WORLD AFFAIRS.

During the Christmas term a party of boarders, together with a few day girls, went to a series of Talks on " World Affairs " given at the Town Hall by Mr. David Wehl.

November 2nd.—This was the second in the series, and dealt mainly with the various ways in which Germany can break through the circle stretching from Norway to Egypt, Stalingrad to Britain, and of our preparations in Egypt. Mr. Wehl predicted that North Africa would be the scene of the next important move on the part of the Allies or the enemy.

December 5th.—In view of the Eighth Army's break-through at El Alamein, this month's talk was looked forward to with great interest. The two main subjects discussed were the Chaining of the Prisoners and the arrival of the Americans in Great Britain.

January 6th.—This talk occurred during the Christmas holidays, and we were unable to attend.

February 2nd.—The last in this series of talks given by Mr. Wehl. The Pacific theatre of war was not touched on at all, but the speaker pointed out the developments that would almost inevitably take place in and around Europe. Although the main theme was optimistic Mr. Wehl was eager to impress upon the audience that, although we are well on the road to defeating the enemy, many setbacks and hardships would have to be undergone before final victory for the Allies is assured.

At last the plan of the Spitfire was completed but Mitchell was in a very weak state and was confined to a bath-chair. A few minutes after seeing the flight of the first Spitfire he died. But Mitchell will always be remembered for his amazing courage and spirit.
