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EDITORIAL

Once every ten years or so a school has to face the challenge of an Inspection, and has to justify its purpose, aims and results. This can be a most salutary experience, for in a school, where a regular routine of life is so necessary, it is dangerously easy to become the victim of routine, and to assume, in the absence of severe dislocations to its generally settled existence, that all is well.

If we judge our School by the materialistic considerations of accommodation, all is not well. Our buildings do not fully meet the needs of a grammar school at this time. All who have the welfare of the School at heart will therefore rejoice to hear that the Governors have approved plans for much new building during the next few years; and that the heavy task of finding our share of the cost, voluntarily undertaken when we obtained our Aided Status, has been lightened by the passing of the Government Bill increasing from 50% to 75% the Ministry's contribution to the cost of new building and improvements. Even so, appeals will have to be made to the generosity of Parents, Old Boys and other friends of the School, and we are confident that such appeals will not be made in vain.

If we judge it next by the results obtained in Examinations, by the occupations to which our boys go on leaving school, by the results of our matches against other schools and the Athletic successes of individual boys we have good reason for quiet and grateful satisfaction, though certainly not for complacency.

If we judge it again by the contribution it makes to helping a boy to enjoy in a sensible way the increased leisure and higher standard of living offered by modern conditions, the long list of clubs, societies and activities reported in this magazine indicate that at least the school is doing much to meet this urgent need.

All the above considerations, however, merely indicate how the School is trying to offer the chance of a fuller and happier life for the individual. It must also show the individual that he has a debt to repay to society and a duty to help his fellow men, the majority of whom will not have had his advantages. This sense of responsibility is needed even more urgently in these days of worsening moral standards, when the main purpose of life can be summed up in the title of a current film, "I'm All Right, Jack." It should be the aim of a school to build up a tradition of service, based on the Second Great Commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." A welcome proof that here too we are succeeding has been provided by the oldest and youngest boys in the School. The Sixth Form attended the public enquiry into the proposal to establish an Open Borstal Institution at Guy's Marsh. While recognising the natural difficulties and inconveniences arising from the existence of such an establishment, and respecting the opinions of those whose objections indicated reasoned thought on the problem, they were unanimous in despising the objection summed up in the view, "I see the need for such institutions, and support them when they are not too close to my back door." The First Forms by hard work, self-denial and enterprise, collected a magnificent sum as a contribution to the National Children's Home. Small indications these may be, but if all men acted and thought in this way, what a vindication of the Christian life as taught in the schools it would be.

In December last the School heard with mingled sorrow and pleasure that the Chairman of the Board of Governors, the Right Rev. Maurice Key, Bishop of Sherborne, had been appointed Bishop of Truro. We feel that our great loss will be Cornwall's gain. During the period of his Chairmanship the Bishop had the interests and the welfare of this School at heart, and despite the many commitments of his busy life he would always find time to consider School problems, and give the Headmaster most

helpful advice. We shall miss his personality and counsel; we congratulate him on his appointment and wish him and Mrs. Key all health and happiness in the great work that lies before them.

SPEECH DAY

Speech Day was held on Saturday, September 26th, in the Memorial Hall. The Chairman of the Governors, the Rt. Rev. Maurice Key, Bishop of Sherborne, presided, and introduced Sir Hawthorne Lewis, K.C.S.I., K.C.I.E., another School Governor, who had kindly consented to present the prizes. Sir Hawthorne, he said, who came from a family noted for its interest in all branches of education, had a long and distinguished record of service to The Crown, culminating in his appointment as Governor of Bengal.

In his report, the Headmaster said that the transference of Speech Day to the Autumn Term made it necessary to consider the academic results as shown by the 1958 and 1959 General Certificate Examinations. These were good. One Open Scholarship in History at Christ Church, Oxford, one Trevelyan Scholarship to Oxford and a State Scholarship had been obtained by W. J. O. Jordan, a most distinguished performance. Nine County Major awards had been obtained from six counties. Twelve boys had gone to University. A noteworthy feature was the high proportion of boys studying Medicine at London University, but the Arts were not neglected, and among Art students, one was reading Music at Durham and two were studying Art at London. Other Sixth Formers had obtained student apprenticeships in Industry, and the Atomic Energy Authority. The 'O' Level results had been generally satisfactory with outstanding results in History, English Literature and Mathematics. He was glad to say that all boys leaving school at the end of the Fifth Form course had been able to find useful employment or further training schemes. The standard of games was again high, with boys representing their County sides at Rugby, Association Football and Cricket; the School had won the Intermediate and Senior Championships at the North Dorset Sports, and had six County champions. Two more tennis courts were taken into use. The range of out-of-school activities was widening, a greater variety of visits had been undertaken, and there was a much greater interest in music. It was now possible to begin the teaching of brass instruments.

