in the near future.

THE JUNIOR LITERARY AND DRAMATIC SOCIETY

This Society has met weekly on Thursday evenings with an occasional change to Wednesday. At every meeting over twenty boys of the Junior School have shown enthusiasm for the varied activities of the Society, whose chief aim is to promote interest in anything connected with acting or good literature. T. Dacombe has been a most efficient Secretary, and his reading of the minutes of the previous meeting is always well received. Next term's activities will include a play reading, an illustrated talk on the Roman Wall by the Chairman of the Society and regular items such as lecturettes, charades and debates

PRESS AND PRINTING CLUB

The Press Club has maintained its efforts in publishing a weekly news sheet. Much of the credit for this goes to A. J. Newman and R. J. Taylerson for their Editorials, J. B. Evans for his Profiles, B. G. Johnson for his World Affairs, A. J. Miller for his music criticisms, D. Roberts, F. Roberts and R. J. A'Barrow for their games reports and special praise to E. N. Farris and W. Jordan for the keenness and skill with which they undertook the tedious task of copy work. Other frequent contributors were B. D. Cole, G. D. Johnson, R. H. Orman and D. A. Caines, who covered the society activities.

Many of the younger boys have been keen to test their skill as printers and Mr. Bayliss has been their instructor. They have all done good work in printing school report cards, and tickets for shows and O.B. dinners.

THE RUG CLUB

Now in its second season, the Rug Club has met regularly this term, attracting a small group of boys drawn together chiefly perhaps by the arm-chairs, fire-side, and general home comforts of Mr. Bates' study, but none the less extremely keen to learn and practice the art

of making rugs. Langley has completed a small, but beautiful rug, with ivy leaves as the central theme. Dacombe, Giles and Tucker work enthusiastically at rugs of various colours and designs, while Middlemas and members of Form 1A cut wool, learn to use the needle or give advice. STAMP CLUB

The School Stamp Club this year was under the Chairmanship of R. J. Dunley with M. J. Lillie as Secretary and L. J. Wyatt as Treasurer. Thirty boys applied for membership, being equally divided between day-boys and boarders. It was proposed that the Club should meet every other Wednesday and that the time should be used for lectures by the senior members of the club and for the exchange of stamps. Three senior boys were given permission to attend the Town Philatelic Society meetings at the Modern School and they proved instructive and most interesting. Until a 3-speed player is available we are using a very good 78 r.p.m. machine with amplifier and loud speaker; this we are very pleased to have, for it is powerful enough to fill the whole hall with sound. With limited funds our record library grows only slowly but several second-hand records have been bought in London and various friends have lent others.

CAROL SERVICE

This year's Carol Service, which took place in Holy Trinity Church, maintained its usual high standard of devotional worship and choir singing.

Following the pattern of previous years the lessons were read in order of seniority starting with a Junior member of each school and ending with the Acting Headmistress and the Headmaster. Miss Dunford, the Headmistress and the Revd. G. K. Horlock Jones, the Rector, were much missed through illness.

The Processional Choir moved with dignity up to join the main choir singing "Once in Royal David's City," first as a solo, then full choir, adding in the third verse the girls' voices, followed by the boys', until the whole congregation was singing. The standard of the choir was very high and showed that they were quite happy singing four part unaccompanied carols in a way that brought home the Christmas message to listeners in a most musical and sensitive manner.

The congregation took a fuller part this year and particularly made themselves felt in "Good King Wenceslas," with a descant by the entire Girls' School. The Revd. C. D. Black Hawkins officiated.
