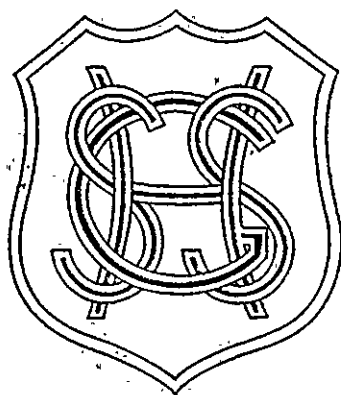

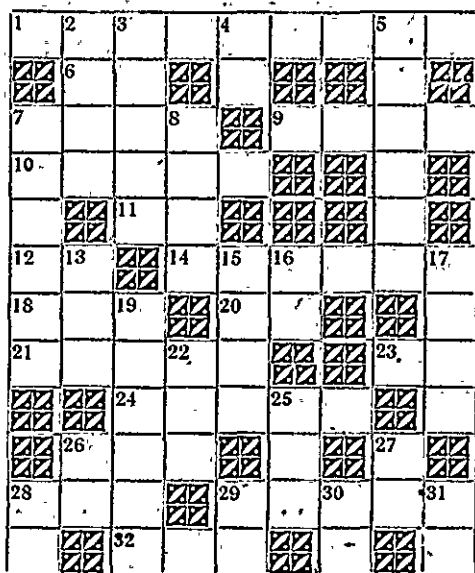

VISIT TO SALISBURY.

On July 5th the Architecture Class of VB, with some of VA and VI, visited Salisbury with Mrs. Raad and Mrs. Luton.

We walked round the outside of the Cathedral, noting the beautiful situation, the Georgian houses of the Close and the "period" decorations and mouldings. We were lucky enough to be shown some fourteenth-century Flemish stained glass, which was being removed for safety.

Inside, we saw the clever device of the Early English architect to counteract the marshy nature of the site, and admired the massive yet graceful piers. We walked all round till we were weary, then found it was raining, so lunched under trees and returned to the Cathedral, where a verger kindly gave us some interesting tit-bits about tombs and the steeple. To celebrate the end of the year we hiked to Hart Hill on July 20th, and though we could not cook as usual we had an enjoyable outing, made more pleasant by the unexpected visit of our District Commissioner.

Thirty-seven badges were awarded during the year, and the Guide Cup went to the Sunflower Patrol.

"TARGET FOR TO-NIGHT."

During the year the School was taken to see the film "Target for To-night." We all agreed that the show was a great success, and came away with the feeling that we knew a great deal about the lives of our airmen, who are in constant danger, fighting for victory and determined to beat the enemy.

The film was concerned with the adventures of the plane, "F for Freddie," and its crew: how plans were made beforehand about the target for the night, and how the plane took off with others from the aerodrome to begin a perilous journey through fog and mist, across the Channel, to the other side of the River Rhine.

It was seen how throughout the crew kept up their courageous, determined, sacrificing spirit. We learnt also that the headquarters of "Bomber Command" lie inconspicuously beneath a grassy mound "somewhere in England."

Although the heroes were the last to arrive home that night, and had encountered German fighter planes during the journey, they managed to escape with only one of the crew injured. They had made sure before leaving that the target and other objectives were left in flames.

The homeward journey was, on the whole, peaceful, and when the shores of England were sighted the crew were undoubtedly much relieved. They arrived back at the aerodrome just when hope for their safe return was being abandoned, and handing in their reports they went to rest after a night well spent.