The amalgamation of Gillingham Grammar School and Gillingham Modern School had made very difficult the continuation of the County scheme under which our Sixth Form Chemists were taught there, and a master appointed to the staff of both schools taught our fifth and fourth forms in our own laboratory. The School owed a real debt of gratitude to Gillingham for all their instruction in the past, and for the very real sacrifice they had made to enable our Sixth Forms to receive instruction for the current year. It was essential, however, that adequate accommodation be provided for Sixth Form Chemistry teaching, and architects' plans had been submitted to the Ministry for approval. If permission were granted, then the two Shaftesbury schools would be self sufficient, each teaching up to University Scholarship level those subjects for which they were equipped and staffed, and offering to the other, facilities which it lacked. The High School would teach our Sixth Forms Biology and Zoology, and we should teach their girls Physics and Chemistry. Mr. Crowther expressed his gratitude to the High School for their successful teaching in the past year.

In conclusion, the Headmaster thanked all the Staff for their loyal service during the past year, and spoke of his confidence in the future of the School.

Sir Hawthorne, in an address marked by wit and scholarship, congratulated the School on its academic and athletic successes of the past year. His speech contained a number of Latin quotations, alternately in the "old" and "new" pronunciation. While the School was gratified at Sir Hawthorne's optimistic assumption that these would be understood, there was some noticeable relief throughout the Hall when he gave a very free English rendering! Sir Hawthorne went on to speak with appreciation of the great interest taken by the Governors in maintaining the independent tradition of the School as an ancient Church foundation, adjusted to the needs and requirements of a national system of education in which the School was now called on to play so important and responsible a part.

After a vote of thanks proposed by the Ven. E. L. Seager, Archdeacon of Dorset, parents and Governors were entertained to tea.

CADET CORPS

Mr. G. G. Johnstone left us at the end of the Easter Term, 1959, and we thank him for the work that he put in for the Corps, especially for his work in the miniature range, and at Camp. Although Mr. G. J. Hough has been helping in the Corps for a considerable time it is only now—February, 1960—that the W.O. has decided that his military commitments will not debar him obtaining a commission in the C.C.F. In September, Lt. M. J. Webber, R. Signals, A.E.R., joined the staff and his C.O. has kindly consented to his serving with the C.C.F. So, for the first time in its history, the Corps has three serving officers.

The Annual Inspection took place on June 15th, the Inspecting Officer being Brig. M. J. A. Patterson, D.S.O., commanding 128 Inf. Bde. T.A., Major D. F. Ellison, R.V.R., his Staff officer. A very creditable report was received.

Unfortunately the first arrangement of an attachment at Topsham Barracks, Exeter, fell through and only at the last moment were we offered as an alternative an attachment at Blandford Forum. For one thing we were not given enough notice and for another thing, the place was too close, and consequently there was no camp in 1959. This year we are to go to Westdown Camp, on the Plain, under canvas from July 27th to August 2nd.

On June 11th, 65 Cadets went to Earls Court to the Royal Tournament and saw a really memorable display of drill, trick motor-cycling, parachute training and, of course, the famous musical drive. On the 6th October, a party of three Officers and 53 Cadets went to a demonstration at the Joint Services Amphibious Warfare Centre at Hamworthy. We were given a demonstration of canoe work and swimming, shown films, and then after dinner—the highlight—trips in various types of craft, some comfortable, others not so comfortable, some dry, others not so dry; but a most interesting day.

Two days were spent on the range at Mere; on 20th March only 21 fired, but on the 19th October, 42 firers took part and the standard of shooting was much better; even so, the red and white flag was in evidence on one or two targets. Considering the small amount of practice that is possible, we must give a word of praise to the band of markers. They were exceedingly good and attentive.

The shooting of N. P. Langley, A. H. Woodward, C. G. Pratt, B. J. Humphreys, M. A. L. Beekingham and G. Trickett was particularly good.

On Sunday, November 8th, the Corps were again invited to take part in the Armistice parade and about 60 turned out. C.S.M. Humphreys, B. J., L/Cpls. Main, D. J., and Bowness, P. R. T., sounding Last Post and Reveille, and buglers were also sent to assist at the services at Cann and Motcombe.

CRICKET

1st XI

This year's team was potentially the strongest for many years with the whole of last season's attack and the three leading batsmen still in the side. It also enjoyed an excellent summer in which only one match was interfered with by rain, that against Yeovil. It gained a high percentage of victories—8 in all—but suffered disappointing defeats in the matches against Clayesmore and the Old Boys. The record also includes one match with Wimborne which was tied in a most exciting finish. As a whole,

the season was a very satisfactory one though many who hoped this year's team would prove quite invincible were disappointed.

That the 1st XI amassed several very large totals was largely due to the batting of the captain, D. I. M. Simpson, and the left-handed Gulliver. Both scored over 300 runs and had individual scores in the 90's. Batting at number three, Simpson often transformed the game with his powerful strokeplay, while Gulliver's stylish batting proved an invaluable foil. The openers, however, seldom provided solid starts to the innings. Jordan was an unaccountable failure in his fourth season as opening batsman. Cranmer was steadier, and often made useful contributions. The middle batsmen were not always called upon but each had at least one success. J. M. Middlemas made 22 against the Agrarians, Wilcox 35 against Worthing, R. G. Middlemas 26 against Gillingham and P. J. Humphries 23 not out in the same match. The wicketkeeper, G. Trickett, turned himself into a very useful batsman and played several outstanding innings including a hard-hit 59 against the Agrarians. Finally a word must be said about the batting of R. A. Pike who is better known as a bowler. He arrived at the wicket in the match against Wimborne when ten runs were needed for victory with two wickets in hand. Runs had been scarce that day (Wimborne were all out for 51) but Pike struck out bravely and was eventually last man out, caught off a skier with the scores level. Against Blandford he faced a similar situation, but in fading light he dispatched his second ball to the square leg boundary to win the match.

The bowling was always extremely strong this year. Only twice was it collared—at Hardye's when our opponents made 120—2 dec. in the first match of the season, and at Clayesmore, where without Wilcox, the attack was hammered unmercifully by a side seeking revenge for a last-over defeat at Shaftesbury. But as a rule, the bowlers were on top. The hard wickets suited Wilcox especially, and he had a much better season, taking 46 wickets and returning his best-ever figures of 8—13 at Gillingham. Pike and Jordan took turns at opening from the other end. Pike's best performance was at Clayesmore when he took 6—18 and Jordan took 8—21 against Wimborne. Gulliver completed the strong attack though he did not enjoy quite the same success as in the previous season.

The fielding was of a high standard, Middlemas, J. M., and Parsons excelling in the deep, and Gulliver in the slips.

There were too many passengers in the scrum and it was too much to expect Noyes, in the absence of R. Middlemas, to captain the side, lead the scrum and produce the sparkling play of the previous year. The team suffered two heavy blows, for J. M. Middlemas came back to school eager to give the side the benefit of all he had learned on his Rugby Union course, but he departed for London University without playing a match, and his brother, R. G., incurred a very serious injury after only four games and was 'out' for the rest of the term. With these two wing forwards playing regularly the 1959 team would have been a team indeed. Nevertheless the XV did splendidly, the outstanding feature being the success of the half-backs, Leibe and Trickett with the powerful centres, Steele and Stilwell, admirably supported by the strong-running Hitchings and Parsons on the wings.

Leibe though still under fifteen played splendidly in all twelve matches. Griffin proved unexpectedly to have most of the qualities of a good full-back until he was injured. Hargreaves proved a very good substitute for him in the later games.

The forwards were disappointing, for though all tried hard, the old hands apart from Wilcox, were not a 'patch' on their previous selves, and the 'new intake' proved to be too young, inexperienced and at times, (dare it be said?) lethargic.

There was inevitably much experimental work in building up the team and twenty-two boys played for the 1st XV, but it was all well worth the effort, and it is to be deplored that so few dayboys watched the matches on Saturday afternoons, when those dayboys present were generally far outnumbered by interested supporters from the town and enthusiastic parents.
